Order of Jove Meets.—The members of the Order of Jove, consisting of electrical engineers of the city, met in the hall of the city hall yesterday afternoon. R. T. Grupp, chief engineer for the Portland, Eugene & Eastern Railway company, spoke on the plans of his company in constructing the 340 miles of electrically operated interurban lines with which they will begin business in the Willamette valley. He also gave a description of the equipment to be installed. A bill now pending before the legislature, which provides for the appointment of a board of electrical examiners and the licensing of persons desiring to engage in electrical contracting business in Oregon, received the endorsement of the Jovians.

Awarded \$4500 Damages.—On the second trial of the damage suit of Jacob Hahn against Donald Mackay, on account of cancellation of the lease of a saloon quarters in the old Baker theatre building, at Third and Yamhill streets, resulted in a verdict for \$4500 in favor of Hahn by a jury in Circuit Judge McGinn's court yesterday. Hahn, who loved \$6310 two years ago, and the case was appealed to the supreme court, where the case was remanded for a new trial. Hahn sued for \$10,000, claiming that he was damaged in that sum because his lease and five months to run when cancelled. The building was torn down over his head in 1910 to make place for a six story modern building.

Firarms Sale Suspended.—Sale of firearms in the city hall, which had been suspended, pending the outcome of legislation at the legislature and settlement of the recently enacted city ordinance restricting the sale of weapons. Inquiry at the pawn shops and hardware stores brings forth the answer that no sale of firearms will be made until the matter is settled. From certain quarters it is said that if a law is passed by the legislature it will be attacked in a friendly suit. The dealers in pistols have already held a meeting, deciding to test the validity of the city ordinance.

Gets Year on Bookpile.—One year on the rockpile was the sentence given John J. Powers, who feigned unconsciousness for 2 hours at the police station, this morning in the municipal court when he was tried for stealing an auto belonging to Attorney A. C. Spencer. Powers maintained a stupor until he was taken to St. Vincent's hospital, where he suddenly awoke when the house physician started to administer an anesthetic. Powers said he could not remember anything that happened. John Mann, a printer, testified seeing Powers take the robe and try to sell it in a pawn shop.

Must Serve Out Sentence.—Albert F. Hill, alias Scholling, must serve a sentence of from one to five years in the penitentiary, as a parole granted him several months ago by Circuit Judge Morrow was revoked yesterday. He was arrested a few days ago by the police for operating a fake phonological contest along the same lines as one for which he was given the penitentiary sentence. His scheme is to get small sums from parents as fees for entering their children in contests for valuable prizes. The prizes always prove to be mythical.

Man and Woman Arrested.—Daniel Keefe and a woman declaring herself to be his wife were arrested this morning at 2 o'clock in the Mart rooming house on Morrison street, charged with disorderly conduct. Patrolman McCarthy made the arrest. He found the couple fighting. The woman received a serious blow on the eye, which she said was caused by Keefe. A quantity of liquor was also found in their room. Keefe was sentenced to 90 days on the rockpile and fined \$200. Sentence was suspended. The woman was sentenced to 10 days in the county jail.

To Name 50 More Clerks.—To assist in caring for the rush of taxpayers expected as soon as the taxes are payable at the beginning of the month the county commissioners this morning authorized Sheriff Word to appoint 50 additional clerks for the time necessary. Twenty-five of the clerks are to receive \$90 a month and the remainder \$3 a shift. The tax department will probably start to move into its new quarters in the north end of the main floor next week.

Sues to Recover Commission.—A suit to recover \$3000 commission for the sale of the steamer "Gladie Kelton" was commenced before Circuit Judge McGinn by J. S. Gill against the Columbia Contract company. Gill claimed that he acted as broker for the company and secured E. H. Dodge as a purchaser at the price of \$20,000. The company claimed that Gill had an option on the hull of the boat and was not their agent.

Purchase of Tractor Recommended.—The fire committee of the city executive board yesterday recommended that a tractor, to cost \$5000, be purchased for the use of the fire department. The new machine may be hitched to any piece of fire apparatus on wheels. The committee ordered Fire Chief Dowell to attend the launching of the new fire boat David Campbell tomorrow and report as to its condition.

Granted Time to Appeal.—Counsel for A. J. Biehl, convicted several weeks ago in the United States district court of conspiracy to defraud in the DeLarm Columbia Orchards case, appeared in court this morning and asked for an extension of time in which to prepare an appeal. Five days was given, and the motion, in case it is filed, will be argued February 3.

Bankruptcy Petitions.—William A. Snively, a Portland butcher, filed a petition in bankruptcy with the federal court today. The scheduled liabilities are \$908.46 and assets are \$10. C. E. Helmick, a locomotive engineer of La Grande, filed a petition in bankruptcy yesterday. The liabilities are \$683.55 and assets are nothing.

County Clerk "Moving."—Moving of the county clerk's office began in earnest today and early next week County Clerk Coffey expects to be settled in

his new quarters on the first and second floors of the south end of the courthouse. His own private office and filing cases, which are not in constant use, are being moved today. The office will remain open throughout the moving with the exception of the recording window, which may be closed temporarily when the movers reach that department.

Equity Cases Settled.—Assistant United States District Attorney R. R. Johnson, in the federal court this morning, notified Judge Bean of settlements made in two equity cases. Turner brothers, proprietors of a mill and lumber yard at Merrill, were sued for \$197, the price of wood purchased from Herbert Davis, of near Merrill, who cut all the wood from a homestead claim, and then refused to prove up the claim. Compromise was made in this case of \$200 and costs, and judgment by consent was given. Martin brothers, proprietors of a grist mill at the same place, purchased 250 cords of wood from Davis. The government got after them, too, suing for \$875. Martin brothers submitted an offer of settlement by paying \$490 and costs, and this offer was accepted.

Assaults Husband Beat Her.—Testimony of Laura A. McIntosh in divorce proceedings against A. M. McIntosh before Circuit Judge Morrow this morning developed the fact that her husband beat her after charging that she abstracted 50 cents from his pocket one night. Other uncontested divorce complaints heard this morning were Margaret E. vs. John L. Minor, Edith vs. John Walker, Herman F. vs. Minnie C. Lange, Elaine vs. Charles W. Gilmore, Ethel vs. J. M. Hundley, May vs. Armen Buttkofer, H. W. vs. Jessie Ogle.

Board Members Sued Themselves.—Two appointments on the city water board, two on the health board and one on the park board were filed in the city auditor's office yesterday by Mayor Rushlight. T. B. Wilcox and W. B. MacKay were appointed to succeed themselves for four years on the water board. Dr. A. W. Smith and Dr. R. J. Chipman were reappointed for three year terms and Carl Stoll was reappointed for four years on the park board.

Dr. Hinson Y. M. C. A. Speaker.—The final noon meeting in a series extending over three weeks will be held tomorrow at the Young Men's Christian Association and will be addressed by Dr. W. B. Hinson. Dr. Hinson and Dr. J. Q. A. Henry have been the speakers at all of these meetings and the attendance has been large from the start. The meeting tomorrow will be held at 12:30 o'clock and will be open to all men.

It is not believed they will succeed, but their strength doubtless will be sufficient to greatly embarrass the Saloni ministry, and possibly will force its resignation.

Two Brothers Have Remarkable Meeting One Supposed Other 3500 Miles Away

(Special to The Journal.)

Bend, Or., Jan. 24.—That this world is not so big as it sometimes seems was shown by a remarkable incident here a few days ago, when brothers who had not seen or heard from each other in eight years were reunited.

Eight years ago Steve Combs left home in Wilkesboro, N. C., and came west. He wandered about, finally coming to Bend in November. He left at home a younger brother named Bryan,

and so far as known to him Bryan was still in the tarheel state. But the younger man had, too, felt the call and had set out toward the setting sun. Steve was cutting cordwood near town, and near him a crowd of men were logging. He casually strolled over to the logging camp. There he saw his brother Bryan, whom he supposed to be 3500 miles away.

Both were influenced to come to Bend by reading literature issued by one of the transcontinental railroads.

CHIEF AND 18 FIREMEN HURT IN LOS ANGELES

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Los Angeles, Cal., Jan. 24.—Fire Chief Archibald J. Ely, is in a serious condition at a hospital, and 18 of his firemen are suffering from minor injuries that attended their victory over a fire that almost totally destroyed the Hotel Brennan, in Main street, and threatened to spread through the downtown business section. Ely, while leading his men through the smoke filled hallways of the building, breathed poisonous gases and was overcome.

Doctors at the hospital issued a bulletin early today stating that he was unconscious, but that his lungs are seared and there is danger of pneumonia. He also sustained a sprained back and many bruises. Of the 18 firemen hurt, a majority were overcome by smoke, and although several were severely hurt, all will recover.

Increased Veteran's Pension.

Washington, D. C., Jan. 24.—The committee on pensions has reported favorably a bill by Representative Lafferty to increase the pension of Civil war veteran Samuel C. Haynes of Portland from \$20 to \$50.

UNWRITTEN LAW STILL GOOD EXCUSE IN TEXAS

Fort Worth, Texas, Jan. 24.—B. J. Epling was acquitted yesterday of complicity in the killing of Al Boyce Jr., by J. B. Snead, millionaire banker of Amarillo. Epling was with Snead when the latter shot Boyce.

The result of the Epling trial is generally believed here to foreshadow the acquittal of Snead, who will go to trial soon on the charge of murdering Boyce.

Snead, several months ago, shot and killed Boyce's father, Al Boyce Sr. Following a quarrel over the elopement of Boyce Jr. with Mrs. Snead. Snead was acquitted.

Later he shot and killed the younger Boyce, and will base his defense on the unwritten law.

Tried to Solder Teeth.
