Picture of White Salmon Power Plant

The first picture of the 25,000 horsepower hydro-electric plant of the Northwestern Electric company at White Salmon will be shown during a stereopticon-illustrated address before the Sons of Jove at luncheon tomorrow on the second floor of the Hotel Multnomah. The speaker will be J. H. Manning, the contractors' superintendent of the plant that is now 90 per cent completed. The high tension transmission line has been installed between White Salmon and Camas, a distance of 60 miles, and is to be completed shortly. The plant is situated on the banks of the Lewis and Clark river, a distance of 10 miles. The White Salmon plant is the first unit of the extensive plan of power development and use of the Northwestern Electric company. The Sons of Jove is an organization of men engaged in electrical engineering and other lines of business.

Howard Wins Divorce.—A divorce was granted John E. Howard, president of the Oregon Cat club, which recently closed a successful cat show in the Meier & Frank store, from Bessie T. Howard. Howard had charged that Mrs. Howard was guilty of a statutory crime with Lewis Forbes, an employee on their Marion county farm. Judge McGinn caused the complaint to be amended and the charge made cruel and inhuman treatment. Mrs. Howard was given an endorsement policy in her name which matures in a year and Howard was ordered to pay the premiums on the policy until maturity. In a cross complaint Mrs. Howard failed to prove counter charges.

Leaves Home With Baby.—While E. True, 287 North Nineteenth street, as asleep last night, his wife dressed herself and baby, left the home and took the baby to her mother's home. A note was left her husband, in which the woman stated she proposed seeking employment and would return when her husband could show more appreciation of her. The husband is at sea for an explanation of her actions, for he says they had no trouble. Everything appeared harmonious in the home, he declares. She is 27 years old.

Caught Thief in Act.—While C. Miller was trying to break into a butcher shop last night at Thirteenth and Washington streets he was manufacturing evidence upon which to break into the city rockpile. Special Officer McKay caught the man in the act. This morning in the municipal court a plea of guilty was entered, whereupon the judge imposed a sentence of 360 days on the rockpile. Miller said he intended stealing butter, which he would sell in the North End. He was recently released from Kelly Butte rockpile, where he served a term of 360 days for larceny.

Woman Wins Divorce.—On the grounds of cruel and inhuman treatment, which has wrecked her health and at one time made her insane and an inmate of the asylum, Mrs. Newton secured a decree of divorce from Herman A. Newton yesterday morning. The original complaint made allegations which Circuit Judge McGinn declared were not fit to be heard and he ordered that the complaint be amended. Alimony of \$30 a month for a year was given Mrs. Newton and she was awarded the furniture which belonged to the couple.

Verdict for Defendant.—Holding that Fred A. Jacobs was negligent in allowing costly statutory to remain in the room where workmen were at work installing awnings, the jury in Circuit Judge McGinn's court, which heard the suit for \$300 by Mr. Jacobs against the Pacific Tent & Awning company, returned a verdict for the company yesterday morning. Two fingers of one figure in the state, "The Wrestlers" were broken by the workmen and Mr. Jacobs sued for the value of the statue.

Nelson was formerly a soldier and was discharged from the army with a clean record.

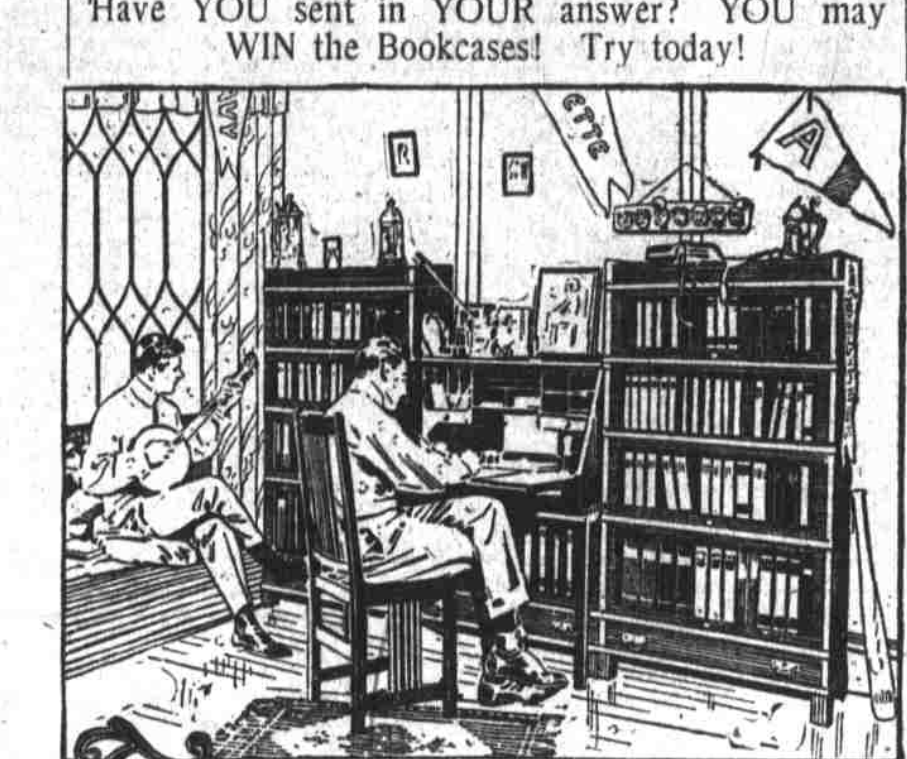
THIRTEENTH MAN WAS LUCKY, DESPITE HOODOO

Two weeks ago 13 men and three women were arrested in a lodging house over a saloon at 80 North Second street. The saloon and rooming house are operated by Henry Gallet and Louis Vincent. 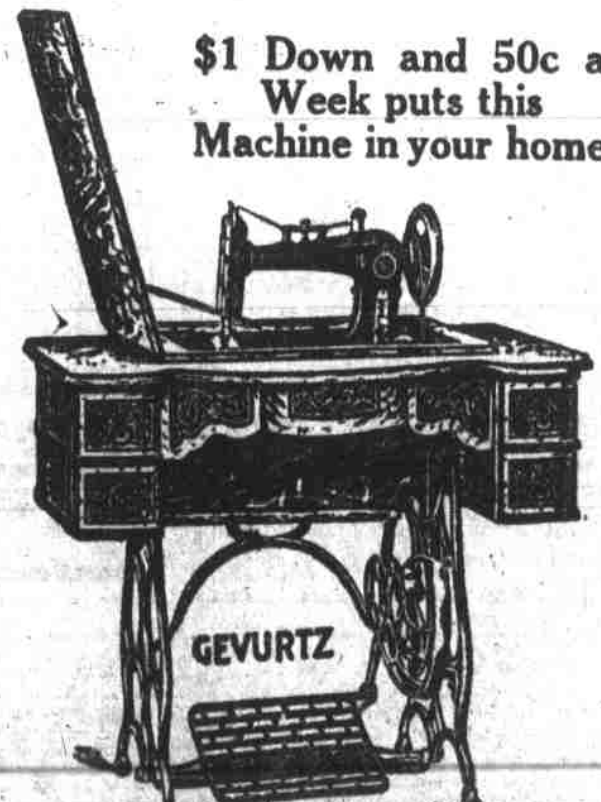
