

ANOTHER CARGO OF FIR MAY GO TO PHILIPPINES

Douglas Fir Sales Co. Submit Lowest Bid for Contract With United States Government; Three Firms Bid.

That another cargo of fir for the government will be shipped from here to the Philippines soon is forecasted by the fact that the Douglas Fir Sales company yesterday submitted the lowest bid for the contract when tenders were opened in the offices of the quartermaster department of the United States army at Washington. The figures are said to be from \$2 to \$4 higher than they were a year ago, indicating the relative conditions of the market for the two periods.

But three firms bid for the contract to deliver 2,000,000 feet of lumber to the Philippines, two of them being Portland firms. The Douglas Fir Sales company, of Portland, bid \$4.25 per thousand feet, while the highest bid was for \$4.50, and the Tacoma Mill company, \$4.55 per thousand.

The bids opened yesterday at Seattle will be forwarded immediately to Washington for approval. The contract in actual figures calls for 2,377,747 feet of rough merchantable lumber and of small amounts of culling, the cargo to be delivered at Portland, Seattle or Tacoma in March or April.

It is said that the bids of several of the large lumber manufacturing concerns of Portland, Grays Harbor and Puget sound, which have heretofore declined to bid for government work in the Philippines, were conspicuous for their absence.

Should the contract go to the lowest bidder, as is expected, the Douglas Fir Sales company will begin to load for a steamer to transport the cargo as soon as the contract has been approved at Washington.

The last cargo of lumber for the United States government to be set afloat at this port for the Philippines was on the Norwegian steamer Hercules which sailed from here a year ago this month laden with 2,735,960 feet of lumber, valued at \$29,671, for Manila.

BIG POTATO CARGO

Bear to Take Out First Shipment of the Season.

Potatoes form the most interesting part of the cargo of the San Francisco-Portland packet Bear, Captain Knapauer, which is to sail for California ports this afternoon. She will take out the first shipment of the succulent tubers to go south by steamer this season.

While the shipment from here of potatoes to California is not uncommon, this will be the first lot in a long time, and will be distributed between San Francisco and Los Angeles. In the shipment are two carloads, consisting of about 40 tons of the potatoes. There are also 500 tons of flour for the Orient, which will be transhipped at San Francisco to one of the oriental liners running out of that port. The remainder of the cargo consists of 1760 tons of general freight.

The Bear will have about 250 passengers.

WILL LOAD LUMBER

Two More Vessels to Sail for the West Coast.

Two more voyages to Valparaiso are in the present schedule of the American schooner W. H. Marston, now in port to load lumber for the west coast, and she is expected to begin taking on the first of her cargo tomorrow at the St. Johns mills. Deputy Collector R. F. Barnes will pay off the crew of 14 men at the custom house this afternoon. Eight of the 14 sailors signed on here with Captain George E. De Lano just

STEAMER HITS ROCK

Latouche Is Damaged in Straits During Heavy Fog.

Seattle, Wash., Jan. 21.—Steamer Latouche of the Alaska Steamship Co., bound from Seattle to Prince William sound, struck a rock in icy strait Sunday and was considerably damaged, being stranded 24 hours, finally proceeding from Cordova by land stage and making in No. 3 tank. Steamship-registry of the same fleet, left Ketchikan for Seattle yesterday after being aground 48 hours in Wrangell Narrows. Fog obscured the shore and the vessel went half length into the mud. It was necessary to lighter 200 tons of copper ore and to discharge 700 barrels of oil before floating. It is not believed she is much damaged.

PERMIT TO BUILD BRIDGE

Government Gives Its Consent for Span in Siuslaw.

Permission has been received from Washington, through Captain H. H. Robert, corps of engineers, United States army, for the construction of a bridge across the Siuslaw river, near Acme, and as the Willamette Pacific railway has also secured permission to extend drawbridges across the Coos and the Umpqua, it is expected that the construction of the bridges will begin immediately.
