Youth Set Free.—Officers of the juvenile court Wednesday night freed Fred Sigmet, 17 years old, from the county jail where he was held on account of breaking into shacks and buildings along the riverfront. Deputy Juvenile Officer McIntosh found that four men in whose company the boy was arrested had been turned loose and took the matter up at once, having the boy released in a short time. No papers, complaints or warrants were turned over in the case and there was no ground for holding him. Harbor Patrolman Buckley was much put out when he found the boy gone. Sigmet, several years ago a ward of the juvenile court, but since that time has kept out of trouble until the present.

Adopt New Checking System.—That absolute and rapid check can be kept on the business of County Clerk Coffey's office. Chief Deputy Clerk J. J. Bennett has begun a system of loose leaf book-keeping by which balances can be secured on short notice and the work checked at any time of the month. Daily reports are to be made to Mr. Coffey of the receipts, disbursements and cash on hand in each department. By this means Mr. Coffey will have information on which to base deposits in banks and amounts on deposit.

Offices in New Courthouse.—The first office to be opened in the west wing of the new courthouse, was that of the State Railroad commissioner in charge of Examiner Fred Rasch. The furniture was installed Wednesday and Mr. Rasch started in with his duties. The office is on the second floor opposite the fifth street entrance. For the present entrance is from the east wing. Other offices and courtrooms are being rushed to completion, and in many cases will be ready for occupancy within the coming week or so.

Masamas to Take Sunday Hike.—The Masamas weekly walk on Sunday will begin at the north end of the Ford street bridge at 1:45 p. m. The trip will carry them up to and along the Skyline trail and on to Mount Calvary. The next walk following this one will be a moonlight tramp in the vicinity of Mt. Tabor, taken the evening of Friday, January 24, instead of January 25, as first planned.

Wichita School Standardized.—The first school in Clackamas county to receive credits for a class A school was the one at Wichita, a suburb of Portland, on the Estacade carline. Clackamas county schools are classified as A, B and C, according to a standard of \$9

points. The honor was obtained by the hearty cooperation of pupils, teachers, Parent-Teachers' circle, patrons and school directors. The Parent-Teachers' circle is one of the most active and progressive in the state. The directors take especial interest in school affairs. The teachers are Emilie C. Shaw, principal; Mamie B. Hogan, intermediate.

Anti-Capital Punishment.—The Oregon League for the Abolition of Capital Punishment will effect permanent organization next Wednesday evening at the East Side Library hall. Its organization committee has been engaged in securing out prominent people interested in the work throughout the state and will present its report at that time. C. E. S. Wood will be recommended as president, and La. Reine Helen Baker as vice president. Governor Oswald West will head the advisory committee of 50. An active educational campaign will be carried on for an initiative amendment.

Wilhelm Estate Appraised.—Appraisement of the estate of Ludwig Wilhelm shows assets of \$125,312.85, \$100,000 of which is represented by lot 6, block 13, on the east side of Third street between Alder and Washington streets. Money belonging to the estate amounts to \$6598.10, and a fractional lot at Twelfth and Davis streets is valued at \$18,667. Hilda Wilhelm, widow and executrix, and Walter R. Fred S. Victor H. and Alice J. Wilhelm, children, are the heirs. Mr. Wilhelm died October 24, 1912.

Sues for \$50,000 Commissions.—William J. Jackson, a salesman, has started suit against the Churchill-Mathews company for \$50,000, alleging that he would have made that amount in commissions on the sale of Wasco county fruit lands for the company had the company not broken a two year contract with him by appointing other agents in Oregon. Jackson, according to the contract, was to receive \$75 an acre commission on all lands sold by him. The contract was made May 6, 1912, for two years.

Protest Against Saloons.—Nineteen saloons are enough for the city, according to the views of a majority of the residents, as voiced by L. M. Lepper and C. A. Bigelow of the East Side Business Men's club, at a meeting of the liquor license committee of the city council yesterday. Mr. Lepper and Mr. Bigelow filed a protest against any more saloons being located in the ward. It having been reported to them that an application for a saloon license at 385 East Morrison street is soon to be made.

Local Firm Gets Contract.—Protest of Councilman Tom N. Monks against the action of a special committee of the city water board in awarding a contract for 350 fire hydrants to an eastern machine shop when several Portland bidders had submitted lower bids on standard hydrants yesterday resulted in the committee reversing its action. The contract will go to the local firm of Heiser & Undine, which tendered the lowest bid, offering to furnish the hydrants for \$27.85, or \$27.90 apiece.

Saloon Man's Wife Complains.—Mrs. J. Johnson, wife of a saloon man of North Portland, appealed to the liquor license committee of the city council for help yesterday, her case being the first of its kind ever to come before the committee. She said her husband runs the Overland saloon and refuses to support her properly. She declared that he has frequently beaten her and asked the councilmen if they would help her. The committee may revoke Johnson's license.

Pastor Claims Money.—Rev. W. F. Reager, pastor of the First Christian church at Park and Columbia streets, yesterday claimed the \$255 found in the church several evenings ago by Paulman J. W. Johnson. The officer was passing the place, saw the door partly open, and found the money in envelopes inside the second door. The minister said the money had been taken in a collection and not turned into the regular course.

Widow and Family Destitute.—Persons who wish to help an unfortunate family on Beech street may obtain the address of the family by applying for information at the city health office. A widow with six children is quarantined for scarlet fever. The family is destitute and has been depending for its support previous to the order of quarantine on an 11-year-old boy, the oldest of the six children.

Detective Hawley Injured.—While going to work this morning at 8 o'clock, City Detective Hawley was run down by an automobile at Third and Washington streets, causing his removal home on account of injuries. This is the second injury within six months to Hawley, the first being a sprained ankle. The injuries this morning are to his side and hip, but not considered serious.

pure milk ordinance and the establishment of the milk chemist's department. While the milk supply of Portland is still far from being perfect, this department has given residents information which has enabled them to get what clean milk there is available for their babies.

"During the past year alone we have had more than 1000 telephone calls from people who desired to have us recommend a dairy from which to purchase milk for the baby. In every case we have given the best information we could. We have a card index system that shows the record of every dairyman or other milk seller doing business in the city.

"When we get a telephone call we refer to the card records and recommend the dairymen in that district that has made the best showing during the year."

For the annual report of the city health office, the milk chemist is preparing a tabulated record of the infant mortality statistics of all the large

cities of the world. This will be published within the next month.
