Y. M. C. A. Lecture Course—Arrangements for a course of lectures by Dr. John H. Boyd, pastor of the First Presbyterian church, have been completed. By R. R. Perkins, religious work director of the Portland Young Men's Christian association. The lectures are to be delivered at the Y. M. C. A., beginning Saturday, February 1. The general topic will be "Changing Ideas in the World of Religion." The course, says Dr. Boyd, will be a ministry to the intellectual confusion of the times. There will be six of these lectures given on Saturdays from 12:30 to 1:30. Those who attend will eat luncheon together. This is the same plan that was followed last year for a course of lectures by Dr. Boyd. There was a large attendance and the discourses proved of much interest. At the close of the course those who had attended contributed money to have the lectures printed. They were widely distributed. The forthcoming course is open to all men. Those desiring to attend should communicate with Mr. Perkins.

Hold on Girls' Complaint—Wanted on two indictments charging contributing to the delinquency of minors, W. R. Foster was arrested at Bonita, on the Oregon Electric, yesterday while seeking for a grading camp. He is charged with the crimes by two girls, aged 1 and 4 years, who were returned against him several days ago by the grand jury and Deputy Sheriff Curtis and Lumsden have been searching for him. Curtis picked him up yesterday. Foster admits that he was suspected in Salem following the Barbara Holman murder in Abilene, Kan., 1911, in which a four year old girl was mutilated and killed. He declares he must have been drunk if he did the deeds charged, but the girls declare he was not drunk and that he attacked them more than once.

Now Odd Fellow Lodge—Alberta Lodge No. 228, is the name of the lodge Odd Fellow organization to be granted a dispensation in Portland. Initial installation of officers took place Jan. 14 and Tuesday night seventeen new candidates were initiated, giving the lodge a total membership at the present time of 38. Boy Seeks Teachers' Purses—While pretending to wait for Principal Van Tine, of the Buckman school, East Twelfth and Burnside streets, a boy about 16 years old, went into one of the cloak rooms during the recess at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon and took a purse containing \$5, which belonged to one of the teachers. He was seen coming from the cloak room and chase given, but he escaped down East Burnside street. The boy had walked into the building and going to the office of the principal stated that he wanted to wait with the principal while the boy walked to the cloak room and took the purse.

Playground Expert Returns—L. H. Weir, field secretary of the Playground and Recreation Association of America, has returned to Portland after a stay of several weeks in New York. He expects to make Portland permanent headquarters, and will conduct a campaign throughout the Northwest to increase interest in provisions for playparks and municipal recreational facilities. Under the auspices of a committee of the Consumers' league he recently conducted a survey of social and recreational life in Portland.

McCracken's Body Cremated—Very simple were the services held this afternoon at the Portland crematorium over

the remains of E. Henry McCracken, vice president of the John McCracken company, who died at his home, 231 St. Clair street, of Bright's disease Tuesday night. The body was cremated, Rev. A. A. Morrison, rector of the Trinity Episcopal church, officiated at the services. All the members of the family with the exception of Robert G. McCracken, of San Francisco, were present. He was unable to make the trip to this city.

Takes Up Alienation Suit—Circuit Judge Gates this morning took up the consideration of the alienation of affection suit of Margaret Burns against the parents of her husband, H. C. Burns and Mary L. Burns, and a jury is being selected. Mrs. Burns charges that since her marriage with Hattie Burns, August 17, 1905, her husband's parents have done everything to separate her from her husband and have kept him from working that he might not support her. She claims that they offered her \$500 to secure a divorce. Difference of religion is alleged to be the cause of their dislike. She alleges her health has been ruined by the constant nagging and worry over their efforts to take her husband from her.

Takes Prisoner Back—Jud W. Boyd, sheriff of Tehama county, California, left last night for Red Bluffs with John Torgerson, the southern Oregon postoffice robber, in custody. Torgerson is to be tried in the California city for the murder of John Miller on the night of December 4, and if he escapes punishment there he will be brought back to Portland to stand trial on the indictments of the United States grand jury, charging him with postoffice robbery. Sheriff Boyd received extradition papers from Governor West yesterday.

Settled Out of Court—Ninety cases settled out of court in the first 21 days of this year in the record made by the juvenile court to date and three of the 21 days were Sundays and the first day New Year and a holiday. This makes an average of better than five cases settled a day. The cases ranged from larceny to snowballing and truancy. The snow was responsible for the greater number of offenses under the last named naughtiness.

Mayor at Legislature—Mayor Rushlight and City Attorney Grant will appear before the legislature at Salem this afternoon on the bill to be recommended for passage by the local council. The bill provides for the transfer of the operation of bridges here to the county, the elimination of the right of remonstrance against railroad grade crossings and regulations for the uniform planting of trees on public streets and county high roads.

Mazamas to Take Two Tramps—The Mazamas will have a moonlight walk on tomorrow, leaving East Sixteenth and Belmont streets at 8 p. m. On Sunday's trip the club will leave on the Oswego train at 12:30 p. m. and go to Oswego. From there they tramp to Willamette Falls, thence back to the suspension bridge and cross over to Oregon City, whence they return to the city by the O. W. P. line.

Pupils to Give Musicals—Pupils of the three school street and Rodney avenue, will give a musical at the school tomorrow afternoon, beginning at 2:45 o'clock. The program will include chorus and individual singing and instrumental music. The Japanese national song by one of the Japanese pupils will be a feature. Parents and friends are invited to attend.

Mayor to Name Montag—Councilman John Montag will be appointed by Mayor Rushlight to take the place made vacant on the ways and means committee of the city council by the recent resignation of Councilman John H. Burdard. E. H. Langford, Mr. Burdard's successor, will fill his place to the other committee appointments that were held by the retired lawmaker.

Parents-Teachers' Meeting—The parents and teachers' association of Woodlawn will hold its regular monthly meeting tomorrow at 2:30 in the afternoon at the Woodlawn school. There will be a short business meeting, followed by a very attractive musical, given by the upper grades of the school. A very cordial invitation is extended to all.

Gets \$2,500 Damages—For \$2,500 the Portland Lumber company yesterday morning settled a damage suit against them by William Hansen before it came to trial. Hansen was badly injured last August when the wheel from a lumber car went through a plank in the company's yard and the lumber fell on him. He sued for \$10,000 damages.

Mrs. Pope reported the only man whom she detected from her house a few days ago. A physician examined the child this morning, reporting no indication of chloroform or acid having been used.

Wants Rock Furnished—F. I. Fuller, general manager of the Portland Railway, Light & Power company, appeared before the county commissioners this morning and stated that the company is ready to build a 7000 foot spur from Rockwood to the Kelly Butte rockpile if the county will furnish rock for the spur. The spur is needed that rock may be loaded onto cars for transportation to roads of the county. The matter has been taken under advisement by the commissioners.
