

WILL CONFER ON SCENIC HIGHWAY

O. W. R. & N. and County
Court to Discuss Mt.
Hood Road.

Officials of the O. W. R. & N. and the Multnomah county court will confer next Tuesday forenoon at the county courthouse, in regard to a proposition of constructing a portion of the proposed Hood River Scenic road on the railway company's right of way along the Columbia river.

If possible arrangements will be made with the company to allow this, as the old survey indicates that the roadway, if constructed as originally planned, would be unusually steep in places, where an easy grade could be obtained by encroaching on the railroad right of way.

The proposition was broached to the company's officials recently by the county commissioners, and yesterday the commissioners received a letter informing them that the railroad's representatives were ready to confer with them at any time.

The commissioners granted the Portland Coke & Gas company permission to construct a roadway leading from the Linnon road to the new gas plant, near Government Mooring.

A claim for \$50.00 damages submitted by attorneys representing O. O. Hall was turned down. December 15 Mr. Hall's automobile struck a bad piece of pavement on the Burnside bridge and this, it is claimed, caused the machine to skid into a Woodland car, sustaining damages necessitating the expenditure of \$50.00 for repairs. The remaining amount of damages sought is for the time the machine was out of commission.

Another claim for damages was put forward by the Independent Laundry. It was alleged an automobile was damaged by the St. Johns ferry leaving the dock when the machine was only half aboard it. The bill, which calls for \$12.50 was referred to the ferry captain with orders to make a full report on the matter.

Bids for cupboards for the west wing of the county courthouse were received, and the contract was awarded the Honyman Hardware company. The contract made a price of \$36 for large ones, \$16.20 for medium sized and \$12.50 for small ones.

Replying to the recent letter of the commissioners which instructed all county officials to run their various offices on lines of strict economy County School Superintendent Armstrong, forwarded a communication stating he expected to operate his office \$500 under the estimate of \$6000 for the ensuing year.

The southwest parlor, overlooking the Hudson, was banked with palms and festooned with white and red roses. Vases filled with roses were distributed at regular intervals.

The altar was constructed of amaranth, palms and roses. It was reached by a pathway marked with white satin ribbons. An orchestra led by Nathan Franko, hidden behind a bank of palms and roses, provided the music.

At the appointed moment the bridal party appeared at the head of the stairway and marched to the altar to the strains of the Lohengrin march. The procession was led by the Rev. Mr. Russell. AGAIN USE OLD NECARNEY TRAIL

Nehalem and Seaside Revert
to Pioneer Transportation
When R. R. Fails.

(Special to The Journal.) Seaside, Ore., Jan. 22.—Owing to the recent landslides on the P. R. & N. railroad in Tillamook county and the consequent suspension of traffic on that line, the old Necarney mountain trail from this point to Nehalem, in Tillamook county, has been in service for the first time since the road was constructed.

According to Albert Hall and E. H. Effenberg of Nehalem, who returned home over the trail, the old mountain road is still in good condition, although the hardships of the olden days have not been eliminated. The trail covers a distance of 35 miles and in places follows a narrow ledge but a few yards wide along the upper ridge of the mountain 2000 feet above the surf.

When the winter storms are raging the trail is extremely dangerous, for the rain often causes slides and washouts and the wind now and then blows a tree across the trail and even threatens the safety of the traveler at the more exposed points.

At one time the trail was practically the only means of connection between Nehalem and the outside world. A daily mail stage was maintained between the local postoffice and that city, the carrier traversing the trail by horseback.

There were times when the mountain road was too rough and dangerous for even the hardy mail carrier, and during the worst storms of the winter mail service often had to be suspended for days.

At such times the trail was soundly condemned by citizens at either end. Now it is considered the most reliable means of communication, after all.

consist of Senators McCulloch and Neuner and Representatives Reames, Gill and Lawrence.

When the governor was asked about this committee and its functions he would neither affirm nor deny the report. The bill passed by the house over the governor's veto yesterday was a measure introduced by Thompson of Lake county, and provides that the state land board may contract to have swamp lands of the state drained and be sold to the person or corporation that takes the contract.

The governor vetoed the bill on the ground that it did not provide for the sale of the reclaimed land in small tracts to actual settlers. He held that the bill was unconstitutional in that it tied up large tracts and held them.

Thompson Ready to Fight, Too. It was asserted by a number of representatives who voted to sustain the governor's veto that the bill was being put through the house by steam roller methods.

Governor West immediately sent a message to Senator Chamberlain asking him to eliminate Warner and Anderson lakes from a bill which he had introduced in congress clearing title to the state in these two and a number of other lakes in Oregon, saying that if Thompson's bill is sustained these lakes will pass into the hands of a corporation.

The Warner Valley Land company is the riparian owner and the corporation mainly in question. The senator, author of the Thompson bill, is also spreading on his war paint today and feverish conditions are prevailing in both houses.

out the impression the affairs of the penitentiary in particular were in need of investigation. In view of this I believe it is important that a thorough investigation as to the affairs of this institution by an impartial and competent committee be made.

"If the matter of economy has been the reason for the senate's failure to provide for this investigation, I wish to say that I will be pleased to personally stand the cost of such investigation if agreeable to your honorable body. Respectfully, OSWALD WEST, 'Governor'."

Opinions of Senators. In a brief debate Dimick declared that such investigations are a farce, and protested that if two senators are taken for each institutional investigation not enough will be left to transact the business of the senate.

Miller said it would be a farce, also, but he would vote for it because it will be ordered anyway. Smith of Coos said the governor is right in demanding an investigation, and he said he believed there should be a thorough inquiry at the penitentiary. He said he expected the other investigations to be of no value.
