Woman Wields Umbrella—An umbrella was used effectively last evening by Mrs. W. E. Wallace, proprietress of a rooming house at Eighteenth and Morrison streets, on Otto A. Miller, 244 Seventh street, when she met him in the Globe theatre. She accused Miller of taking two girls to the show without her consent, claiming a three-year engagement as her reason for such fight. After submitting to the umbrella assault, Miller turned upon the woman, pushing her to the floor. At this point in the fight a patrolman entered. The couple quietly left the theatre. The patrolman's report is to the effect that Miller has been engaged to Mrs. Wallace three years, both agreeing to seek no other company except themselves. However, Miller attended the theatre with the two women without the consent of Mrs. Wallace.

Asks Judgment for \$4500—J. W. Applegate has started suit against Walter G. Hayes, an attorney, asking for judgment for \$4500 on the ground that Hayes secured title to a lot in McMillan addition, with house and furniture, for \$500 while Applegate was drunk. Applegate declares he was on a spree for several weeks prior to October 10, when the transfer was made, and that he thought he was signing papers to facilitate securing a mortgage. Applegate claims the house and lot were worth \$6500 and the furnishings \$800, and that a mortgage of \$2300 was against the place. C. L. Brubaker is suing with Hayes as a defendant, as the place was transferred to both Hayes and Brubaker.

Anti-Capital Punishment—The Oregon League to Abolish Capital Punishment meets this evening to effect permanent organization. It has secured the hall of the East Side library, East Stark and Eleventh streets. Many of the most prominent men and women of the state have assured Miss Jean R. Wold, secretary of the organization committee, that they will lend the use of their names and do all in their power to further the cause. C. E. S. Wood, jurist, orator, humanitarian, has been recommended by the organization committee for president.

Lecture on Roses—The third of the series of lectures on rose culture, provided by the Portland Rose society, will be given by Frederick V. Holman, the well known amateur rosiarian, Monday evening, January 27, at 8 o'clock, at Elbert hall, Seventh and Alder streets. The subject of this lecture will be "Rose Growing in Portland." Mr. Holman's lectures are always interesting and instructive. A short musical program will precede the lecture, a violin solo, by Miss Ruth Plummer, accompanied by Miss Ruby Crichton.

Will Speak on Parks—Park Superintendent Mische is to deliver an address on Portland's backwardness in park and boulevard policy before the Progressive Business Men's club tomorrow at luncheon in the Multnomah hotel. Music will be furnished by Dr. H. M. Emerson and C. McCulloch. H. Goodwin Beckwith will serve as chairman of the day. This will be the first meeting over which the new president, James F. Kinder, will preside. He will make announcement of committee appointments.

To Fight Extradition—Fred Grosslight, rearrested in Detroit, Mich., is to fight extradition, according to word received from that place by Sheriff Word yesterday. Grosslight is wanted for passing bad checks to the extent of over \$1000 and for taking jewelry belonging to M. Levy. Grosslight was first allowed to go on \$500 bail, but when Sheriff Word protested on the ground that the man had taken such a small amount the Detroit police arrested the man again.

Bridge All Paid for—By the payment of \$11,814 to Robert Wakefield yesterday, the city of Portland completed paying for the Hawthorne bridge which was finished two years ago. The payment of this amount of money was held up on account of lack of funds from which it could be paid and Wakefield sued for the amount. Judgment was recently given him and the checks were paid to satisfy the judgment. The judgment has been canceled.

Indicted for Theft—Jack H. Williams was yesterday indicted by the grand jury for the theft of clothing and jewelry from Walter Dodge worth about \$50. Another indictment was also returned against Joe Louisgnot for larceny by bailie because of the theft of a rifle from W. M. Doyle. Louisgnot has been indicted twice already because of depredations credited to him as a member of a gang of waterfront thieves.

Bankrupt Petition—A bankruptcy petition was filed today by F. C. Maloney, a Portland railroad switchman. His liabilities are \$1120, and assets are nothing.

In Portland this morning with two prisoners, arrested last week on the Klamath Indian reservation in southern Oregon, Charles Capelin, an Indian, was arrested on an indictment returned by the grand jury now in session, charging the sale of liquor on an Indian reservation. Ray Chambers was taken in tow by the marshal for impersonating a United States deputy marshal. Mislabeling of Products Alleged—Complaint was filed in the United States district court this afternoon by Assistant United States District Attorney Hindman, against the Hood River Spray Manufacturing company, charging the concern with mislabeling a product. The company manufactures an insect spray known as Niagara, the principal ingredients being lime and sulphur. Because the label does not give the proportions of the mixture or the amount of insect substance in the compound, violation of the insecticide statute of 1910 is charged.

NEW PLAN OF TREATING PAVING BLOCKS TESTED

The United States forest service recently completed an experiment, undertaken to determine the most economical and best method for treating Douglas fir and western hemlock paving blocks with coal tar creosote by the open tank method. It was found that the greatest merit of the open tank method lies in its comparatively small expense. It was found that at much less expense it is both possible and practicable to treat the blocks under the new method.

The hemlock blocks treated readily by the process. By using different timed hot and cold baths of the oil, different results were secured. In one, the blocks were heated 11 hours and a cubic foot of wood absorbed 15 pounds of the oil. A five hour treatment with the different baths, being longer, resulted in 17 pounds being absorbed per cubic foot.

The Douglas fir was much harder to treat and entirely successful results were not obtained. The government did not succeed by the open tank method in getting a complete penetration of the oil into the wood.

It was found further that blocks of the two woods mentioned, after being treated in the manner mentioned, are free from any tendency to shrink or swell when subjected to extreme varying moisture conditions.

Strength tests to determine any weakening effect of the treatment were made on both species and it was found that the wood was not weakened.

Full reports of these tests were received Monday at the Portland forestry office, where full information regarding the matter can be secured.

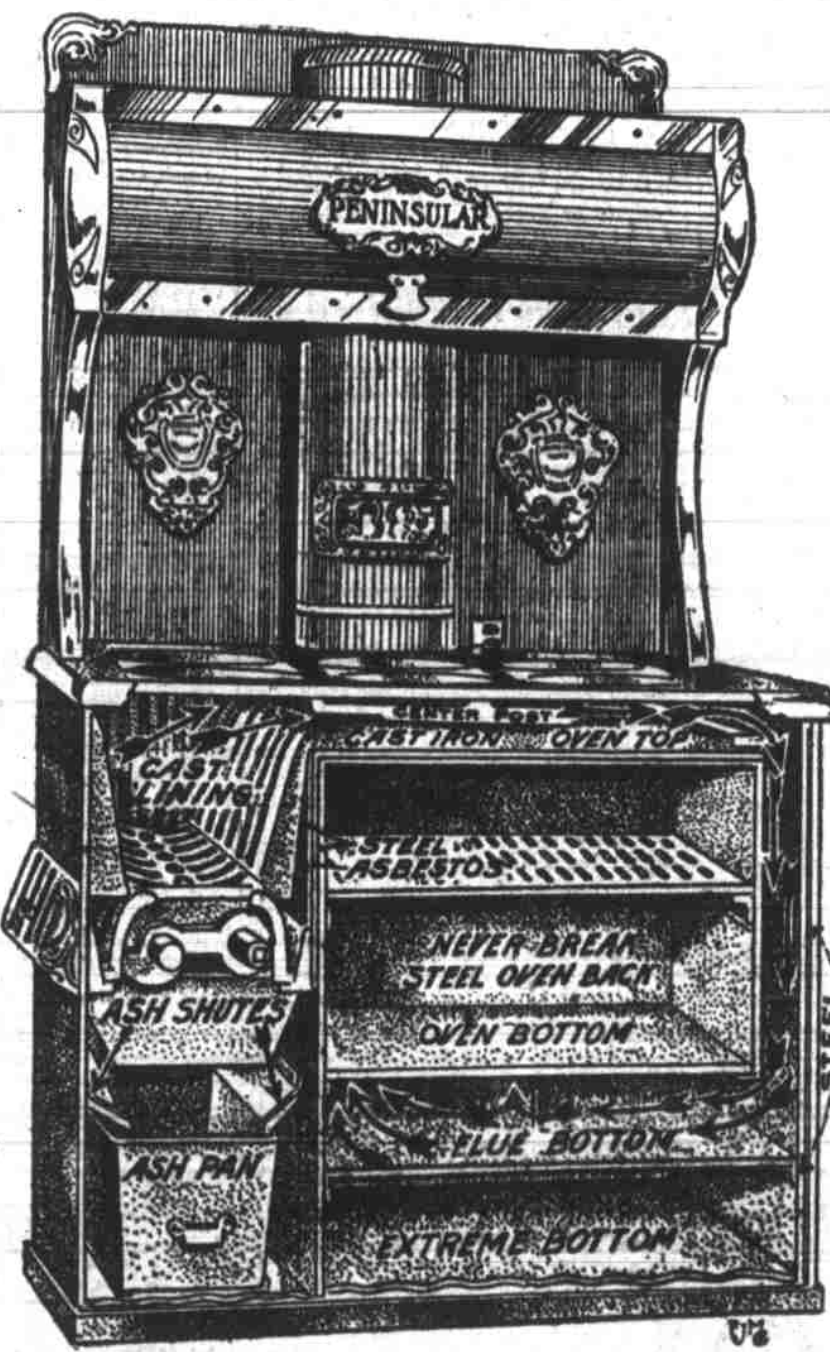
