

DENIES PROPOSED DENTAL LAW AID TO ANY COMBINE

Measure Should Be Supported by All Reputable Dentists, Says Head of State Board; Others' Views.

Senator T. L. Perkins' bill intended to regulate the practice of dentistry, which has already passed the senate, is heartily supported by Dr. Jean Cline, president of the state dental board.

"It is not intended that the proposed law shall make possible a trust or combine of dentists," says Dr. Cline. "Such amendments to the present law as the reputable dentists are asking for are in harmony with the tried laws in other states. California dentists have been operating under a similar law for three years and it has resulted in driving out a large number of quacks. There will be no more opportunity to work up a dental combine under the proposed amendments than under the present law. There are practically no changes except that power is given to eliminate from practice drunken, ignorant and swindling individuals, who are now permitted to parade themselves as dentists. The only changes we ask for are such as will allow the elimination of frauds. We are not trying to exclude any dentist from any reputable school."

No Suggestion of Combine.
"There is no suggestion in our law or bylaws that makes for any trust or combine. No man is disciplined, criticized or attacked for charging any fee that his customer may think the work is worth, just so long as it is an open, fair transaction and the work is not that of a bungling fraud."

"No dentist will lose his license for charging higher or lower fees than usual, just so long as he does honest work and does not abuse his patients."

"They cannot make any law too stringent to suit me," said W. A. Wise, president and manager of the Wise Dental Company, Inc., when asked his opinion of the new dental law now under consideration at Salem.

"The reliable dentist has nothing to fear from any law," said Dr. Wise. "More stringent law relative to the practice of dentistry is needed in Oregon, and when a good law is passed it should be enforced. There is one feature of the measure proposed at Salem that goes probably too far, and that is the detail which provides that the state

dental board shall have all authority as to who shall and who shall not practice in the state. If the matter is taken out of the courts altogether, it might result in the formation of a private interest clique in the state board, and the board might then become arbitrary in its methods."

Good Law Welcomed.
"I feel satisfied, though, that a reliable dentist, one who does good, fair and honest work, need have nothing to fear from any board in the long run. We want only reliable, conscientious workers to practice in the state, and any law that will work to this end should be welcomed, and will be so far as I am concerned."

"I have been approached by those who are fighting the bill with the argument that it is intended to work against those who advertise, and I have reason to believe such is the case. However, I am not worried about it, as I feel that the reliable workmen, whether they advertise or not, have nothing to fear from any law."

Present Law Favored.
"I am not opposed to the passage of the proposed dental bill," said Dr. B. E. Wright, Northwest building. "Though I am not as thoroughly posted on it as I might be. Early in the season I was approached and asked to help fight the measure because, I was told, it is aimed particularly at the advertisers and is intended to make it legal to take away the license of any dentist who advertises. I am not much afraid of that, because I think such a law would be unconstitutional."

"The present law is all right and will take care of the dental profession in good shape if it is properly enforced. It is not enforced now. I am for anything that will help raise the working standards of the profession."

"I do not like to talk of Bob," he said, "because I do not see what good it would do. My poor words can add nothing to his glory, or brighten his record as a soldier, a hero and a great man."

"I'm a younger son, and our ways have been apart ever since I was a boy of 14. At that time I left home, with a sum equal to \$10 in my pocket,

on adventure bent. The same unrest that stirred me to venture into the world is what caused my brother to knowingly take his life in his hands and go into Antarctica. Our impulses were different, however. He sought to secure data, specimens from the little known region to the end that more knowledge could be given mankind; I went out, just for the joy it gave me, an individual, to see and experience life in all its phases.

"The last words Bob wrote were that he did not regret his choice. Nor do I regret mine."

Knew No Fear.
"I am deeply grieved over his tragic ending. Although I refused to believe Robert dead until absolute verification of the first reports was received, still I was not unprepared. I had told my wife and close friends repeatedly that I never expected him to come out of the Antarctic regions alive."

"Bob knew no fear. He was always an adventurous, deep student and thinker, very conscientious, modest and square. He was true to his country and his ideals and England can do no better than give him the highest honors in her power, because he deserves them. His last note addressed to the public shows the kind of man he was. He praised his companions, forgot self, and to the last thought of his country and prayed that those dependent on him and his companions might find support from the nation in whose service they laid down their lives."

"When he left at the head of his party on his last expedition, I felt it was his last chance and said so. Knowing him as I did, I was certain he would not turn color."

"To Bob the conquest of the south pole was a secondary consideration. He had always been interested in both the Arctic and Antarctic circles and had sometimes spoke to me concerning them. His idea, however, was to gather scientific data first of all, and then, if conditions were propitious, to try for the pole. He was not anxious to reach the pole for the pure glory of the accomplishment, however, but for the purpose of adding more to the sum of human knowledge."

"That is one of the reasons why there were so many scientific men in the expedition. They were after scientific material, first, the pole second."

"The same reasons did not actuate Raold Amundsen, in my opinion. While he reached the pole ahead of Bob and thereby gains the nominal honor, he only gained what he went after. He wanted to plant his country's flag on the bottom of the globe. That was his impelling motive."

"And, when the scientific data, gathered by the Scott and Amundsen expeditions are published and compared side by side, I am willing to stake my life that the data gathered by my brother's party will be much superior fuller and more exact than Amundsen's. Robert Scott is dead, but the world is better that he lived."

Fears for Mother.
"His death must have proved a terrible shock to my mother. She took great pride in Bob, and loved him deeply. I haven't heard from her for some time but presume my youngest brother, Wallace is with her in Scotland. There were three boys in our family. Robert, myself and Wallace. Robert was born in England, and Wallace and myself in Edinburgh, Scotland."

"Our father, now dead, was in the British army service. The last time I saw Robert was about 17 years ago when I visited home for a short time."

Until his marriage, about six years ago, Bruce Scott spent his time seeking adventures throughout the globe. Whenever he heard of a war he straightway struck out for the scene of trouble and engaged in it."

At 17 he left home for Russia where he served as a messenger in the Russian army for 11 months. He returned home then after a short visit at Edinburgh, made his way to the United States, where for several years he rode the range, a cowpuncher."

From the Panhandle country he went to South Africa, where he found employment as an overseer in the Kimberly diamond mines, and India saw him next and then Mooreland, North Africa, where he joined the Moorish army, serving as second in command of cavalry."

After several months' campaigning he resigned and went to Vienna, where he served as clerk to American Consul Barker, who is now stationed at Sydney, N. S. W."

In New Zealand he worked in a bank; at Hongkong, went into the service of the Lipton Tea company, and managed their interests in the South Sea Islands."

Brother Against Brother.
Tiring of this, he went to South America, not, however, until he spent some months in the United States, where he met and married a Kentucky girl. He entered the service of the American Fruit & Produce Co., and acted as their plantation manager near Trinidad, Bolivia, until three years ago, when an attack of yellow fever broke his health and he was compelled to return to the United States, finally arriving at Portland, where he accepted a position from H. M. Pabst, general manager of the Portland Gas & Coke Co., as superintendent of the Hilar orchards. He was with the Mississippi volunteers in Cuba during the Spanish-American war."

In South Africa he fought on the side of the Boers, and was with General Kruger at Ladysmith when General Buller came to the rescue of General Kitchener's forces that were penned within the city. With Buller were the Gordon Highlanders of whom Robert Scott was an officer."

Save for the fact that the Boers surrendered soon afterward, brother would have fought against brother. As it was, the Gordon Highlanders arrived just too late to get into the action."

"I didn't know Bob was with the English forces until afterward and for this reason we did not meet in South Africa," said Bruce, yesterday. "You know," he apostrophized, "I always feel for the underdog, that is one of the reasons why I fought with the Boers."

And with that Mr. Scott turned back to his work.

HERE'S THE RECORD AT SALEM: 31 BILLS PASSED IN 31 DAYS

House leaders have suddenly discovered that the 40 days' work was undoubtedly intended to mean 40 "working days," and the resolution, if it is introduced, will provide that the legislators receive pay on this basis for the additional week.

Whether this resolution will run on a snag in the senate is the bothersome question just now. In fact, the senate by the Calkins resolution to prohibit either house from considering bills coming from the other after next Saturday, is skillfully trying to put the house "in the hole." Of course the harassed representatives will turn down this resolution in a minute, but the point the senate has in mind is that it will be put before the public in the light of being up with its own work while the house has to call for help.

The governor pointed out in his message yesterday that all general appropriation bills for the maintenance of state institutions have been held up in the ways and means committee, although the budgets had been made up long before the legislature convened.

Where the Leverage Comes In.
The importance of holding back these bills, from the standpoint of the or-

ganization, is obvious. With the state institutions in Marion county, the state university in Lane county, the Agricultural college in Benton county, the Normal school in Polk county, and the Eastern Oregon hospital in Umatilla county, the leverage that can be exerted on members from these counties to "stand in" in order to get the appropriations asked for their particular institutions is enormous.

It does not take an eagle eye to detect that the governor's message yesterday has jarred the house steam roller to the ball bearings. It has done just this in the house: It has stirred up the outside members against the dominating faction from Multnomah county and eastern Oregon who have been controlling things, and crystallized their opposition. They are on the verge of revolt and the organization knows it. It cropped out all along the line yesterday afternoon.

Outrageous Words of Members.
As for instance, in the vote on the \$500,000 Columbia Southern project when Hall of Columbia, though voting aye because he thought it a worthy project, declared that he protested against having this bill slipped in ahead of needed state institutions appropriations. Hill, of Polk, was another to protest.

It cropped out again in an obvious attempt to oil up the coals when McArthur, in the guise of rebuking a newspaper, talked 10 minutes on the beautiful harmony and lack of frictional strife

that should prevail, and that was, he declared, prevailing. Forbes, of Crook, who with McArthur, Abbott, Latourette and Upton, may be called one of the organization leaders, followed with an equally pathetic plea for harmony.

But, as one of the "outsider" members was unkind enough to declare afterwards, while this little entertainment was going on, three bills could have been passed. It shows the feeling that is getting stirred up in the house.

Isn't Even a Good Roller.
The great dissatisfaction with the "roller" is that under its domination, nothing whatever has been accomplished. If it had been a benevolent roller, and got through a lot of good legislation, everything would still be sweet and lovely. But with only two real appropriation bills passed, after running around in a circle for five weeks, trying to put the governor "in the hole," and with nearly one half of the bills on the calendar for third reading in the first three days of this week bearing the name of Upton, or Latourette, or Mitchell, or Forbes—Multnomah and eastern Oregon—the charges of juggle in getting them on the calendar ahead of others, a storm is brewing.

If a Leader Blows, Look Out.
All the opposition needs to crack the roller in two, is a leader. Already, it is said, there is a half tentative organization among the members from the farming counties. They are be-
