

ARREST JAP AS STEAMER SAILS

F. Toda Charged With \$2500 Mail Theft, Was Going Home With Money.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Tacoma, Wash., Jan. 21.—Accused of having rifled the mail bags at Garrison, Mont., and taking a registered package containing \$2500, T. Toda, 23 years old, a Japanese, is under arrest here. The arrest was made by United States Marshal Davidson as the Japanese was about to board the steamer Canada Maru, which sailed for Japan at midnight. When searched at the police station, \$2000 in drafts from the branch bank of the M. Furuya company at Seattle to the general bank at Yokohama, \$467 in cash and a large diamond ring were found on his person. He will be turned over to the United States marshal today and returned to Garrison. At the time of the alleged theft Toda

was employed as warehouseman of the Northern Pacific railroad. It is alleged that when a mail bag containing registered matter was left in his care, he opened it and removed the money.

Sister Is Charged.

After a separation of 12 years, Mrs. C. Morrison of New York came to visit her sister, Mrs. J. Geuner, 506 Eugene street, five weeks ago. Yesterday the New York sister caused a search warrant to be issued against Mrs. Geuner, in which she was allowed to search the Eugene street home for certain articles claimed to be withheld. This morning Mrs. Geuner complained to the police that Mrs. Morrison is not responsible for her action, the matter to be taken up by the county court. Upon asking for her effects, says Mrs. Morrison, the Portland sister refused them. Patrolman Coulter went to the home with the woman, searching the rooms, but was unable to find only a few minor articles.

Loot American Ranch.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Mexico City, Jan. 21.—Killing four employees and abducting several women, rebels raided the ranch of J. M. Gleason, an American, near Chautempam, Tlaxcala state, according to reports here today. The ranch buildings were looted and burned. Gleason's son, with his wife and child, made their escape with difficulty.

ATTORNEY WOULD PROFIT BY DEAL

Relatives Ousted Osage Chiefs Admits Oil Company Agreed to Divide Profits.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Washington, Jan. 21.—In defense of his order canceling proposed leases on 800,000 acres of oil lands in the Osage Indian reservation in Oklahoma, Secretary of the Interior Walter L. Fisher appeared today before the house committee on Indian affairs. Fisher and Assistant Secretary Adams questioned at length C. J. Leahy, attorney for the ousted Osage Indian chiefs. Leahy admitted that he and two cousins were related by marriage to the Osages, and would have an interest in the assignment of one of the leases, for more than 200,000 acres, to the Uncle Sam Oil company. He testified he would profit by the deal. He stated Fisher had sent secret service agents to Oklahoma, and Fisher replied that the

federal district attorney in Oklahoma was in possession of the reports of the secret service men, to be used in possible prosecutions. Leahy admitted that the Uncle Sam company and three other lessees agreed to divide up the Osage oil territory with the statement: "We agreed to give the Uncle Sam company the better part of the territory." Secretary Fisher intimated that prosecution of persons interested in the leases is pending.

WILL RATIFY POPULAR ELECTION OF SENATORS

(Staff Correspondence.) Salem, Or., Jan. 21.—On the day when the Oregon legislature is peacefully electing the people's choice for United States senator, it received and referred to committee a communication from congress submitting to it ratification of an amendment to the federal constitution for the popular election of senators. Oregon will doubtless ratify the amendment within a few days. Three-fourths of the states are necessary to put the amendment into effect. Lee to Be U. S. Attorney in Idaho. (United Press Leased Wire.) Washington, Jan. 21.—President Taft today nominated William Lee to be United States district attorney for Idaho.

IRVINGTON CLUB TO HAVE FINE NEW HOME

Before many months have passed work will be started on a new building to house the members of the Irvington club, at East Twenty-first and Thompson streets. A fund for this purpose has already been started. This will be one of the important subjects to be discussed at annual meeting in the club house tonight for the purpose of electing three new members to the board of trustees. Those who have been nominated are H. M. Haller, John Stewart and W. J. Hofmann. Within a short time, the members of the board of trustees will meet for the purpose of electing officers. The present officers of the club besides the members of the board are William F. Woodward, president; Frank Fields, vice-president; H. E. Blohm, secretary, and S. L. Eddy, treasurer. A bonded street indebtedness of \$11,000 on the club will be secured by getting 120 new life members, upon the payment of \$100 each. Plans for a campaign to secure these members will be discussed at tonight's meeting. The club membership at the present time is in the neighborhood of 600.

EVANS MAY ARREST OFFICIAL TOMORROW

A complaint charging one of the officials of the Portland Railway, Light & Power company with violation of the statutes providing for proper fences on all streets has not been signed yet by District Attorney Evans. Action could not be taken, as the charge is to be based on lack of proper fences on the car which caused the death of ex-Sheriff William Frazier last Wednesday night, and measurements of this fence have not been secured. These will be secured tomorrow if possible, and one of the railway officials is to be arrested and prosecuted.

WOMAN DEMANDS TO BE PUT ON JURY LIST

Deputy County Clerk Moore was astounded this morning when a woman demanded that he place her name on the jury list. She declared that she is a taxpayer and legal voter and wants to serve her country. 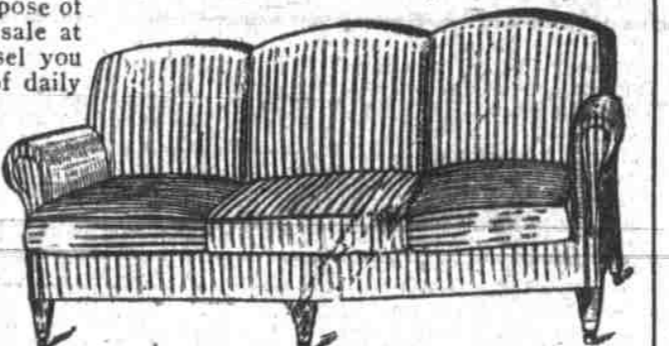
