Instructed Verdict for \$7000—An instructed verdict for a judgment of \$7000 was returned in Circuit Judge Kavanaugh's court yesterday in favor of W. E. Davidson, a broker, and against the Alameda Consolidated Mines company. Davidson purchased 1400 shares of stock in the company in December, 1911, of the par value of \$5, and the company later refused to transfer some of this stock, which Mr. Davidson desired to sell. Judge Kavanaugh held that the by-law under which this refusal to transfer stock was made was contrary to public policy and was null and void.

Boy Tramps Arrested—Lloyd Brown and Avery Dement, both 17 years old, were arrested this morning at 4 o'clock by Patrolman Maxwell for carrying concealed weapons. The boys were found near the tunnel on the Peninsula, where they had built a hobo camp, spending the night there. The pistols found in their pockets were .22 caliber. Both lads state they recently arrived from Caldwell, Idaho, making the trip in tramp fashion. The juvenile court took charge of them, a telegram being sent their parents, in which instruction is asked as to their disposal.

Motion to Quash Upheld—Holding that attorneys for Del V. Meagher, a member of the vice clique, should have appealed from the denial of a writ of habeas corpus by Circuit Judge Davis instead of beginning new proceedings, the supreme court yesterday upheld District Attorney Evans in his motion to quash the petition. The petition was filed when Meagher was held only as a witness against E. S. J. McAllister. Since that time Meagher has been indicted twice on charges arising from the vice scandal.

Marauder Still at Large—The police have as yet failed to find the marauder who entered the home of W. Bechman, 667 Glisan street, Wednesday night, kidnapped Mrs. Bechman, who was ill in bed, ransacked the room, and then got away through a window. Mr. Bechman, who was down stairs, when the attack was made, says that the marauder knocked his wife unconscious as soon as she screamed, and that it was necessary to call a physician to attend her. Patrolman Bales answered the call for the police.

City Treasurer at Jail Until 5 o'clock—City Treasurer William Adams wishes to announce that he will keep his office open tomorrow afternoon till 5 o'clock in order to accommodate employees of the city who would find it difficult to visit the city hall to cash their monthly pay warrants in the morning. The rest of the municipal offices will be closed, as is the usual custom Saturday afternoons.

Sentenced for Burglary—Chester Vandepool, under indictment for larceny from a building, was sentenced to an indeterminate sentence of from one to seven years in the penitentiary on his plea of guilty before Circuit Judge Morrow this morning. Vandepool twice broke into a building in St. Johns and stole a revolver and other effects from Thomas Peltier.

Symposium of Information on Election Laws Now Compiled by the City Auditor

For the benefit of the public generally, and more especially for prospective candidates, City Auditor A. L. Barbur has caused a symposium of information relative to the election laws to be compiled. He has also gathered data concerning the dates for registration, number of names required on nomination petitions and other useful facts.

The date of the approaching primaries, "is Saturday, May 3. Registration for the primaries begins March 15. The last day for registration for nominations may be filed is April 17. The last day for registration for the primaries is April 14. At both the primary and general elections the polls will open from 8 a. m. till 7 p. m. Formerly the polls on the primary election day were opened only half a day.

"The last day for candidates to file statements of expenditures will be May 18. Note—All candidates must file their declarations before circulating petitions and all candidates must file their acceptances with certificates of nomination."

"Candidates for any elective office must have been residents of the city for three years. The number of names required on a nominating petition for the office of councilman at large on the Republican ticket is 301, and these names must be selected from among 33 different precincts of the 164 inside the city limits."
