

NEW EXPERIMENT STATIONS ARE NOT NEEDED, SAYS KERR

O. A. C. Head Says College Can Cover State by Extension Work; Legislature to Visit Institutions.

Salem, Or., Jan. 23.—There is really no need for the establishment of more agricultural experiment stations in the state, President Kerr of the Oregon Agricultural College told members of the house ways and means committee last night in the course of a session to consider the appropriation of \$681,000 asked by the college.

In place of the experiment stations, President Kerr said that what O. A. C. wants is a bill providing means for carrying out more extension and field work among the farmers.

Bills to appropriate \$28,000 have already been introduced for additional experiment stations. Eight thousand dollars is asked for one station in Coos county, and \$6000 for another bill; \$6000 for a Clatsop county station; \$4000 for Malheur; and \$5000 for a walnut experiment station in Yamhill. In the senate, \$4000 is asked for a station in Grant county and \$4000 for one in Malheur. There is some duplication.

After considering the appropriation asked by the agricultural college, the committee decided that the improvements desired are of such magnitude that a visit to the college will be necessary.

It may also be decided to ask the whole legislature to visit both O. A. C. and the University of Oregon.

Included in the O. A. C. budget is an item of \$107,000 for buildings. President Kerr said this is for the partial completion of a domestic science and arts buildings and a gymnasium. To complete the first, \$155,000 would be needed, he said, and to do all the building improvement work needed, would cost \$250,000.

The college is now getting a biennial maintenance fund of \$300,000 to which \$100,000 additional is asked.

UP-VALLEY WOULD CUT DUCK SEASON 15 DAYS

Salem, Or., Jan. 23.—Ducks are subject of unusual interest in the game committees just now, and it appears that the views of a large number of the sportsmen of Multnomah county will be expressed by the attitude of the majority of the senate game committee.

Sentiment of the majority favors changing the open season from September 1-January 15 to October 1-February 1. This would cut out a month of fine shooting around Portland. Up valley men seem to think that the birds will flock their way to a greater extent if September shooting is not allowed.

Another proposal favored by a majority is to cut the limit from 35 birds to 25. This is also likely to arouse protest. As the game code is a long one, there is plenty of time to be heard before a final report is made.

STATE TO TAKE UTILITY PROFITS

Corporations Allowed But 10 Per Cent on Physical Valuation by Bill.

Salem, Or., Jan. 23.—Very stringent regulations of express, telephone and telegraph, sleeping car and refrigerator car, and oil companies in Oregon are contained in a bill proposed in the house by Representative Parsons of Lane today.

The bill levies a license fee on such corporations of all moneys they take in annually above a net profit of 10 per cent over all expenses, including regular state and county taxes. A deduction of 10 per cent based on the physical valuation of the property of the conditions is first to be made to offset depreciation.

The bill is sure to be very bitterly fought on the ground that it is confiscatory in its provisions and practically fines these companies everything over 10 per cent.

MINER DIES FROM GAS, 20 HAVE CLOSE ESCAPE

Tacoma, Wash., Jan. 23.—One man was asphyxiated and 20 others escaped with their lives with difficulty in one of the shafts of the Wilkeson Coal & Coke Co.'s mines at Wilkeson late yesterday. The dead miner is Joseph Matia.

The miners were preparing to quit work when the passage where they were at work became filled with deadly gas. A rush was made for the shaft and Matia, who was unable to reach the air, succumbed before he could be taken to the surface.

WANT \$50,000 FOR LIVE STOCK EXHIBIT AT FAIR

Salem, Or., Jan. 23.—The Oregon Pure Bred Livestock association passed a resolution last night endorsing an appropriation of \$50,000 for the Panama-Pacific exposition and demanding that \$50,000 of this amount be designated for the exclusive use of the livestock interests of the state in making a proper showing at the big exposition.

The association endorsed the livestock sanitary bill now before the legislature, the bill providing for extension work among farmers from the Oregon Agricultural College and farm and industrial work among the school children under the supervision of the state school superintendent.

They endorsed the bill providing a mileage basis for the support of county fairs and passed a number of other resolutions of minor importance.

"SILENT TREATMENT AS SUBSTITUTE FOR DEATH

Sacramento, Cal., Jan. 23.—In his anti-capital punishment bill Assemblyman Ellis proposes life imprisonment without pardon or parole for all first degree murderers, and that on the anniversary of the crime such convicts shall be confined in the solitary cage for 24 hours. During the remainder of the sentence the men would not be permitted to speak to anyone except in great emergency.

For second degree murder he would provide a minimum of 10 years, without pardon or parole.

DAIRY COMMISSIONER TO HAVE MORE HELP

Salem, Or., Jan. 23.—Additional deputies and equipment for the office of the state dairy and food commissioner have been approved by the senate committee on ways and means, which has decided to report favorably on Senate Bill No. 25 by Hays.

This provides \$6200, which will go to furnish the dairy and food commissioner with a pure food expert and a dairy expert to increase the efficiency of his office. The bill had previously been approved by the committee on agriculture and forestry.

Another appropriation favorably acted upon sets apart \$25,000 for an armory at Eugene, to which \$25,000 is to be added locally.

REWARD FOR DETECTIVES WHO CAUGHT HUMPHREYS

Salem, Or., Jan. 23.—A bill introduced by Representative Upton of Multnomah appropriates \$1,000 reward for the Coast Detective Agency for services leading to the arrest and conviction of George and Charles Humphrey, convicted of the murder of Eliza A. Griffith. They are now under sentence of death.

BILL CALLS FOR SANITARY DRINKING CUPS ON CARS

Salem, Or., Jan. 23.—No more will the traveler by train or steamboat go thirsty for lack of a drinking cup, if a bill introduced in the house by Representative Belland is passed. He would compel steamship and railroad companies carrying passengers to furnish sanitary drinking cups free.

Hearing on Minimum Wage.

Salem, Or., Jan. 23.—A public hearing on the Malarkey minimum wage bill will be held next Tuesday night, at which the industrial committees of each house will listen to arguments to be offered for or against. On Monday evening a similar hearing will be given to those interested in the bill of Senator Dimick, fixing an eight hour day for the Oregon City mills and all employments where machinery is operated 22 hours out of 24.

COUNTY OPTION ON SCHOOL SUPERVISION

Salem, Or., Jan. 23.—A compromise intended to satisfy opponents and supporters alike of the present school supervisory law has been drafted into a bill by the house committee on education.

Briefly, the compromise proposes county option on the supervisor question. Any county, it provides, may ballot on the question, if a majority vote against it, the school superintendent shall dismiss the supervisors and establish the supervisory board. To adopt the system, a like procedure is authorized.
