TARIFF REDUCTIONS UP FOR CONSIDERATION AT THE SPECIAL SESSION

Tobacco Duty to Be Left Untouched; Cotton and Meat to Be Reduced.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Washington, Feb. 7.--General tariff reductions will be embodied in the bills to be reported by the house ways and means committee during the special session of congress, which convenes March 15, it was reported here today. The features of the tariff measures passed and vetoed by President Taft will be included in the new bills,

"If you make your tariff rates balance the difference in cost at home and abroad the tariff will promote the growth of free competition," declared Chairman Underwood, following recent

hearings.
Underwood declares exportations of California citrus fruits are now running into many millions of dollars, while imports have fallen from \$3,030,000 to \$100,000. This, he believes, should form a strong argument for revision. He favorse putting lemons on the free list or cutting down the lemon tariff 50 per

cent, The Underwood bill will make a sub stantial reduction on wood pulp, print paper, cattle on the hoof, possibly meat and cotton manufactures. The duty on tobacco will remain.

The cotton schedule is to be pushed down to 10 per cent of the present duties. Underwood has always opposed free wool, but William J. Bryan's influence may pull the tariff below the figures advocated by the Democratic house leader.

Mr. Wimer will buy nearly 400 head, which will be distributed among the ranchers. Mr. Wimer estimates that 300 pounds of cheese will be turned out daily.


