Congressional.

Senator Jones has offered an amendment to the measure appropriating \$150,000 for improving, widening and extending the government road in Mount Ranier National Park. The amendment proposes an additional appropriation of \$25,000 for building trails from the park.

An important step toward the admission of a literary test for the admission of immigrants, which has been a subject of controversy in congress for 20 years, was taken Saturday, when the conferees of the two houses of congress finally agreed upon a report which will retain the test in slightly modified form.

Democratic members of the house committee on ways and means are planning to examine closely the affairs of the Aluminum Company of America and the Waltham Watch company, when their representatives testify in an adjourned hearing on the metal tariff schedule Tuesday. Each company has been charged with being a trust.

Political.

A conference on the question of Philippine independence will be held between President-elect Wilson and Manuel Quezon, Philippine delegate in congress, early in February. Mr. Quezon, who left Washington Sunday for Boston to address the Atlantic club on the independence issue, in reply to President Taft's suggestions in his message to congress said he planned to confer with Governor Wilson later.

Secretary of the Navy Meyer announced Sunday night that he might be a candidate for the United States senate from Massachusetts if the Republican caucus could not determine upon a selection from candidates now before it.

Eastern.

A kidnapping plot or elopement, involving Miss Anna E. Stechel, only child of Reuben P. Stechel of Allentown, Pa., an heiress to \$1,000,000, and Samuel Sinclair, supervising inspector of state highways, was nipped in the bud by a local driver Sunday afternoon. The girl was seized by two men, hustled into a waiting taxicab and the chauffeur told to drive to the country. The girl screamed for help and the chauffeur turned his machine toward the police station. Here the two men were arrested and identified as Sinclair and Walter Starr, a senior at Lehigh university. Sinclair explained that the kidnapping plot was part of a scheme the girl had adopted to deceive her parents and run away and get married to him.

amount held by over 100,000 bushels. Fire, which started in Red's Bazaar, for a time threatened the entire block in the central business district of Edmonton Sunday. Firemen fought the blaze in a temperature of 30 degrees below zero. The loss was \$100,000.

Found not guilty on two counts charging embezzlement of more than \$75,000 of funds turned over to the United States district court, Samuel Bridges, former clerk, was on Saturday found guilty by the jury in the United States district court at Tacoma of the two minor and purely technical counts charging failure to deposit funds "forthwith," as provided in a special law governing the handling of finances by court clerks. The penalty is anywhere from \$500 to \$10,000 fine and from 1 to 10 years' imprisonment.

Foreign.

The railway machinists' strike in Mexico, which began December 26, has been settled. The men win a 10 per cent increase in wages, but no reduction in the 10 hour day.

The reinstatement signed by President Fallieres of Lieutenant Colonel Du Paty de Clam, a leading character in the Dreyfus trial, to his former rank in the French territorial army, has caused such a sensation in parliamentary circles in Paris that it threatens to affect the approaching presidential election.

London contends that it has a woman nearer the proportions of the Venus de Milo than Miss Seel of Brooklyn in Miss Marjorie Watson, west end dress-maker's model, whose measurements are vouched for by Ethel Bailey, a well known artist. Her measurements are: Height 65.75 inches; head 22.4, neck 13, chest, waist and hips, identical with the measurements of Venus de Milo, which 22, calf 12.4.

The accession of Dr. Alfonso Costa to power is said to be responsible for a desperate political riot in Coimbra, 18 miles south of Lisbon, Portugal. A fight started between Democratic and Conservative clubs, and soon the rest of the population took sides, resulting in three persons being killed and 29 wounded.

Several sharp encounters in Mexico, in all of which the federals were victorious, have been reported to the government from various parts of the state of Guerrero. Stubborn opposition has been met along the west coast, where four towns—Tecpan, Atzacan, Arenal and San Gerónimo—are reported officially to have been taken by rebels.

The United Kingdom was swept Saturday and Sunday by heavy gales and snow storms. Small craft were wrecked and coast shipping was damaged. Vessels arriving at London Sunday felt the full fury of the storm. In the north of England the storm was terrific, lasting 23 hours. There was a continuous snowfall in the Newcastle district. Telegraph and telephone wires are down in all directions.

Miscellaneous.

Stanley O. Finch, who has been in charge of investigations instituted by the department of justice in enforcing the white slave law, now is in communication with a group of philanthropists formulating plans for a national movement to reclaim victims of the traffic.

That he has discovered the secrets of the Sphinx has been known to the authorities of the Harvard scientific museum and the Boston Museum of Fine Arts by Professor G. A. Reisner, the Harvard Egyptologist. Inside the Sphinx he found a temple dedicated to the sun. It is older than any of the pyramids, and its date is somewhere around 6000 B. C., the most ancient in Egyptian history.

Six naval radio stations in Alaska will be opened for commercial business according to the department of commerce. The stations are at St. Paul, Dutch Harbor, Unalaska, Kodiak, Cordova and Sitka.

For the first time in a period covering 15 years the Philippine islands have become the greatest purchaser of United States manufactured cotton cloths.

The total Philippine imports of merchandise for 10 months amounted to \$52,503,130, of which 40 per cent came from the United States. The total imports were \$48,000,000, as compared with \$22,000,000 for a similar period the year previous.

Walla Walla, Wash., Jan. 13.—That there will be a Pantages theatre built here in the spring is the belief of those who are watching the local vaudeville situation.

Pantages has written local members of the stage carpenters' union, it is said, that there would be plenty of work here in the spring, and intimated that with the first robin the building of a new house is to be begun.

The local field is entirely open, as there is no vaudeville house here, in a city of 20,000 people, and with as many more tributary from nearby towns. The location of the new theatre is to be on West Alder street, on property near the old plant of the Best brewery, in the heart of the business district.

COURT FINDS HODGINS ELECTED AT LA GRANDE

La Grande, Or., Jan. 13.—The circuit court this evening made its findings in the Hodgins-Kiddle contest over the joint senatorship from Union and Walworth counties. These show Hodgins, Democrat, to be elected by a small plurality. The canvassing boards had given the election to Kiddle by four votes and Hodgins contested this in certain precincts. The result of the contest is to put the matter up to the senate. The district had a 1400 registered Republican plurality to be overcome.

Marshfield, Or., Jan. 13.—One of the most important cases that will come up at this term of court is one in which W. J. Rust, trustee of the Kinney properties on Coos Bay, together with other taxpayers, are suing the city of North Bend to avoid the paying of taxes on a large part of the Kinney lands which were annexed to the city.

NORTH BEND MAY HAVE TO REFUND BIG TAXES

It is claimed that when the special election was held to vote on the annexing of the property to the city certain technicalities were not properly complied with and therefore the property in question was never within the city limits of North Bend.

This property takes in a territory on which the city taxes are big. If the case is decided against the city the taxes need not be paid and furthermore it may be possible to recover the taxes paid the city since five years ago.

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KAPPA KAPPA GAMMA GOES IN AT U. OF O.

(Special to The Journal.) University of Oregon, Eugene, Or., Jan. 13.—Kappa Kappa Gamma, the sixth national sorority at the University of Oregon, has been installed here. The Gamma Delta Gamma, for four years a local sorority, passed out of existence, and its members and alumni joined the national order. This is the fourth chapter of Kappa Kappa Gamma on the Pacific coast, and is the thirty-seventh chapter in the sorority.

The installation ceremony was conducted by Miss Eva Powell, grand president of the order, of Berkeley, and by Mrs. George Gurlinger, of Dallas. Saturday evening a banquet was held and yesterday afternoon the new sorority was at home to the university.

CREAM NETS ALBANY FARMERS 1-3 MILLION

(Special to The Journal.) Albany, Or., Jan. 13.—More than 1,000,000 pounds of cream were purchased during the year 1912 by the Albany Creamery association, the increase in business being more than 50 per cent over the year 1911. The report of the secretary, which was read at the annual meeting of the stockholders, showed that the total amount of cream purchased in 1912 was 1,057,935 pounds and that the average price paid was 33 1/2 cents per pound, which was 2 cents above the Portland quotations.

The following officers were elected to serve for the ensuing year: President, C. L. Shaw, reelected; vice president, J. H. Scott; secretary, Wayne Dawson, reelected; treasurer, O. L. Archibald, reelected; directors, C. L. Shaw, J. H. Scott, J. Whelan, D. Frecksten and J. D. Isom. S. C. Pate was retained as manager, he having filled that position for the last three years.

The plant is to be materially enlarged this year as it was last to accommodate the increasing business. The company's receipts for butter products last year were \$270,608.

PASTOR DIES AFTER 57 YEARS OF SERVICE

(Special to The Journal.) Springfield, Or., Jan. 13.—After 57 years' service in the pulpit, Rev. J. W. Reed, first ordained for service in the Methodist church, but for the greater part of his life a preacher for the United Brethren denomination, died at the home of his daughter here, on Thursday, and was buried Saturday at the Laurel Grove cemetery. Rev. Mr. Reed was 88 years of age last October, and had been making his home in Springfield for the past three years, occasionally occupying a pulpit. A son, J. E. Reed, lives in Wisconsin.

SEEK COMMERCIAL USE OF SAWDUST

U.-O. Professors Conduct Experiments; May Revolutionize Lumber Business.

(Special to The Journal.) University of Oregon, Eugene, Or., Jan. 13.—The engineering department is constructing a huge iron retort with which two university chemistry professors hope to devise a method of utilizing the wood waste from sawmills, stumps and slashings to a commercial advantage.

Professor O. F. Stafford of the department of chemistry and Assistant Professor A. F. Shinn have been working all fall upon this project. A model has been constructed upon a small scale and the operations successfully conducted, and now, to assure that it will be a commercial success a full sized apparatus is under construction.

The wood waste—sawdust, chips and slab—is converted by destructive distillation into such products as alcohol, acetic acid, tar, charcoal and a score of other wood byproducts. Such a readily obtained by destructive distillation of wood, but as yet no process has been devised to do so upon a commercially successful basis.

"Many efforts have been made to do this," declared Professor Stafford, "but we feel that we have found a slight variation in the process, which will mark the difference between commercially unprofitable and successful operation. It will, however, be two months or more before we will know the results of our experiments."

The distillation is done by a rotary retort, in which the process is continuous. Other such distillation plants have been intermittent, it being necessary to charge, then remove the products after distillation, and recharge.

Can such a utilization of the by-products of wood waste from the sawmill industry in the northwest, as well as the being a means to turn over the old stumps left by the lumber companies into cash products, it will be the means of an industry that will amount to hundreds of thousands of dollars, in fact much more.

It is quite possible that if such a process of manufacturing alcohol can be successfully operated by this process of wood distillation the problem of fuel for the automobile industry may be solved. It has long been known that can alcohol be made cheap enough it can be readily used for a source of motive power in internal combustion engines.

BOY OF ELEVEN GIVES SKIN FOR SISTER'S HAND

Marshfield, Or., Jan. 13.—In order to help his sister, Howard Post, the 11-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. L. J. Post of this city, became a hero, an unusual surgical operation. Miss Post was employed in a laundry and her hand was caught in the machinery and badly injured. The skin was torn from the fingers and hand and skin grafting was necessary to effect a cure. The little Post boy gave several strips of skin from his body to be grafted on his sister's hand. Although the boy suffered much pain, he submitted to the operation without taking an anesthetic.

CITY UTILITY BOARD TO BUILD RAILROAD

(Special to The Journal.) Grants Pass, Or., Jan. 13.—The public utilities commission, provided for by ordinance by the city council, has been named by Mayor Smith, and is composed of H. L. Gilkey, cashier of the First National bank; J. H. Williams, capitalist; E. V. Smith, real estate agent; Joseph Moss, insurance agent; P. B. Herman, real estate agent; and W. F. Counts, feed and grain merchant, with Mayor Smith chairman.

This commission is to have charge of the building of the railroad that has been projected from Grants Pass to the coast, or such part of it as the municipality builds and owns, bonds in the amount of \$200,000 having been recently voted by the city for that purpose.
