Accused of Perjury.—Accused of testifying falsely in the case in which Harry Schloss was convicted of violation of the white slavery statutes of the government, Ab Liska, an 18-year-old boy, was brought to Portland yesterday by Deputy United States Marshal Devenport. Liska was subpoenaed by the government from Chicago to testify against Schloss. After leaving Portland he decided to take in the sights of the coast before returning east and went to Seattle. Government agents have had him under constant surveillance and he was arrested a few days ago to prevent his leaving the city. A secret indictment was returned, accusing him of the perjury by the grand jury several days ago. Anna Schloss, the woman who was the chief witness against Harry Schloss, was indicted for perjury shortly after his trial was concluded. She is the aunt of Ab Liska.

Damage Suit Dismissed.—An alienation of affections suit against Winifred Chambers and Jane Ferguson, mother and grandmother of Verne Doty, for \$7500, which was filed by Verne Doty following divorce proceedings instituted by her husband, was dismissed yesterday after Verne Doty was granted a divorce. Mrs. Doty, now about 19 years old, was married to Verne Doty, 21 years old at present, on June 12, 1911. Mrs. Doty claimed his mother and grandmother by offering financial inducements won him from her and induced him to start divorce proceedings. She also claimed they were instrumental in having published a statement by him that he would not be responsible for her debts at a time when she was sick in the hospital. Last September Mrs. Doty opposed her husband's suit, but yesterday she allowed it to go by default.

Revival Meetings End.—The series of revival meetings which have been held in the Laurelhurst Methodist Episcopal church for the past five weeks will close Sunday night. An address to the young converts will be given in the church on Saturday, thirty-third street southeast tomorrow night by District Superintendent Rev. J. W. McDougall, and a special service will be held Saturday night, when a number of musical numbers will be featured. Morning services will be held in the church at 11 o'clock Sunday morning, when Rev. C. T. Cook, pastor of the church, will preach. Rev. Mr. McDougall will preach at the evening service.

The acting mayor has given Mrs. Baldwin permission to go to Vancouver.

ATTACK ON KEY TO CONSTANTINOPELE BEGUN BY ALLIES

ing to the coast of the Sea of Marmora, but stated that the allies' army was unable to pursue and that the Turks today would make several villages occupied by the Christians after the Moslem retreat. It probably is this attempted reoccupation which is the crux of the fighting today.

An unconfirmed news agency dispatch received here today says that Hassan Riza, Turkish commander at Samsat, has been killed by the shells of the besieging allies.

Premier Venizelos of Greece is in Sofia today as the guest of Czar Ferdinand. He is enroute to Athens.

Constantinople dispatches today state that Shekhet Pasha has returned from the lines at Tchatalja. For the first time since last Monday the ambassadors conferred today in the foreign office here and it is believed they considered a new plan by the German ambassador to induce the Turks and the allies to reopen peace negotiations.

Dispatches from Constantinople that Shekhet Pasha is secretly negotiating with the Bulgarians are perplexing the ambassadors, who believe that such action would not only tend to further complicate the situation but would render the prospect of peace even more vague.

Vizier Negotiates for Peace.

(United Press Leased Wire.)

London, Feb. 6.—Grand Vizier Shekhet Pasha of Turkey is secretly negotiating for peace with Bulgaria, according to a dispatch received here early today from Constantinople. It also says Turkey will send peace delegates to Sofia next week, where negotiations will proceed between Turkey and Bulgaria, exclusive of the other allies.

The dispatch stated that the object of Shekhet Pasha's visit to the Tchatalja forts yesterday was to secretly meet Bulgarian officials with the army. It said he met the Bulgarians in an isolated farmhouse.

Osman Nisami Pasha, one of the Turk peace delegates, today was ordered to return to Berlin, where he will serve as the Ottoman ambassador. Reschid Pasha, another of the Turk envoys, it was announced, intends to remain here indefinitely.

Advance on Uskub.

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Constantinople, Feb. 6.—More than 30,000 Albanians are advancing against Uskub, which the Servians have held since the beginning of the war, according to the Journal Leturie, a newspaper. The Constantinople correspondent for the London Standard says the Turkish army in Monastir is conducting an active and successful campaign there.

TO INVESTIGATE SALARY STATUS

Requests for Increases Referred to Special Committee of Council.

Nearly 200 applications for salary increases were practically rejected by the ways and means committee of the city council yesterday when the committee recommended the appointment of a special committee to investigate city wage schedules with a view to revising these all down the line. All applications brought to the notice of the committee were placed on file until the salary revision committee can put in a report. As it will probably take many weeks, perhaps months, for the committee to make a thorough investigation of the salary situation, and as the committee will not be appointed until after the return of Mayor Rushlight from his honeymoon, the chances are very favorable that the increase seekers will have to wait at least till next year.

A delegation representing 37 policemen who have been working less than two years appeared before the committee yesterday and asked for increases totaling \$10,000 a year. The spokesman of this delegation told the councilmen that he and his companions were just as good policemen at the end of six months as men who have been in the department for many years. He said the 37 men who have been in the department less than two years are entitled to \$100 a month more than the figure the new bluecoats are demanding.

Several years ago the council established a rule that first-year men in the fire and police departments receive \$90 a month and second-year men \$99 a month. The third year and thereafter the salary is \$100 a month.

Chairman H. W. Wallace, of the committee, reminded the policemen that they had signed a contract with the city to work for \$80 a month the first year and \$90 a month the second year.

"You knew what the salary was when you took the civil service examination," said Councilman Wallace. "You saw new men are given the worst beats and the worst hours. You took all those chances when you entered the service and you should abide by your contract with the city."
