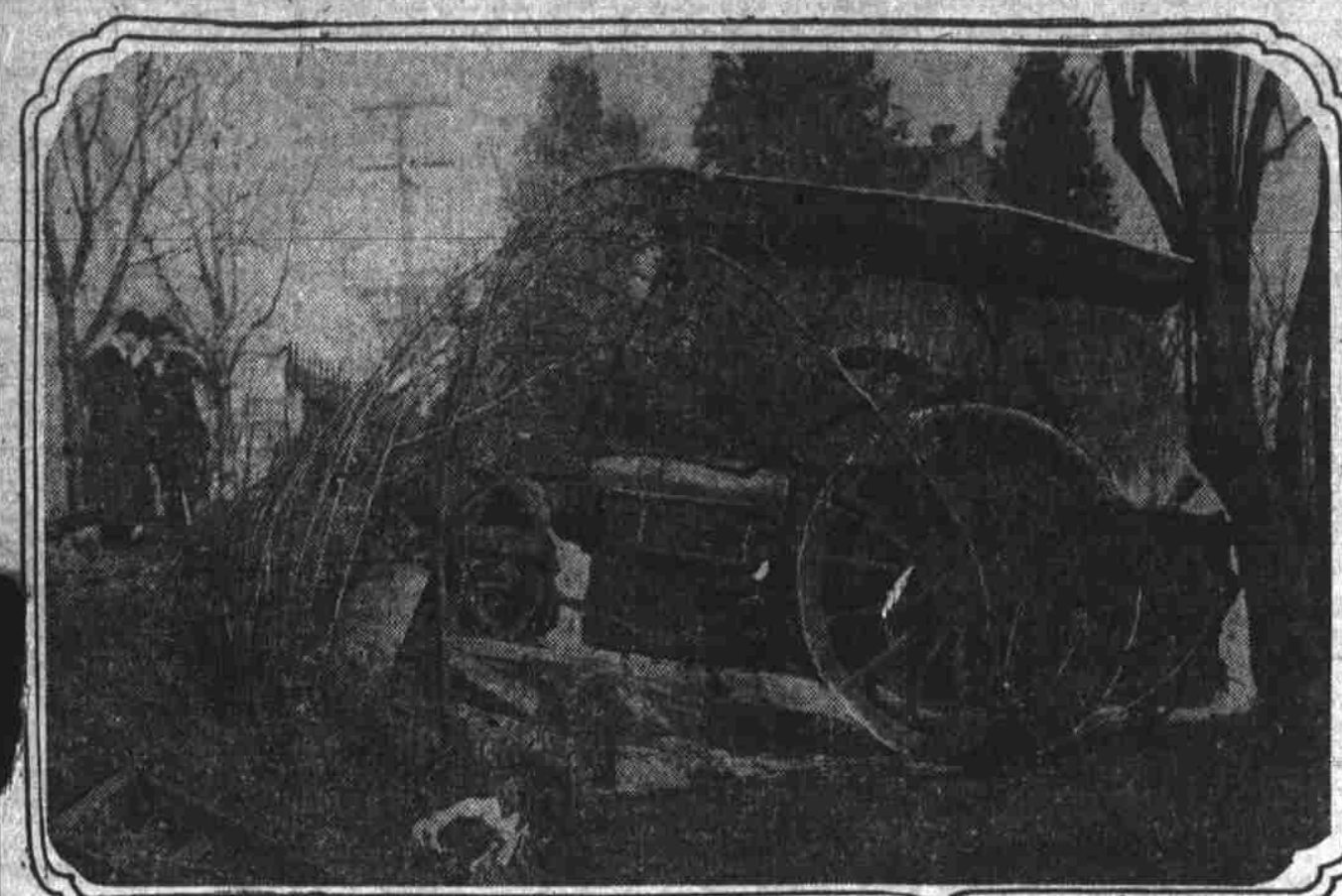


Ten-Ton Roller, Uncontrolled in Wild Race Down Hill**Engineer Saves Life by Jumping While Machine Speeds**

Steam Roller, Weighing Ten Tons, Lodged Against a Tree in the Garden of T. B. Wilcox's Home, After Dashing, Uncontrolled, Down Park Avenue From Ford Street. It Crashed Through a Concrete Sidewalk and a Fence, and Demolished an Arbor Before Coming to a Standstill. The Engineer Saved His Life by Jumping After the Machine Was Going Twenty Miles an Hour.



Out of control a big 10-ton Buffalo Pitts steam roller owned by the Pacific Bridge company, dashed down Park avenue from Ford street, crossed King street, crashed through a cement sidewalk and a fence and ended its mad flight in the garden of the home of T. B. Wilcox, after it had demolished an arbor and done other damage estimated at about \$50.

Save for the fact that the engineer, John Bentley, had thrown the engine into forward gear, the heavy roller undoubtedly would have done serious damage to the lawn and gardens of the Wilcox home.

Engineer Bentley had a narrow escape from death and saved himself only by leaping from the rear end of the roller after it had attained an estimated speed

of 20 miles an hour. The grade for a block above King street is not steep, otherwise he probably would have not escaped without injury.

The roller apparently was not much damaged outside minor breaks and the loss of a smokestack, which was jarred loose during its wild journey.

According to Bentley, the machine got beyond control just after he had turned into Park avenue. He was backing the machine down the grade. As the roller is not provided with brakes, the engineer was compelled to brake it by operating the engine in an opposite direction from which he was traveling.

This proved insufficient to hold the machine, and after trying in vain to stop it for a block, Bentley jumped, striking a telegraph post. He fell back

and the roller's front wheel just grazed his body.

Bentley is at a loss to explain the accident. He says the steam pressure was 125 pounds, and he had done everything possible to stop the roller before he jumped.

**E. H. Baker, Manager of the
Cleveland Plaindealer Vis-
itor in Portland**

"I'm not like the Englishman who can spend one day in a city and then go home and write a book about it, but after being in Portland just a few hours I can truthfully say that I like the city," said E. H. Baker of Cleveland, Ohio, this morning.

Mr. Baker is general manager of the Cleveland Plaindealer, and is a leading figure in the business and civic life of Cleveland. He has been in the newspaper business there since 1877, when he was employed on the old Cleveland Herald. Mr. Baker is accompanied in Portland by his son, E. S. Baker, editor and publisher of the Tacoma Tribune, whom he is visiting during a visit in the Pacific northwest.

"I have never been in this part of the country before," said Mr. Baker, "and I must say that I am much impressed with its wonder, considering the percentage of its land that is taken up and made productive. The real greatness of this section and of Portland as a city lies, I think, in the possibilities of the future. The resources seem to be practically unlimited."

It is to be hoped that Portland will look to the development of manufacturing industries. I have heard that there is the necessary iron ore and coal hereabouts for the making of steel. Steel mills would add greatly to the prosperity of the city. In one mill in Cleveland 10,000 men are employed. Ten thousand men employed means an additional 50,000 population, and population is what counts, providing there is business to support it.

"Portland will doubtless profit greatly by the opening of the Panama canal. On the Great Lakes we have opportunity to see the workings of water transportation, and it is surprising what low rates a navigable waterway makes possible."

Mr. Baker said that eastern interests feel confident that President-elect Wilson will inaugurate no new policies which will be detrimental to the best interests of the country.

"Mr. Wilson wants a revision of the tariff," said Mr. Baker, "because he feels that the tariff as it now stands is as much of a trust, in its way, and as harmful to the best interests of the country as is the so-called 'money trust.' I am satisfied, however, that Mr. Wilson will handle the tariff question and all other questions in a careful, conservative manner."

Mr. Baker will return to Tacoma tonight, and may visit in Portland again before returning to his home.

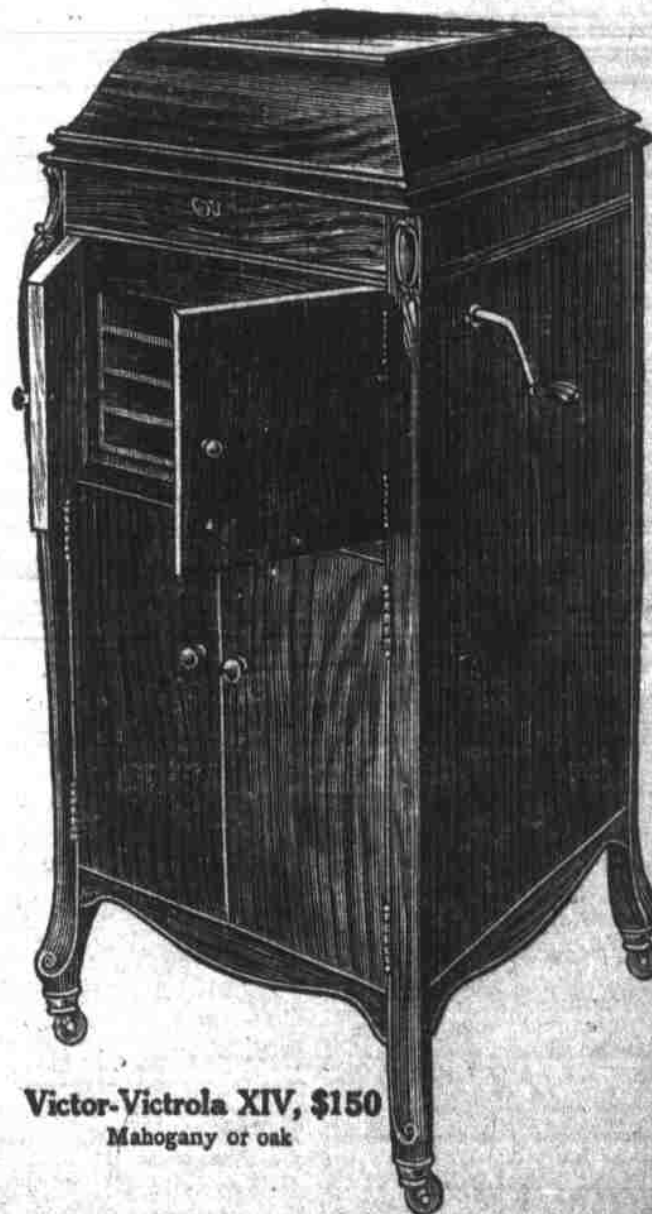
