

WELCOME AWAITS COMING OF FIRST HAMBURG LINER

Reception to Steamer of Oriental Service to Be Like Old Fashioned Fourth of July Celebration.

When the first ship of the Hamburg-American line enters the Port of Portland the welcome will be as cordial as an old fashioned Fourth of July celebration, according to plans that are being made by the business organizations of the city.

"We will certainly make the officers and crew of that first vessel realize that we are glad to see them and their ship," said Frank A. Freeman, cashier of the Lumbermen's National bank, who has been active in the campaign to secure direct steamship service with the Orient in the name of the Commercial, Ad and Progressive Business Men's clubs.

"And if anyone thinks that the service proffered by the Hamburg-American line is of little consequence they should read an article in the special commerce issue of the London Times," continued Mr. Freeman. The article referred to gives a bit of the company's history and reads as follows:

"The Hamburg-American line, the largest shipping company in the world, was founded in 1847, but its stupendous modern organization dates from the arrival in power of Albert Ballin, a young agent of a rival Hamburg firm, who in 1864 succeeded in ending the long period of ruinous competition and uniting the concerns. Since 1866 the capital has increased from \$2,500,000 to \$12,500,000, loans from \$1,500,000 to \$17,500,000, reserves from \$1,500,000 to \$5,500,000, and the tonnage from 65,000 to 1,025,000. In 1888 there were four services; there are now 66. Throughout the whole period Ballin has worked for expansion. The line has seized upon every technical improvement as well as every possibility of creating new services, and although the daring character of its activity seemed to expose it to special risks, for example in the crisis of 1907 and 1908, it claims to have weathered all storms better than most of its rivals. The size of its ships has grown steadily down to the launch last year of the Imperator, of 50,000 tons—and only the other day Herr Ballin announced a new transatlantic line. There is one feature of the Hamburg-American organization that deserves special mention. It has probably a better intelligence department than any other business anywhere, and is instantly informed upon every social and political movement in Germany and foreign countries."

"Our Countrymen in Favor of the Exposition," said the members of the legislature are convinced that not over \$100,000 should be appropriated, said Senator Perkins. "The bill has been with the committee for some time, but we have not taken action because the committee has lacked information."

Then Senator Perkins formally extended the invitation to the business committees to appear before the legislative committee.

Representative Abbott said he felt sure that if an appropriation of more than \$100,000 were made for exposition purposes, it would be the referendum. He added that he thought \$100,000 to \$200,000 would be plenty for the purpose.

Senator Hal D. Patton of Marion said the business organizations for Salem had voted in favor of a \$500,000 appropriation at the exposition but that he isn't going to vote for \$500,000 because he thinks it is more than is necessary.

In his address Senator Smith of Coos declared his belief that for every dollar spent for exposition purposes \$10 in actual cash returns will be realized. John P. Carroll spoke in behalf of the San Diego exposition.

After the meeting, Lee M. Travis, exposition commissioner from Eugene, hastened to the press to say if opposition appears itself to an adequate appropriation it will be from the Willamette valley and not from the cow counties.

GENERAL SICKLES MUST COVER SHORTAGE OR SUFFER ARREST

Grizzled Veteran Faces New Grief—Wife Attempts to Aid Him.

New York, Jan. 25.—Unless he makes restitution by Monday of \$23,467, alleged to have been misappropriated while he was chairman of the state monument commission, General Daniel E. Sickles, the Civil War hero and at one time minister to Spain, will be arrested. An order for General Sickles' arrest was granted today in Albany by Supreme Court Justice Rugg upon request of Attorney General Carmody, who has been trying for several months to secure a settlement of the indebtedness which has been outstanding for a long time.

It was the intention at first to place the veteran under arrest today, but because he is 82 years old and in poor health, it was decided to defer action until Monday, so that the possibility of his being looked up in the Tomb over Sunday would be avoided.

The original shortage amounted to over \$25,000, but his son and his wife from whom he has been separated for years, have made good \$5000 of this amount. Mrs. Sickles is endeavoring to sell her property in Spain to satisfy the remainder of the debt, but recently asked for more time to bring this about.

Sickles' first wife was the daughter of an Italian music master. Years ago Sickles discovered an affair between his wife and Philip Barton Key, U. S. district attorney in the District of Columbia, and a son of Francis Scott Key, author of "The Star Spangled Banner."

Sickles met Key on the street, drew a revolver and a Berlingier and shot him dead. He was acquitted by a jury and for a time was acclaimed a hero for "defending the honor" of his household. A few months later he forgave his wife and took her back to live with him.

The present Mrs. Sickles found life with the Civil War veteran unbearable many years ago. Attacks made on her character by the general recently drew from her son answering accusations that Sickles had for sixteen years supported a woman who is now the wife of a prominent New Yorker.

Sickles' Career Is Meritorious.
Daniel Edgar Sickles was born in New York city, October 20, 1825. He learned the printer's trade while a young man, later studied law and was admitted to the bar in 1849. He practiced law in New York, and was elected to the legislature in 1847.

He began his military career as a major of the Twelfth regiment of the New York State National Guard. He resigned as a corporation attorney in 1853 to become secretary of the American legation at London. He was a senator in 1857-58, and a member of congress from 1857 to 1861.

At the beginning of the Civil War, Sickles was appointed a colonel in the First regiment of United States Volunteers. In 1862 he was made a colonel of the Forty-second Infantry, regular Army, and was breveted a brigadier general in 1867 for gallant and meritorious service at the battle of Fredericksburg.

After the war, he was a member of the senate, senator T. L. Perkins, chairman ways and means committee, committee; Representative J. D. Abbott, chairman ways and means committee, house; Senator Hal D. Patton, Senator Ira S. Smith, Representative Jay H. Upton, chairman exposition committee, house.

The Fisher charges unproved and he was unanimously seated. The other two cases were then considered and a bitter debate began. The Democratic members fiercely attacked the methods by which they alleged Rinon and Alford had been elected, charging gross fraud, but their arguments were unavailing, however, and at 4 a. m. a vote was taken on a motion to sustain the contests. It resulted 28 to 28 and was lost, failing of a majority. Manson voted with the Democrats and Speaker Pratt with the Republicans.

Majority for Warren.
Thus Pratt, who was chosen speaker by Democratic votes, cast the vote which decided the issue against the Democrats.

The seating of the three Republican members makes it certain that United States Senator Warren will get a majority when the two houses vote on the senatorship next Tuesday. He will have a majority of one in the house and a majority of five in the senate.

The Progressives and Democrats declared tonight, however, that the fight is far from ended yet as they propose to bring the whole matter to the attention of the United States senate itself and demand that Warren's seat be declared vacant. With the Progressives and Democrats in control of the upper house of congress, they believe the Wyoming solon will be ousted.

would be made to draft a reply to the powers until the port of foreign minister is filled.

Enver Bey and his colleagues have so far been unable to get any one to accept the portfolio. Several of the most prominent and influential Ottoman statesmen have refused to place Mahmud Shekret Pasha, the grand vizier, in acting foreign minister. The new national assembly will not take up the problem of an answer to the powers until asked to do so by the port and

icksburg. For similar service at the battle of Gettysburg he was made a major general. Wounds received on Gettysburg field necessitated the amputation of his right leg. He was also awarded the Congressional medal of honor for his record at Gettysburg.

General Sickles was sent on a special mission to South America for the government, and was United States minister to Holland in 1866. He has held other federal portfolios, and has been officially decorated by the republic of France in recognition of his military and public service.

HOPE FOR PEACE IS NOT ABANDONED BY LONDON DELEGATES

London, Jan. 25.—Hope for speedy peace in the Balkans was greatly strengthened today by the failure of the Balkan peace envoys to terminate peace negotiations and by the declaration of the Turks that they believe the St. James palace conference would be resumed next week.

The Balkan delegates, called together by Dr. Daneff, the Bulgarian chief plenipotentiary, held a meeting late this afternoon, but it was unproductive of definite action, because the Montenegrins had not received instructions from Cetinje. It was understood that all of the other representatives of the allies were given blank instructions to act in accordance with their best judgments. They, therefore, had discretionary powers to break off negotiations and that they did not do so was regarded as promising for peace.

Meet Again Sunday.
The delegates stated that they planned to meet again tomorrow afternoon, when the Montenegrins hoped to have instructions similar to those given their associates.

The Turkish plenipotentiaries did not meet any of the Balkan delegates today and took no formal action of any kind, but statements by Reschid Pasha and Ferik Pasha were in effect that they believed the peace conference would be resumed early next week. The Constantinople reports that the new ministry had recalled the Turkish peace delegates lacked official confirmation to meet and Osman Nasimi Pasha said he knew of no such order.

Meet With Grey.
The ambassadors were in consultation with Sir Edward Grey at the foreign office until late tonight. They were making every possible effort to induce the Balkan envoys not to break off peace negotiations. It was said that the ambassadors obtained the promise of Dr. Daneff, A. Novakovich, the Serbian, and M. Venizelos, the Greek, that the armistice would not be terminated until the Turks made some kind of a formal reply to the joint note of the great powers.

In return for the allies' pledge not to resume the war until Turkey answers the powers, the ambassadors were authorized to promise that Europe would take most vigorous and prompt action to make a settlement on the basis of the demands submitted by the allies, including the cession of Adrianople and the Aegean islands.

VANCOUVER WILL RETAIN STATUS

AMERICAN GUNS IN MEXICO AID PEACE

Presence of Warships at Vera Cruz and Acapulco Have Wholesome Effect.

Washington, D. C., Jan. 25.—Consular and diplomatic reports from Mexico today indicated that conditions throughout the republic are improving, with the exception of a portion of the state of Morelos, where the rebels are still pillaging and burning property. The improvement in the southern section of the country is attributed to the arrival of the American warships Denver and Wheeling at Acapulco and Vera Cruz, respectively. The Wheeling reached Vera Cruz today and anchored off the city.

On representations from the manager of the Tlalustillo estate that bandits are menacing his property, the state department today instructed Ambassador Wilson to demand protection for this American plantation.

Consul Fletcher, at Chihuahua, reported that peace negotiations are progressing.

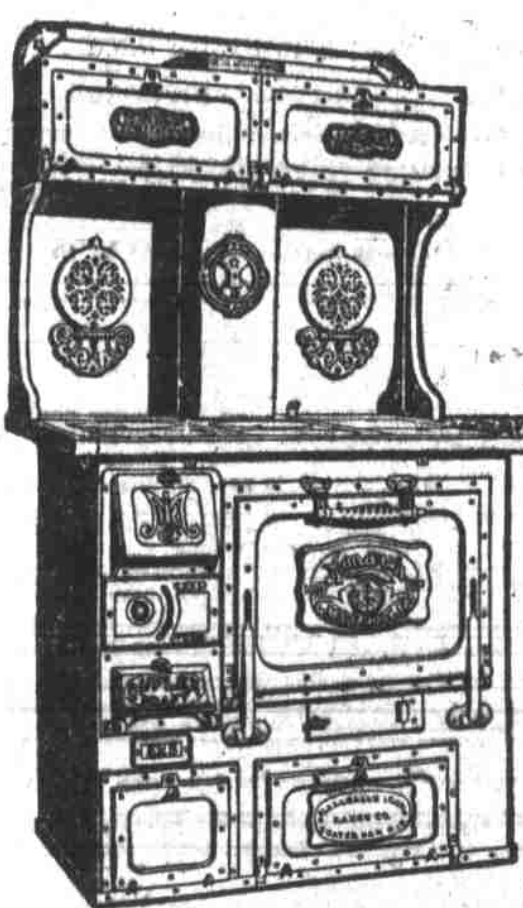

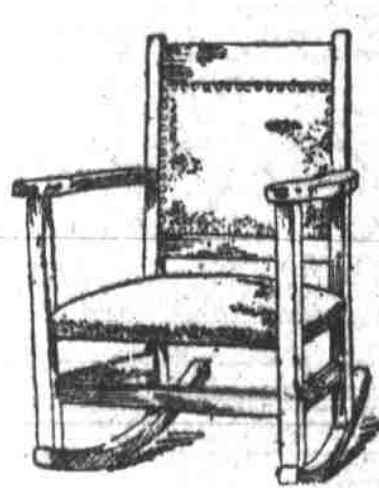

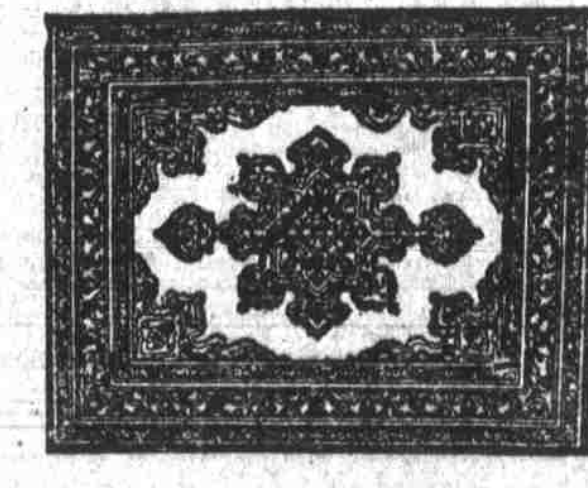
