

FREE FEB. 6 NO MORE BILLS, 2 HOUSES AGREE

Third Week Finds 42 Senate Bills Through Senate and 56 House Bills Through the House; 13 Through Both.

(Staff Correspondence.)
Salem, Ore., Feb. 1.—Continuing to break the records of legislative speed, the third week of the session finds 42 senate bills passed by the senate and 56 house bills passed by the house, with 13 bills that have gone through both houses approved by the governor, 20 have been vetoed.

The above figures do not take into account the vetoed bills of the last session, several of which have been passed by two-thirds vote and have become laws in spite of the governor's objections.

In the house the total number of bills presented is 433, where two have been voted down, 15 have been withdrawn and 16 indefinitely postponed, in addition to the 56 that have passed. In the senate 10 bills have been defeated on roll call, eight withdrawn, 12 indefinitely postponed, and 42 passed, out of 210 introduced.

Half of the session is over, unless the legislators of 1913 are more patriotic than usual and insist upon staying longer than the 60 days for which they are paid. This 40 days will expire February 11, on a Friday. Usually there is such a rush at the last that the session runs over Saturday and into the following Sunday morning. Despite the good start made, the great bulk of work is to be done in the remaining half of the session.

Both houses have agreed to forbid the introduction of bills after the twenty-fifth day of the session, except upon consent of three-fourths of the body in which a bill is offered. This may or may not prove to be an effective bar to new bills in the last days. All will depend upon how far the members will allow "courtesy" to govern them in allowing the introduction of each other's bills.

February 6, next Thursday, will be the twenty-fifth day and most of the members are trying to get bills in shape to present by that time, so they will not have to take chances on the possibility of being shut out at the later time.

FINLEY WANTS HOUSE TO KILL HATCHERY BILL

Salem, Ore., Feb. 1.—"If the legislature passes S. B. 265, which appropriates \$3000 for a fish hatchery on Spring Creek, it will simply tie the game commission's hands to the detriment of all interests," declared State Game Warden William L. Finley. The bill has been passed in the senate over the governor's veto.

"The commission has already determined upon the building of a trout hatchery in Klamath county, and on Spring Creek if this site can be secured," said Mr. Finley. "The commission has been working for the past year and a half to secure land on Spring Creek. There is but one site of 40 acres there which is suitable for a hatchery. This tract has been allotted to Indians and we must get possession of it through the federal government."

"If this bill is passed, which is entirely unnecessary, it will tie the hands of the commission and prevent the commission, in case this piece of land can not be secured, from building a hatchery in any other site in Klamath county."

"If the Spring Creek site cannot be secured or if an exorbitant price is asked the commission desires the right to seek another location equally as good as Spring Creek."

SANITARY INSPECTOR STRONGLY INDORSED

Salem, Ore., Feb. 1.—Behind the bill creating the office of state sanitary inspector, which was introduced by Senator Carson by request, is the indorsement of the State Federation of Labor, of the city health board of Portland, the State Master Plumbers, the Journeymen Plumbers of Portland, the Portland market inspector and plumbing inspector.

It is asserted that the office would be made self-supporting from the license inspection fees named in the bill. John C. McCue of Portland has been urging the passage of the measure. It provides that the state sanitary inspector shall have offices in Portland and receive \$3000 a year. A total appropriation of \$10,000 is made by the bill.

DESERTED WIVES MAY LOSE SUPPORT

Unofficial announcement was made yesterday by Circuit Judge Morrow that he believed the present non-support law unconstitutional and the announcement caused a stir among women who are being paid monthly or weekly amounts by their husbands under orders of County Judge Cleaton. The opinion was given by Judge Morrow in habeas corpus proceedings instituted by Joseph Turner, a river pilot under bonds to support his wife.

Judge Cleaton has taken the matter up with District Attorney Evans and the law is being thoroughly investigated to determine its constitutionality. The objection to it is that no jury is required, the husband appearing before Judge Cleaton and receiving sentence from him without a jury. Judge Cleaton holds that the law is unconstitutional and is proceeding on those grounds. The legislature is to be asked to pass a law making non-support an extraditorial offense and to give the county court broader scope in handling the cases.

Dynamite Postoffice Safe.

Live Oak, Cal., Feb. 1.—Securing \$300 in cash and \$200 worth of dynamite, a gang of robbers dynamited the postoffice safe here early today. Postmaster West Hauke was awakened by the explosion and soon had an armed posse on the trail. A window in the postoffice was forced with a jimmy.

S. B. 210, by Carson—Providing district for stock at large in eastern part of Marion county.

LIMIT AUDITORIUM COST TO \$600,000

East Side Clubs Adopt Resolutions Asking City to See People's Wish Respected.

Determined if possible to keep the entire cost of site, building and equipment of the proposed auditorium within the \$600,000 mark, members of the Greater East Side Association of Improvement Clubs last night adopted resolutions, calling upon Mayor Rushlight and the city council to keep the expenditures of the auditorium within that figure.

It was agreed at the meeting that if the market block site is used, as anticipated, it should be paid for, and the cost of the site is placed at \$200,000. This would bring the expenditure to \$400,000, figuring \$600,000 for the building and the east side interests at the meeting estimated that the total cost of the auditorium, unless a limit is placed will amount to a \$1,000,000.

It was the sense of the meeting that inasmuch as the people have voted on the question twice, their wish to limit the expenditure, should be complied with.

Dr. Fenton of Laurelhurst was made chairman of a committee of 12 empowered to petition the Portland Railway, Light & Power company for a new street car line on Third, Third-ninth street, running north and south from Woodstock to Alberta. The committee was further empowered to take the matter up with the state railroad commission if the local street car company does not make desired action.

The meeting was well attended, and several matters of minor importance were considered.

DEBATERS OF THE DALLES TO MEET FOREST GROVE

Forest Grove, Ore., Feb. 1.—The Dalles high school will meet the Forest Grove high school in debate in this city tonight. The affirmative team of this city will go to the Dalles, and the negative team of Forest Grove will debate the affirmative team of the eastern Oregon town. This debate will practically decide the district championship, as the Dalles is the strongest team left in the league. The Dalles has defeated Oregon City, and Forest Grove won from McMinnville, which practically brings the question of which team shall win the pennant down to the contest tomorrow night.

The Dalles, Feb. 1.—The negative debating team of the local high school, consisting of Wilma Donnell, Dede Wolff and Ronald Lewis, will meet the Forest Grove affirmative debaters in the Congregational church here tonight, and the affirmative team will go to Forest Grove to debate with the negative team of that place the same night. The question will be: "Resolved that the district judges should be abolished and that the president of the United States should be nominated and elected by direct vote of the people." Both the affirmative and negative teams of the Dalles high school defeated the Oregon City team in the same question last Saturday night.

POLICE MISS RIOT TWO BLOCKS AWAY

Four members of the I. W. W. were discharged and the police criticized this morning in the municipal court by Judge Tazwell when the four men were tried for assaulting Henry Tudor and John Jordan at Third and Couch streets. Tudor is connected with railroad construction work at Eugene and was taking 15 men to the depot Saturday at midnight. Jordan was one of the men. James F. Morgan, James Edwards, Michael Lukiwani and John Burns were the defendants. Morgan pleaded that he was not in the crowd, being asleep in the I. W. W. hall on Davis street. Other witnesses testified to this statement. Burns said he saw no fighting, even though he was present all the time. Frank Cady said he saw no fighting. Tudor and Jordan were positive the four men assaulted them. Sergeant Roberts was two blocks away. He testified the men were fighting. None of the defendants were working, claiming to be out on strike.

"Morgan has established an alibi and is therefore dismissed," said the judge. He was undecided whether or not the three other men charged committed the assault.

TAZWELL CONTEST NOW SET FOR FEBRUARY 18

The hearing of the contest between George Tazwell and George N. Davis over the circuit judgeship of department 4 is to be taken up by the supreme court on February 18, as the case has been advanced in the docket. The case was appealed from Judge Morrow's decision quashing the motion for a recount. Attorneys Henry St. Raymond and Bradley A. Ewers will appear for Judge Tazwell and A. E. Clark will present the arguments for Judge Davis.

Another Deputy Authorized.

The county commissioners this morning authorized Constable Weinberger to employ an additional deputy temporarily to handle increased work of the office due to all preliminary criminal hearings now being heard before the justices of the peace. H. P. Hunter has been named for the position and the salary was placed at \$30 a month. The legislature has been asked to increase the number of deputies allowed the constable. The commissioners also allowed Sheriff Word two special deputies for not more than 90 days at \$100 a month for special work.

Steamer Is Disabled.

Manila, Feb. 1.—The British steamer King Chow is reported to be disabled to sea and helpless off Luzon. She has 200 passengers aboard. The cruiser Cincinnati has been ordered to her assistance.

DANISH LINE MAY STOP HERE

Olof Jerner, Representative of Copenhagen Company Is Looking Over Conditions.

Olof Jerner, representative of the East Asiatic Steamship company of Copenhagen, Denmark, is in Portland investigating the feasibility of making Portland one of its ports of call for one of its several steamship lines.

Mr. Jerner called on the Chamber of Commerce this morning and secured a lot of data relative to the commerce out of the port and the possibilities for extension. He is also investigating possibilities for extension of trade relations between this section of the country and Europe. Mr. Jerner represented his company for years in the orient and hence is well acquainted with trade conditions there.

The East Asiatic Steamship company is one of the largest organizations of its kind in Europe and operates a number of regular lines. Representatives of its freight liners in the steamer Arden, which sailed from this port December 26 with a cargo of about 280,000 bushels of wheat.

Other freighters operated by this company are the Anambra, Bandon, Bintang, Carma, Cambodia, Cathey, Champany, Indien, Pagan, St. Croix, St. Jan, St. Thomas, Samol, Siam, Sibirien and Tranquebar, besides a number of smaller vessels. The company is also interested in a large salmon cannery in Alaska.

JUDGES TO DRAW LOTS FOR CASES

Lawyers Will Have to Determine From Clerk Where to Appear.

New cases filed with County Clerk Coffey this morning will be assigned to the five judges of the circuit court by a drawing which will be held Monday morning. Each morning in the future the cases filed the previous day will be thus assigned.

This new order of procedure was decided upon at a meeting of the judges last night at which plans were made for the elimination of the presiding judgeship. One judge will be presiding judge in name in the future for two months at a time, but his only duties will be the handling of special proceedings such as injunctions, mandamus and habeas corpus petitions and naturalization and selection and distribution of juries and grand juries at the opening of each term.

Circuit Judge McGinn will hold the presiding judgeship for the coming two months. Owing to the fact that the jurors for the circuit court have been notified to appear in Circuit Judge Morrow's courtroom on next Monday morning Judge Morrow will attend to the jury for the February term.

The drawing for new cases will be made by means of a card system on which the numbers filed will be kept. The numbers will be placed in a box and each judge will draw in rotation until all are assigned. Attorneys will be obliged to ascertain from the county clerk's office to which court his case has been assigned and all motions and other matters connected with a case will come before that judge. Each department will have a motion book and trial docket.

Judge Morrow has set each Saturday as the day for motions and other judges with the exception of Judge McGinn expected to do the same. Judge McGinn refused to set any definite date but declared that lawyers will have to get matters filed by the meeting of the judges at the opening of court each morning and afternoon.

Default divorce cases will be heard by the judge who draws them whenever they desire. This does away with the Friday divorce day. The question of the necessity of official reporters to take testimony in cases in which personal service has been secured on defendants in these default cases was raised by Judge McGinn who declared he would not receive one in his department but would leave it to the plaintiff.

Cases on hand from January 2, 1910, to January 28, 1913, have been divided among the various judges and the number of these back cases is placed at about 2500. In many cases the parties have agreed and these cases will be dismissed. From January 2, 1912, to January 28, 1913, there were 3771 civil cases filed.

VISIT OF JAPANESE HAS HAD ITS EFFECT

December 17 the Tokyo and Yokohama members of the Japanese Commercial Commission of Japan, who toured the United States in 1909, held their third annual meeting in Tokyo. Notice to this effect was received in a letter to the Portland Chamber of Commerce today, stating that the opinion was expressed at the meeting that the visit has materially contributed to the consolidation of the bonds of amity and good understanding and the development of trade relations between the two nations, whose welfare and prosperity will always be the object of their sincere solicitude. The Portland chamber figured prominently in the entertainment of the Japanese visitors.

Seattle Judge Visits Court.

Superior Judge A. W. Prater of Seattle, who is also at the head of the juvenile court of that city, paid a visit to the local juvenile court this morning and was much interested in the cases which were heard. Judge Prater is in Portland on a visit of business and pleasure. This afternoon he is engaged in transacting private business and this evening he will attend a meeting of the Shriners with a large delegation of Seattle Shriners who are en route to attend.

U. P. S. P. MEN MEET WITH WICKERSHAM

Dissolution Plan Arranged to Sell Central Pacific to U. P. for \$102,000,000.

Washington, Feb. 1.—Stockholders of the Union Pacific and Southern Pacific railroads conferred here today with Attorney General Wickersham regarding the order of the supreme court for dissolution of the merger of the two corporations. Mortimer L. Schiff, Judge Robert S. Lovett, Frank A. Vanderbilt, Maxwell Everts and R. S. DeForest participated in the conference.

New York, Feb. 1.—After two months of figuring and estimating, the Union Pacific and Southern Pacific have agreed upon a plan of divorce by which the Central Pacific main line is sold to the Union Pacific for \$102,000,000 and all joint representation of the two systems is discontinued.

Judge Robert S. Lovett, chairman of the executive committee of the Union Pacific, has issued a statement, explaining the dissolution plans of the systems. He says in part:

"When the attorney general's position respecting the disposition of the Central Pacific was made known, thereby showing a possible conflict of interest with respect to that property, the chairman and directors of the Union Pacific informed him that of course they could not act further for the Southern Pacific and immediately resigned from the Southern Pacific so that the latter board could be composed of directors not interested in the Union Pacific."

"This occurred on the 13th instant. Today the remaining joint officers in New York resigned from one system or the other and circulars changing the joint agencies and appointing separate commercial agents were issued, taking effect tomorrow, thus completing the elimination of all joint officers and agents. Matters of official position as yet vacated have not been filled as yet, the duties thereof devolving temporarily upon other officers."

The plan for the separation of the Union Pacific and Southern Pacific, to which Attorney General Wickersham has agreed, in addition to providing for the sale of the main line of the Central Pacific to the Union Pacific in exchange for \$80,000,000 Southern Pacific stock, between \$16,000,000 and \$18,000,000 in cash and \$6,000,000 in bonds of the Southern Pacific subsidiary, also provides for the sale of \$46,000,000 of Southern Pacific stock, which will remain in the Union Pacific's treasury to Union Pacific stockholders at 97 1/2%.

The distribution of this stock to Union Pacific stockholders will be by underwritten, but the sale in effect will give Union Pacific approximately \$44,000,000 in new money, which will finance its requirements for some time to come.

RYAN TO BE FREED; BOND IS APPROVED

Chicago, Feb. 1.—The release of Frank M. Ryan, one of the International Association of Bridge and Structural Iron Workers, one of the 33 union men convicted of unlawfully transporting dynamite, was ordered this afternoon by the United States circuit court of appeals here.

United States District Attorney Charles W. Miller, of Indianapolis, approved the \$70,000 bond offered for the release of the labor leader. Ryan will be released from the government prison at Fort Leavenworth, Kan., tomorrow.

DR. WORKS "BROTHER" TRICK ON POLICEMEN

After escaping from Deputy Juvenile Officer Fisher by pretending that his brother was wanted and could not be found, J. J. Jensen, a physician with offices in the Lafayette building, slipped through an open window to the roof of a building next door and disappeared.

He was sought on a warrant charging him with contributing to the delinquency of a 4-year-old girl. Officer Fisher was loth to arrest Jensen when he declared it was his brother who was wanted and stood where he could see into all of the offices and the hall waiting for the supposed brother.

The window in an inner office into which Jensen stepped was open and just out of Fisher's sight and Jensen made his getaway without trouble. Jensen is being sought by officers from the juvenile court and sheriff's office.

MAKES ATTACK ON THE NAVAL MILITIA

Shepherd Causes Amusement for Legislative Committee.

George S. Shepherd, one of the principal witnesses before last night's session of the state senate committee appointed to investigate the Oregon Naval Militia, furnished considerable amusement for the committee members during the progress of his testimony.

Mr. Shepherd related his grievances against various members of the naval and the National Guard organizations. He gave particular attention to A. J. Capron of the naval militia, who was a member of the board of inquiry which investigated a former controversy between Shepherd and Captain Blain. Shepherd voiced an objection to naval militia officers being allowed pay while on cruises, and when Capron called his attention to the fact that the law provides for such pay, Shepherd said that the law was the work of Capron and his associates.

TO DEVELOP TIMBER PROPERTY, TILLAMOOK

Russell Hawkins, local manager of the Whitney company, Ltd., returned last night from a company meeting at Detroit, Mich. The Whitney company is one of the largest timber holders in the state. Its holdings being confined principally to Tillamook county.

The company will begin development of its properties on Tillamook bay as soon as the bay is opened to ocean going vessels of draft that will enable shipment of lumber in large cargoes. It is expected that this will be accomplished within the next two years, as the federal government and the Port of Bay City, comprising Tillamook county, will appropriate \$314,000 for this purpose the government to pay half and the port half of the cost of improvement.

Mr. Hawkins says he found the lumber market in the east in excellent shape, southern pine being worth \$4.50 more per thousand feet today than a year ago, and northern or white pine worth \$2 more per thousand than a year ago.

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MERCHANT KLINGER SLAIN BY ROBBERS, JURY FINDS

Seattle, Wash., Feb. 1.—Ernest A. Klinger, merchant, whose body was found in Elliott bay early this week, was murdered and robbed, according to the verdict of the coroner's jury, which is on record here today.

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ARRESTED WHILE GOING TO SEE SWEETHEART

Charged with forging checks for about \$200 in all under five different aliases, Lewis K. Siege, 23 years old, of 1440 Rodney avenue, was arrested last night by Special Deputy Sheriff Foster and F. A. Dillon, a private detective, representing the bank on which the checks were made out. Siege was on his way to call upon his sweetheart when captured. He has confessed in part and been identified by those who cashed his checks. One instance he was introduced to a grocer by a man who mistook him for another, and the man who introduced him was surprised to find he had made the mistake. This man has made good the checks for which he was responsible. Siege would make small purchases and secure change for the checks.

SHOW WINDOWS CUT; POLICE INVESTIGATING

A large number of windows in stores in the downtown district have been cut with a diamond or some sharp instrument during the early morning hours of the past few days according to a report of Patrolman Dalrymple. In several instances the glass has been cut clear through and in other instances the glass has only been badly scratched. Among the places damaged this morning were J. K. Gill's, the Crown jewelry store at 151 First street and the office of the Northern Pacific Railroad company, Third and Morrison streets.

Whether attempts were made to burglarize these places or whether it is the work of vandals has not been determined. The police are keeping a sharp lookout to prevent further damage.

HEAVY REINFORCING TRUNK MAINS PLANNED

The city water board at its monthly meeting today ordered the engineer of the water department to take steps for the construction of heavy reinforcing trunk mains on both the low and high gravity systems of the East Side. The board has awarded a contract for 8,000 tons of pipe for use during the present year and as soon as the 24 and 30 inch size are delivered here they will be carried at once to the streets wherein the reinforcing mains are to be laid.

A resolution requesting the state legislature to set aside an appropriate sum of money for the use of the state board of forestry in promoting forest growth and protection was adopted by the board. The forestry board has asked for an appropriation of \$100,000.

A contract for 350 fire hydrants was let to the local firm of Heiler & Underhill. The Crane company, got the contract for pipe and fittings and for corporation and curb cocks. Contract for 200,000 pounds of pig iron lead was let to M. L. Kline. The contract for 725 gate valves was split up between the Crane Co. and M. L. Kline and others.

The board ordered the purchase of two adding machines for the use of the accounting department.
