GREEKS DENOUNCE SHERIFF TOM WORD

At a meeting of Greeks held last night in the Commonwealth building, resolutions were adopted to show that the Greeks take exception to certain statements credited to Sheriff Tom Word in connection with the sheriff's recent declaration that Greek bootlickers in Portland connive to promote the social evil.

The resolutions, signed by Dr. S. N. Cheekos, chairman of the meeting, and James T. Pappas, secretary, are as follows:

Whereas, Tom Word, sheriff of Multnomah county, Oregon, in his capacity with certain newspapers of the city of Portland, caused certain articles to appear in the daily press and slandered the citizens of Portland of the Greek nationality, and

Whereas, said statements of the said sheriff were false and unwarranted; Therefore be it resolved, That we, the citizens of Portland of the Greek nationality here assembled, and vigorously protest against and condemn the action and conduct of the said sheriff, who will with the influence of his position falsely accuse and seek to humiliate and degrade people of a nation which has produced and is still producing great and honorable men.

Be it further resolved, That a copy of these resolutions be given to each of the daily papers of Portland and a copy be mailed to the governor of the state of Oregon and to the Greek minister at Washington, D. C.

Approved by the Greek citizens of Portland.

HUT OPEN PENDING INJUNCTION DECISION

Circuit Judge Morrow yesterday continued until February 1 the hearing of the injunction proceedings started by W. S. Swagart and W. Ryan, proprietors of the Hut roadhouse, to restrain Sheriff Word and other officials from interfering with the opening of the place as a soft drink and dinner place.

Swagart was arrested several days ago on a complaint charging him with maintaining a nuisance and a similar complaint was issued for Ryan. Circuit Judge McGinn last denied an application for a restraining order saying a writ for damages was the remedy for the owners. The injunction suit was then commenced. Sheriff Word's complaint was based on the previous reputation of the place. Attorney Stott, representing the owners, stated this morning that the place is open now.

Jeanne Rose Dupont Pleads Guilty.
Jeanne Rose Dupont, the French woman who has been held by the government on suspicion of conspiracy in connection with a naturalization case, was held into court before Judge Ben this morning and pleaded guilty. Attorney John Berry, one of six attorneys who answered the government's appeal, through "The Journal" for a special attorney who would take charge of her case, represented her.

About 700 faithful "Scots" gathered last night at the Masonic Temple to pay tribute to the memory of "Bobby" Burns on the one hundred and twenty-fourth anniversary of his birth. For 20 years this annual concert has been celebrated by Clan Macleay No. 122, O. S. C., assisted by the women's auxiliary.

Mrs. Ursula E. Young, Mrs. Donald McBride, Joseph P. Mulder and Maudwyn Evans were the local singers, who rendered the much loved Scotch ballads which were received by the hearty audience with the possessive pride and enthusiasm of "My Ain Folk Song." Mr. Evans was given an ovation at each stanza of "Star of Robbie Burns," in which his smooth, deep baritone carried the melody straight to the stout Scotch hearts.

Miss Agnes Pottage, who has danced her "Salor's Hornpipe" since she was a wee lass, was received with an affectionate "hand," and was recalled to a rousing encore. Carl Denton was the accompanist of the evening.

Colonel Robert A. Miller delivered an address on "Burns," which he prefaced with a word as to his fitness for the occasion, claiming descent from most all the races of the United Kingdom. But Colonel Miller apostrophized Burns as "the plowman poet, whose poetic genius is second to none the world has given us." 320 INSANE PATIENTS MARCH IN ORDERLY ROW TO WAITING CARS

Trainload of Unfortunates Is Started to New Branch Asylum at Pendleton.

Salem, Or., Jan. 25.—Without confusion 320 insane persons from the Oregon state hospital at this place were embarked on a special train at 7 o'clock this morning for shipment to the new branch asylum located at Pendleton. To facilitate loading the patients the eight coaches composing the train were run onto the siding extending to the asylum yards. In charge of trained attendants, the patients marched in an orderly line from the wards in the huge brick building to the waiting cars. The train left the yard promptly at 7 o'clock. There was no change of cars at Portland, the train going directly through to Pendleton.

The railroad company made a special rate for the transfer of the patients, and equipped the cars for emergency in case of sickness or accident.

N. Y. BANKER MAY PAY MILLION FOR CURE

(United Press Leased Wire.)
New York, Jan. 25.—Reply to a cable offering \$1,000,000 to Dr. Frederick Franz Friedman for the American rights to his alleged tuberculosis cure is not expected before next week by Charles E. Finlay, president of the Aetna National bank of New York. If his offer is accepted Finlay says he will give the cure to 100 patients to be chosen in New York, the first being Rex Paris, a son-in-law who is a sufferer from tuberculosis.

Finlay already has secured an option on an old hospital here and has announced his intention of setting aside several million dollars for the erection of sanatoriums where patients may receive the benefit of the latest discovery. If 95 per cent of the cases treated in New York recover, Finlay says he will pay Friedman \$1,000,000. Paris is at Saranac Lake, N. Y., in a critical condition.

Divorce Follows Agreement.

A decree of divorce was granted James F. Hazel from Hettie Hazel by Circuit Judge McGinn this morning after the case had hung fire for two months awaiting the agreement of the two concerning their children and property. The wife is to receive half of the property under the decree and the custody of the 16-year-old daughter. The three younger boys were left with the father. The divorce is the outcome of a religious mania on the part of the wife which made it impossible for the two to live peaceably together.

Wife Seeks John S. Creswell.
Mrs. John S. Creswell, of East Chicago, Ind., has written to the information department of the Portland Commercial club, for information that may lead to the tracing of her husband, who she believes, came out to Oregon some time ago, and has not since been heard from. Mrs. Creswell writes that the family, her husband and four little daughters, are anxious to hear from him. The matter has been turned over to the chief of police.

FAIR EXHIBITION PLANS INDORSED

Civic Bodies Consider Question; Differ as to Appropriation.

That Oregon should prepare exhibits for the 1915 exposition in San Francisco and San Diego, and at the same time prepare expositions of state products to be shown in Ashland and Portland, was agreed upon by committees representing the Chamber of Commerce, Commercial club, Ad. club, Rotary club, Realty Board, Manufacturers' association, Retail Merchants' association, Progressive Men's club, East Side Business Men's club, lumber manufacturers and the Oregon Exposition commission, meeting at luncheon this afternoon, in the Commercial club.

There was some disagreement of opinion as to the amount which should be appropriated. When W. J. Hofmann moved that the joint committee go on record as favoring a \$300,000 appropriation, W. J. Werlein moved an amendment that the amount of \$500,000 as set forth in Joseph's senate bill No. 1, be recognized as the appropriation desired by the committee. After considerable discussion, both motion and amendment were withdrawn.

At 6 o'clock the committees of the business organizations are to meet in the Commercial club with the ways and means committees of the house and senate and the exposition committee of the house. Tom Richardson presided over the meeting today, having returned from Oakland, Cal., for the purpose of attendance. Among those who spoke were Joseph N. Teal, Edgar B. Piper, George Cornwall, J. TAFT REDUCES FINE; SENTENCE COMMUTED

Richard Hynes' fine of \$2000, imposed by the local federal court when he was convicted of conspiracy to defraud the government out of public lands in Coos county, Ore., has been reduced by President Taft to \$100. Hynes was sentenced also to serve 30 days in prison as well, but the jail sentence was commuted by the president last night.

United States District Attorney John McCourt, who had investigated Hynes' condition and circumstances, recently reported to the department at Washington that Hynes is without financial resources, is sick and generally "up against the wall." Hynes is now living in Los Angeles.

Hynes was convicted in 1908 along with A. K. Edderly, who was sentenced to serve eight months in jail and pay a fine of \$5000. Edderly's prison sentence was later commuted and his fine was paid.

BOY "JUST COULD NOT KEEP FROM STEALING"

Juvenile Court Judge Gatens this morning sentenced John Morissette, 14 years old, to the state training school for 60 days. The boy, who was charged with stealing when in the company of Peter Peppi, the same age, was sentenced to the reform school as well, but was paroled and will be sent to the Frazier home for 60 days instead. Both boys recently broke into the retail window of the Barba Galata company's wholesale store at Union avenue and East Main street and took a watch, cash, tobacco, cigars and cigarettes of considerable value, besides doing considerable damage.

Another boy, 12 years old, who was connected with a South Portland gang, was sent to the Frazier home and will be given medical treatment for adenoids, which are believed to be the cause of much of his waywardness. Two other members of the gang were paroled, as this was their first offense. Several members of the gang are now in the reform school and the authorities are determined to break it up.

\$1500 CLAIM HELD AS MORAL OBLIGATION

Though the jury in the suit of Joseph S. Gill against the Columbia Contract company for \$3000 commission for selling the steamer Minnie Kelton returned a verdict of but \$1500, the company will be bound to pay the full \$3000, the jury held that \$1500 owed by Gill before he went into bankruptcy to Daniel Kern, president of the company, was a moral obligation and deducted it from the full amount asked. The company will be compelled to pay the president, Mr. Kern, the \$1500. Gill secured the sale of the steamer to E. H. Dodge for \$20,000. The company claimed he had an option on the boat, and not a contract as a broker.

TELL WORD JUST HOW TO RUN HIS OFFICE

Anonymous letters are pouring in on Sheriff Word in quantities written apparently by people who desire to aid him in his efforts to clean up the city and county, or by those who desire to secure personal revenge. The former letters often contain hints of information worth while and prove of little value, because the writers do not sign their names. The latter letters are of the nature of threats, and the sheriff desires people to give him all information possible, but he also desires that they put their diffidence or shame aside long enough to add their names to their letters.

OAKLAND TAKES PATTERN FROM COMMERCIAL CLUB

Tom Richardson returned this morning from Oakland, Cal., where he was instrumental in the organization of a commercial club along the lines of the organization here. "Oakland is going to gain for itself individuality from now on," said Mr. Richardson, "and will no longer bank in the shadow of San Francisco. This has been their ambition for some time and now they have taken hold of the work with real energy. The new commercial club was organized at a dinner attended by 500 of the most prominent and influential men of that vicinity and the club will start off in good shape."

INSURANCE BILL OBJECT OF FIGHT

Householders Believe Measure Would Cause Raise in Rates to Them.

A campaign has been organized against the insurance bill by property owners whose insurance cost would be increased by its enactment. A petition is being circulated among citizens of Portland today, asking the legislature not to pass senate bill 38 as introduced by Senator Hollis, because its effect would be pernicious, and its enactment would make the state a party to the so-called insurance trust of board companies.

Vigorous action against the bill was taken by the Hardware Men's association before adjournment yesterday. Each member was instructed to write, and call upon legislators personally, asking the defeat of the measure. A committee composed of G. W. Griffin, Eugene; Frank Spencer and Lott Pierce of Salem, was appointed to remain at the legislature fighting the insurance bill until final action upon it has been taken.

Though the measure contains 192 pages, W. B. Reese of the Columbia Trust company, who is leading the campaign against it, says that seven lines buried in the body of it—section 67, article (a), on page 83, account for the bill being introduced. These lines read: "Every property insurance company before it shall receive a license to transact the business of making insurance as an insurer in this state must file in the office of the insurance commissioner a copy of its rating schedule. Every such company and its agents shall observe said rating schedule and shall not deviate therefrom in making insurance until amended or corrected rating schedules shall have been filed in the office of the insurance commissioner."

A little further over the bill provides for an "equitable rating bureau," to be composed of five companies independent of each other. Mr. Reese says the mutuals and non-board companies are all in different lines so that an equitable rating bureau" would merely be the present board of underwriters which assume now to fix the insurance schedules. "The people of Oregon have paid \$13,500,000 in insurance premiums during the past five years and have received back \$5,000,000 in fire losses," said Mr. Reese. "This has meant a profit of \$8,500,000 to the companies. Of this business about 33 per cent was written by the mutual companies at approximately 60 per cent of the board rate, and about 20 per cent by others. The board rate is the highest rate, and the mutuals would be forced to write at a rate less than \$20,000,000 in premiums more than they received back as fire losses. That accounts for the anxiety to boost the rates and fix them by law. But "up against the wall" would be robbery of the people."

LA GRANDE MERCHANTS ENTERTAINED AT DINNER

Accompanied by the La Grande & Eastern Oregon line, 100 Portland members of the Oregon Retail Merchants' association, who attended the seventh annual convention of the organization, returned last night from Albany, where the convention was held this week. They made the journey in a special train, and were accompanied as far as Salem by the delegation from the capital city.

Following their arrival in Portland, the Eastern Oregon business men were guests of the Portland Commercial club at a dinner in the women's dining-room. The party broke up late in the evening, and today the delegates from the interior left for their homes.

George E. Johnson presided at the dinner, and covered were laid for 54. Of those who attended approximately 30 were from La Grande.

The delegates were met at the depot by a committee representing the club, and were escorted first to the Popper hotel, and then taken over to the club quarters, where a reception was held prior to dinner. Among those who spoke were W. M. Pierce, of Hot Lake; E. L. Meyers, of La Grande; C. M. Humphreys, of the La Grande Commercial club; R. Alexander, of Pendleton; Hy. Eilers, Portland, and C. C. CHINOOK STARTS SLIDE AND FLOOD EAST OF CASCADES

Thermometer Jumps to 51 at North Yakima After Three Weeks of Heavy Snow and Warm Wind Begins to Blow

(Special to The Journal.)
North Yakima, Wash., Jan. 25.—After three weeks of the heaviest snowfall in years in the Yakima and Kittitas valleys and the entire east slope of the Cascades, this valley was struck this morning by a chinook, which is taking the snow off the levels and starting slides on all three of the railroad crossings the Cascades.

The thermometer, which went to 42 yesterday afternoon and barely dropped to freezing last night, went to 51 degrees at 10:30 o'clock this morning and was rising rapidly. A warm wind is blowing up the Yakima valley from the southeast. Railroad men are preparing for floods on the lower levels in addition to dangerous slides in the mountains.

Spokane, Wash., Jan. 25.—With a light chinook wind blowing and the temperature continuing to rise, danger of slides and flood damage is growing serious throughout the country contiguous to Spokane.

Residents of Union Park, on the east side of the city, and in Peaceful Valley, on the west side, a hundred feet lower than the business section, fear a repetition of last spring's flood and are preparing to move into upper floors.

Flood danger is confronting Coles. The situation in several Palouse country villages is declared more serious than two years ago, when streets and first floors of buildings were inundated. The snow is more than two feet deep in many places and is melting rapidly, cutting rivulets of ever-increasing volume down the hillsides.

Many Mace and Burke, Idaho, people, frightened by slide hazard, are reported hastening out to Wallace, some leaving the hills altogether.

FRENCH DEFEAT MOORS IN MOROCCAN BATTLE

Mogador, Morocco, Jan. 25.—Three hundred Moors were today reported killed or wounded as the result of a battle between a large force of Moroccan rebels and a French expeditionary column, which the tribesmen attacked.

Wilson Visits Ellis Island.

New York, Jan. 25.—President-elect Wilson, Mrs. Wilson and a party of friends today visited Ellis Island and inspected every branch of the government's work there. Wilson and his family will be the house guests tonight of Mrs. Caroline Alexander of Hoboken, N. J.

Embarking on the tug Immigrant, Governor Wilson said he was going merely on a tour of inspection, and was not interested in any special case on the island. The inspection, he said, included the government's dining hall there.

Wilson and his party also went to the board of inquiry room, where Commissioner Williams disposed of seven cases in their presence.

Turner Merchant Bankrupt.

J. A. Simpson, a merchant of Turner in Marion county, filed a petition in bankruptcy with the federal clerk today. Liabilities are \$9943.44 and assets of \$6644 are named.

WRETCHED DEATH IS STRANGER'S LOT

Sick Man Builds Hut Near Amity, Starves, Freezes, Succumbs.

(Special to The Journal.)
Amity, Or., Jan. 25.—A man whose identity cannot be determined was found dead near here Thursday and after examination by the coroner turned over to undertaking parlors for burial.

The body was found in a secluded place in the woods near the creek, where the man had constructed a rude shelter and had, from all indications, spent some time prior to his death in a most terrible condition, as he had no food and scant clothing and shelter, and in addition to being perhaps starved was without doubt suffering from tuberculosis or some other fatal ailment when he was little more than a skeleton when stripped for burial. His feet showed evidence of having been frozen, and when found he had them wrapped in a gunnysack. He had no shoes but had an old pair of rubbers, which were used in the place of shoes.

A distinct trail led from the little shack to the creek, showing he had traveled back and forth considerably while in his last quarters. A bottle partly filled with water was found in the tent and a flour sack partly filled with oats was the only substance upon which he could have existed at all, even for a short time. A few other articles were found, a pair of small scissors, a razor, a small round pocket glass, a bit of twine, an O. W. R. & N. folder and a little red pepper and salt.

The man was 25 to 30 years old, about five feet 10 inches tall, had blue eyes, light brown hair with slight red or auburn tint, a short soft mustache and chin beard about the same color of the hair, a fairly full forehead with face tapering down to a small chin and peculiarly prominent lips, giving him the appearance of one of foreign birth.

The only marks found on his clothing were "W 12 W" and beneath it was printed with ink the words "No starch."
