Must Serve Out Sentences—Husbands who beat their wives and are sent to the rockpile, and then try to get off by working on the sympathies of their wives, need expect no assistance from Assistant City Attorney Sullivan or Municipal Judge Tawell. Both officials this morning took this stand, when Mrs. August Williams appealed to them to release her husband. Wednesday she complained against her husband, testifying he came home drunk and whipped her. The judge gave him 90 days on the rockpile. Thursday morning the woman begged the officials to have him released, saying she was destitute. Assistant City Attorney Sullivan referred her to the county board of relief for assistance, saying that a term on the rockpile for Williams would be best. This morning the woman made another appeal for her husband. Sullivan called the county relief officer, finding he had assisted the woman. It was then agreed by the assistant city attorney and the judge that they would not interfere with the rockpile sentence of Williams, as the woman could be taken care of by the county while he is confined at Linnton. This decision, they announced, would be the future policy in such cases.

Widow Sues for \$50,000—For the loss of her husband, Captain John Gordon Pearson, who was killed by a fall from the dock of the Inman-Poulsen Lumber company's mill a month ago, Mrs. Addie Pearson is suing the lumber company for \$50,000 damages. Captain Pearson was master of the little steamer Eklara, owned by the lumber company. Just prior to the accident the boat was sunk in a collision. The boat was raised and towed to the mill for repairs. On the evening of December 9, Captain Pearson went to the boat to put a night watchman on duty. Returning across the yard in the dark he missed his way and stepped from the dock, falling to the ground, 40 feet below. His neck was broken by the fall and death was immediate.

Widow's Support Alleged—Failure to support their wives brought John P. Buzzell, a lineman, and Arthur Marr, a mechanic, into the clutches of Harry Bulger, agent of the county court, and finally lodged them in the county jail. Buzzell recently came to Oregon from the east and later sent for his wife and mother. Now he refuses to support his wife and spends his time on a seow near Fulton with another woman, according to Bulger. Both men will be compelled to put up bonds to support their families or work for the county at the Kelly Butte rockpile.

Meetings will be held each evening in the church at 7:30 o'clock, and Sundays at 11 o'clock in the morning, besides the evening service.

See America First—Edward M. Weinbaum, before the Portland Educational Alliance at the Neighborhood House last evening, delivered the second of a series of geographical lecture studies illustrated with stereoscopic views entitled "See America First." He showed scenes of the Glacier National Park which is fast becoming the mecca for tourists in the state of Montana, and scenes along the Deschutes river in Oregon and the interior and views of the Wenatchee country in Washington. Mr. Weinbaum told of the millions that are being spent annually by tourists on foreign shores and strongly advocated the "See America First" movement. Mr. Weinbaum's next geographical lecture will be entitled "From East to West" and will also be illustrated with stereoscopic views. January 14 Marshall N. Dana, secretary of the Oregon State Immigration commission, will address the audience on "The City That Ought to Be," and will be followed by a musical program which will be participated in by some of the best musical talent in the city.

Want Columbia Park Improved—As it is understood that the park board has appropriated \$30,000 for the improvement of Peninsula park, the people of Portland have started a movement to have the board improve Columbia park. Formal action was taken in this matter last night, when the members of the Portsmouth Commercial club met in the Portsmouth school. A committee was appointed to wait upon the board and see to it that a better plan of arrangement was put in at Columbia park, a new bandstand constructed in time for the summer concerts, and a better system of walks be put in at the park. The Commercial club, which has been fighting for better street car service on the peninsula, is now to take the matter up with the state railroad commissioners, to see what can be done. A committee for this purpose was also appointed last night.

Highwaymen Bob Expressman—M. A. Rule, an expressman, living at 1065 East Yamhill street, was held up last evening by two men at East Fifty-second and Division streets. After going through the expressman's pockets, the highwaymen ordered him to drive on. They secured a small amount of change. Rule had been to Mount Scott with a load of goods, but was returning home. Motorcycle officer Schirmer was dispatched after the two highwaymen, who were thought to be going out the Base Line road. County Patrolman Truesdale was also called upon the case. Both men were on motorcycles. Schirmer heard a machine coming from Portland at East Seventy-fifth street. He turned off his lights, commanding the cyclist to halt. The cyclist stopped, proving to be the county officer. No trace of the highwaymen could be obtained.

Accused Gets Reward—Assistance given by John Lawrence a few weeks ago to Detective Mahoney, when the latter was making an arrest in the north end, had its good effect for Lawrence this morning in the municipal court. Lawrence was charged with being disorderly by fighting. The evidence against him was strong. "I want to say a good word for this man," said the detective to the judge. "A few weeks ago I made an arrest in a north end saloon. There were several men who interfered when Lawrence came to my assistance. He will always help an officer." The judge suspended his sentence. Lawrence is 58 years old.

Hutchin, manager of the Rose Festival, telegraphed this morning that he with Mrs. Hutchin, and his daughter, Mrs. Guy Anderson, will return from California, Sunday morning. All were participants in the Royal Rosarian tour. President Ralph Hoyt of the festival will go to New Orleans, thence to Panama, as will Mr. and Mrs. H. L. Pittock.

Fletcher Will Filed—The will of John W. Fletcher, who died this morning and his widow, Flora B. Fletcher, was appointed executor by Probate Judge Cleaton in accordance with the will. The estate is valued at approximately \$6000 and is mainly composed of two notes and an interest in Yamhill county property. Erica and Herbert Fletcher, children over the majority, each received \$10, and Adria and Doris, minor daughters, were left \$500 each. The balance goes to Mrs. Fletcher, who resides at 1724 East Yamhill street.

Wants Bids Rejected—The sewer committee of the executive board yesterday recommended that all bids submitted for the construction of the East Glisan street sewer be rejected and new ones invited. The lowest bid received was that of Gleibisch & Joplin for \$154,000 and this was in excess of the city engineer's estimate. The reason assigned by the contractors for the fact that the bids exceeded the estimate is that the price of cement had advanced since the estimate was filed, several months ago.

Wants Site Inspected—H. H. Kubach, in a communication filed with the city auditor today, says he has a water power site in Kittitas county, Wash., and that he would like to develop it. He asks that the city engineer be sent to inspect the site. Kubach says that the stream on which he owns rights will generate 100,000 horsepower and that a distribution system affording 52,000 horsepower can be installed at a cost of \$2,500,000.

File Articles of Incorporation—Two firms filed articles of incorporation with County Clerk Coffey this morning. The Oregon Coopers company, \$10,000 capital, E. William M. Allen and C. P. Killeen, incorporators, to locate at Stockdale station near Linnton; the Auto Painting company, \$5000 capital, O. W. Kennedy, Paul Steiger and O. G. Emig, incorporators.

Busy on Taxes—A force of deputies under County Clerk Coffey are at work extending the taxes for the coming year. As the extension must be completed by February 1 the work is being rushed to completion.

Uncontested Divorces—Eight uncontested divorces were heard this morning by Circuit Judge Gatens in the absence of Judge Morrow, who has not returned from a California trip, and decrees were granted in each case. The

proceedings heard were: William J. vs. Edith A. Blumenschein, West vs. Fred A. Borland, Nellie vs. Edith Sealey, Lizzie vs. Frank Bergant, Dora G. vs. Stephen Timmons, Robert W. vs. Julia M. Cameron, C. D. vs. Harriet L. Love, Victoria vs. Thomas Coffman. Habitual drunkenness, cruel and inhuman treatment and desertion were the causes given. Blumenschein asked that his wife's maiden name, Edith A. Weisner, be returned to her, which was granted.

Awarded \$300 Damages—The United Amusement company, operating the Oaks amusement park, was assessed \$300 yesterday by a jury to pay H. F. Oske for injuries received when his head struck a log as he slid down a "chute" while swimming at the bath house connected with the park. Oske asked \$1500 damages.
