WOMEN'S UNION PLANS FINE HOME

Systematic Canvass Will Be Made for \$125,000 Fund.

System is to be the motto of the members of the Portland Women's union in soliciting funds necessary to build a new \$125,000 home at Tenth and Montgomery streets, to take the place of the present home at 510 Flanders street. The members of the union, in a mass meeting held in the home yesterday afternoon, decided to organize a system which will take in every business house and manufacturing concern in the city in the campaign for funds.

Enough women have already signified their intention of doing this work. The city will be divided into districts. One woman will canvass for funds among the doctors, another among the lawyers, another among certain classes of business men and so on.

This is the first time since its organization 25 years ago that the union has ever called upon the public for aid. But now a new home, which shall be self-supporting, is needed to take care of working girls. The present home at 510 Flanders street is too small to accommodate all who need help. As it is planned now, the new home will be able to care for at least 200 girls, who are employed in this city.

A large number of the large business houses of the city have already subscribed money which is to be used to start the fund. Already the amount subscribed amounts to \$29,000.
