NEW TENNIS RULING WOULD RETARD GAME IN NORTHWEST CLUBS

If National Ass'n Adopts Proposal Tacoma Tournament Will Lose Chief Charm.

Tennis Chairman A. D. Wakeman of the Multnomah Amateur Athletic club has received a letter from the United States National Tennis association explaining a new and stricter rule regarding amateur standing, which will come up for discussion tomorrow afternoon when the parent tennis body holds its annual meeting in New York.

The rule, if adopted, will prohibit amateurs from accepting from any hotel, club or similar organization, at which a tournament is to be held, transportation, board or lodging at any secret or especially reduced rate in connection with the tournament.

According to Chairman Wakeman, this rule would be injurious to the northwestern tournaments, as far as outside players are concerned, not so much locally, but in Tacoma, where a special effort is made each year to bring a number of the best players up from California.

A number of protests against the ruling being adopted have been voiced, several clubs claiming that it would be impossible for the United States to vie for the Davis trophy or have the California players invade the east.

The revision committee of the U. S. N. T. A. says that a false impression might be created by this statement. It asserts that the rule would not prevent the National association sending a team abroad and paying its expenses nor the California or any other association paying the expenses of teams sent east or anywhere else. The rule "does not prohibit a player from accepting expenses or the equivalent from a tournament committee."

The important difference between these two operations is that in the one case a home club or association, at a financial sacrifice, sends its representative to take part in a competition in order to bring honor upon the club or association. In the other a player is negotiating for expenses with an organization which pays these expenses as a business transaction, spending whatever the amount may be in expectation that the player's presence will bring them a return on the investment, either in gate receipts or in increased popularity and patronage," says the revision committee.

Harry Jewell to Box Ern Barrieau Feb. 25

North Yakima, Wash., Feb. 13.—Harry Jewell, the 135 pound fighter who came to North Yakima last fall from Tacoma, is training for a bout before the Wenatchee Athletic club, February 25, with Ernie Barrieau of Vancouver. Jewell took part in two short fights at Wiley City during the fall, getting a decision over a local boy and a ten round draw with Jack McHenry of Lima, Ohio. He wanted a fight with Eddie Merino at 135, but was unable to get it and will meet Barrieau at 135.

W. F. Burns is also training to meet Chris Geesek on the mat at the same smelter in Wenatchee, February 25. Both men are working out each afternoon in the No. 1 fire station gymnasium.

LOCAL CLUB RETAINS ITS F. A. M. CARD

At a special meeting of the Portland Motorcycle club Tuesday it was decided to retain the club's membership in the Federation of American Motorcycle clubs instead of affiliating with the Western Federation, which was recently organized. Fred Wyatt was appointed Oregon state commissioner and as soon as he receives confirmation he will start on a tour throughout the state, lending a hand in helping various clubs to organize.

KNOCKOUT BROWN AND RIVERS TAKE CALCIUM

Los Angeles, Feb. 13.—Knockout Brown of New York and Joe Rivers of Los Angeles, moved into the pugilistic calcium today, following the retirement of Campi and Williams, as headliners. Brown will box the Los Angeles Mexican 20 rounds at Vernon, February 22, the winner probably to meet Bud Anderson, March 17.

Brown is training at Venice, where he is rapidly browning his pink skin. Rivers is preparing himself at Doyle's. Each already is in fair shape. There has been practically no betting yet on the battle, although Rivers probably will be made a favorite.

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WILLIAMS IS AWARDED DECISION OVER EDDIE CAMP AFTER HARD GO

Californian Scores Knockdown but Baltimore Lad Gains a Big Lead Toward End.

Los Angeles, Cal., Feb. 13.—Kid Williams of Baltimore is the logical challenger today of Barnumweight Champion Johnny Coulon by virtue of his victory over Eddie Campi of San Francisco in 20 rounds of the most brilliant boxing ever seen in the Vernon arena. With a championship match in view, Promoter McCarney has telegraphed Coulon an offer to meet Williams here late in March.

Handicapped by height and reach, Williams forced a whirlwind battle throughout the 20 rounds. His aggressiveness and his steady campaign on Campi's waist line were too much for Campi's cleverness, and Referee Eytton's decision was well received.

Campi had clearly the better of several rounds and scored the only knockdown of the battle in the fifth round and outboxed and outfought his defeated opponent in part of the final session, but Williams' sturdiness and slashing punch with either hand gave him a majority of the rounds.

Neither boy was badly marked. Williams' left eye was puffed and his right eye slightly torn, while Campi sustained a cut below the right eye and bled considerably from the lips.

Campi's manager, Tim McGrath, today offered to bet \$2500 on his protégé in a return match. In the event that Coulon will not meet Williams here, Campi may get another chance. Frankie Burns of Jersey City, also is considered as a possible opponent for the Baltimore lad.

Campi Starts Like Whirlwind.

Campi started off in whirlwind fashion in the first round, rushing the kid to the ropes and pounding him with lefts and rights. Williams jumped out of his corner in the second round and met Campi coming. They mixed it furiously in the center of the ring and when the gong rang Williams had the shade. The third round was even.

Campi took the fourth round by a big margin, outboxing and outgunning the easterner. The crowd rose and cheered him wildly.

In the fifth round the only knockdown of the battle occurred. Williams rushed Campi to the ropes and in a return sally the San Franciscan shot a left to the jaw that floored the Baltimore boy, who bounced up like a rubber ball. Campi's round by another big margin.

Williams came back strong and in the sixth, seventh and eighth rounds, Campi came back stronger in the ninth and held even and in the tenth he cut loose for his best round. He landed left and right hooks and rocked Williams' head with straight lefts. He finished the round with a left to the stomach and a right cross to the jaw.

Slow Down in Eleventh.

Campi also led in the eleventh, but in the twelfth the pair slowed down a bit and it was an even round. Williams took round 13, but Campi evened up the 14th and got a break in the 15th. The 15th was Williams' round, punishing the coast boy severely at close quarters. In round 17 Campi appeared to be weakening, clinching a great deal and depending on long range work against his sturdier opponent. Williams staggered Campi in the 18th round with a straight left to the stomach and a hard right to the jaw. It was all Williams'.

Campi fought gamely, but weakly, in the 19th round, and Williams had all the better of it. In the 20th they jumped to the center of the ring and fought like tigers. They fought head to head, Campi making a fierce rally, most Williams swung a heavy right to the head that almost knocked Campi down. They were fighting fiercely at the gong and failed to hear it. Referee Eytton held up Williams' gloved hand in token of victory.

Attell and Zotte Draw.

Stockton, Cal., Feb. 13.—Monte Attell needed all his cleverness to earn a draw in his ten round fight with Ad Zotte here. Zotte was much faster, but Attell was better at lightning. The bout was originally scheduled for 15 rounds, but was cut to ten by orders of District Attorney Felts.

The Lem Keg-Bert White special event furnished ten sensational rounds. It was a clean and hard four round contest, with the result in doubt until the last blow was struck. Both men apparently were willing to accept a draw decision.

Willie Hoppe to Come Back.
