

10 HOUR BILL'S AMENDMENTS TO BILL ACCEPTED

THOUGH AMENDED

Overtime Is Permitted in Certain Industries. Conditional Upon Paying Twice the Regular Scale.

(Staff Correspondence.)
Salem, Or., Feb. 14.—After an operation had deflated the teeth of Representative Schuebel's 10 hour bill and the orators of the senate had engaged in one of the most spectacular combats of the session, the senate this morning passed the measure to third reading, and it seems to stand a good chance of enactment in amended form.

Senator Dimick, who led in the debate favoring the bill, threw scathing denunciation upon Ben Selling, president of the senate two years ago, declaring Selling to have been the greatest misfit that ever occupied the president's chair, and accused him of attempting to steal the Dimick eight hour bill of that session at the request of C. W. Nottingham, then a senator from Multnomah county.

As passed by the house, the Schuebel bill prohibited the employment of labor for more than 10 hours in any one day or for more than 60 hours in any one week. Dimick sought to have the bill passed without amendment, but the senate, by a vote of 7 to 22, refused to accept it in that form, and adopted amendments proposed by Senator Coos.

Overtime at Twice the Scale.
These amendments preserving the general 10 hour day for all mills and factories, permit overtime where necessary if paid for at twice the usual wage scale, and eliminates the 60 hour a week provision. These amendments are a concession to the lumber and flouring interests, which asserted that it was necessary for them to be able to employ men more than 10 hours.

Dimick asserted that unless the bill is passed by the legislature a more radical measure is likely to be passed by the legislature. He referred once more to the conditions at Oregon City and said many men there for six months in the year see their families only in the lamp light, going to work in the dark and returning in the dark.

Give the Man a Chance.
"I appeal to you, for once, to put man above the dollar," he shouted. "We legislate here for the protection of dumb brutes. Now let us legislate, in the name of humanity, for the creatures that God has made in his own image."

Senator Day, in opposing the bill, had said he understood that factories were closed in California by the eight hour law for women, but Dimick was ready for this and read a telegram from Governor Johnson and the labor commissioner of California, declaring no mills had closed and that wages had not been decreased.

Replying to Senator Kiddie, who had also opposed the bill because, he said, many requests had come to him from flouring mill interests, Dimick countered by saying that Kiddie doubtless knew what he was talking about, as Kiddie is the owner of flouring mills himself. Thompson declared that the interests of eastern Oregon are against the measure, because it would place them at a disadvantage with the lumbermen of California. Barrett of Umatilla said the people in his part of the state are also opposed to such legislation.

Carries With Amendments.
On the straight 10 hour proposal the only affirmative votes were those of Calkins, Dimick, Joseph, Kellaher, Lester, Neuner and Stewart. On the vote adopting the Smith amendments the following voted aye: Bean, Butler, Calkins, Carson, Dimick, Farrell, Hoskins, Joseph, Kellaher, Lester, McCulloch, Moser, Neuner, Patton, Perkins, Ragsdale, Smith of Coos, Stewart and Von der Hellen.

Those voting no were: Barrett, Burgess, Day, Hawley, Hollis, Kiddie, Smith of Josephine, Thompson and Wood. President Malarkey adhered to his rule of not voting on committee reports, and the senate was held for some time while the sergeant at arms tried to find him. The bill now goes to third reading and appears certain to win as now amended.

DORR ON TRIAL FOR MURDER OF HIS UNCLE

Salem, Mass., Feb. 14.—William A. Dorr of Stockton, Cal., who pleaded not guilty to the charge of murdering his uncle, George E. Marsh, a millionaire of this place, will be put on trial Monday.

Dorr was arrested in California two weeks after his uncle's body was found here.

Uncle Sam Wants Red Wagons.

Within the next six months every wagon in the service of the Portland postoffice will be painted a vermilion red, following the receipt of explicit orders to that effect today from Postmaster General Frank Hitchcock. The general order does not specify the time within which this is to be accomplished, but practically all the men who have the contracts for hauling mail paint their wagons in the spring. The order directing the new color states that the vehicles are to receive their new coats the next time they are overhauled. An inspection of post office equipment has been ordered at once.

Banner Day for County Clerk.

Yesterday was a banner day in the office of the county clerk. Two hundred and thirty-four instruments of all kinds were filed. The best previous record was 225. An additional man was necessary in the filing department to care for the numerous papers.

AMENDMENTS TO BILL ACCEPTED

Bourne Gets Favorable Report on All His Additions to the Rivers and Harbors Bill.

(Washington, Feb. 14.—To The Journal.—The senate committee on commerce yesterday reported favorably on all my amendments to the rivers and harbors bill.

"First, authorization for Coos Bay to use money that port may place at its disposal for inner harbor improvement, with use of any available government plant."

"Second, Tillamook bay and bar \$100,000 appropriation with plans on continuing contract basis."

"Third, increase of \$10,000 on Willamette and Yamhill river project, with authorization to be expended in construction of reversion land independence."

"Next, increase of \$600,000 for the Cello project, making the appropriation \$1,200,000, instead of \$600,000, as in the house bill, thus expediting completion of the work in one year sooner."

"Next increasing house provision of \$40,000 for the Columbia river above Cello to \$60,000."

GOVERNOR APPROVES, SIGNS, FIFTEEN BILLS

Salem, Or., Feb. 14.—All of the 11 senate bills and four house bills that reached the governor's hands yesterday, after being passed by the two houses of the legislature, have been approved and signed by him. They are as follows:

S. B. 10, by Perkins—Providing free meeting places for the G. A. R.

S. B. 22, by Farrell—Amending section 6569 relating to public highways.

S. B. 23, by Neuner—Amending section 6905 relating to railroads.

S. B. 24, by Neuner—Amending the laws relating to costs and disbursements in condemnation proceedings.

S. B. 71, by Burgess—Amending section 2, of chapter 126 relative to the shipping of livestock.

S. B. 83, by Calkins—Creating a right of action for damages against a person who shall give or sell liquor to an intoxicated person or a habitual drunkard.

S. B. 91, by Bean, amending section 5791, relative to drainage and drainage districts.

S. B. 92, by Bean—Amending section 7194, relative to the registration of land titles.

S. B. 103, by Smith of Coos—Relative to the meeting of presidential electors.

S. B. 118, by Neuner—Amending section 2 of chapter 10 of the laws of 1911, relative to cemeteries.

S. B. 123, by Bean and Calkins—To open streets through land owned by the Oregon university.

H. B. 79, by Abbott—Amending section 3 of chapter 10 of the laws of 1911, and repealing section 4 of the same chapter, relating to the inspection of railroad track scales.

H. B. 146, by Smith—Creating the office of clerk of the circuit court for Klamath county.

H. B. 138, by Upton—Amending section 7 of an act authorizing the creation of a retirement fund.

H. B. 173, by Upton—Providing for the suspension and investigation of the intrastate schedules of railroads before the same become effective.

FIND HUMAN SKELETON IN THE OREGON SLOUGH

A human skeleton was found yesterday in the backwater of the Oregon slough at a point near where the wagon bridge to the Columbia river crosses the slough. It is believed by some that this is the remains of a person who, in an automobile with Mabel Monte, several months ago, crashed through the bridge and was drowned. The body of Miss Monte was found but Day's body was never recovered. Others contend that the skeleton is not that of Day, because it was found too far upstream and could never have been forced up at this point.

A small portion of what may have been a coat was found around the upper part of the skeleton. This cloth is black. The body had apparently been in the water for many months. The coroner took charge of the remains.

appear on the streets of Acapulco without great risk.

The cruiser Denver was ordered to protect American residents, and if any are assaulted it is expected marines will be landed.

Ambassador Wilson called the state department that if Americans in Mexico City heed his entreaties and remain outside the fighting zone they will be exposed to but little danger. Many foreigners, he said, were risking their lives to view the battle. This confirms the belief that the state department officials that intervention is not necessary.

Another dispatch stated that 400 rurales, stationed in front of the American legation as a guard, had admitted they did not know whether they were federalists or rebels.

All banks and business houses in the city are closed. Authorized to draw on the state department for \$10,000, Ambassador Wilson telegraphed today that all drafts were useless, as no funds are obtainable. Secretary Knox then authorized the ambassador to issue a makeshift currency, hoping the paper would be accepted in place of money.

Wilson estimated that there are 25,000 foreigners in Mexico City, but Secretary Knox thinks this is an exaggeration.

The state department and the consular bureau are flooded with thousands of letters and telegrams of inquiry regarding Americans in Mexico.

Diaz Would Return.

Paris, Feb. 14.—Porfirio Diaz, former president of Mexico, will hurry to his native country from this city to take the field against the United States in the event of intervention, according to announcement by friends of Diaz today.

OPERATING FORCE OF P. E. & E. NOW BEING ASSEMBLED

Edward Sears, Superintendent, Due to Arrive Here Tomorrow, Coming From N. Y. Central Lines.

Organization of the operating forces of the Portland, Eugene & Eastern Railroad in the Willamette valley has been commenced, according to announcements made today by President Robert E. Strahorn who returned this morning from an extended tour of California for the purpose of studying the various interurban systems there.

Superintendent of equipment will be Edward Sears, due to arrive here tomorrow from New York where he has been in charge of the electric equipment of the New York Central lines. With him will come a number of experts in their various lines who will immediately set to work to standardize the equipment.

Mr. Sears comes recommended as very capable in his line.

Frank L. Forbes will arrive from Spokane to become traffic clerk, after having been connected with the Spokane-Emire line, a Hill Interurban, as chief clerk of the general manager for some time. G. D. O'Connor will have charge of the steam service and T. B. Billings will supervise the electric service, with headquarters at Salem for the time being.

Shops Near Portland.

"In Los Angeles I studied the 1000-mile interurban system of the Southern Pacific in order that we may profit here by experience down there," said Mr. Strahorn, "and in Oakland I studied the large railroad shops just completed there. The Portland, Eugene & Eastern is going to locate a shop here soon and we want it exactly in every respect. I cannot say exactly where it will be located but it will be in the immediate vicinity of Portland."

"We are going ahead with construction as rapidly as possible, and that we are doing things may be realized from the arrival here last Sunday of 150 cars of steel rails from the east. Some of these were unloaded at the Southern Pacific shops in South Portland, others at Canby, and still others at points farther up the valley. And a number of cars of rails are arriving every day."

"We have ordered a great deal of equipment, and much of it is ready for operation. A large number of passenger cars are due to arrive here from the factory within the next 90 days."

Will Use Union Depot.

"While the dissolution of the merger between the Union Pacific and the Southern Pacific affects every component part of the Harriman system to some extent, I don't believe it will retard western Oregon developments. We expect to have steam trains in operation between Corvallis and Eugene April 1, and we expect to be in position to begin construction of the line between Oswego and Salem in the very near future."

"I have heard many rumors to the effect that we are going to establish a large passenger station on Fourth street, but I wish to deny this report, because while we eventually may do so, our plans for the present are to operate our interurban trains from the Union depot. As for an office building to house the Southern Pacific and Portland, Eugene & Eastern, I suppose it could be used to advantage, because we are really very crowded for space now, and a suitable building may be leased for that purpose."

Arrest Follows Civil Suit.

Unable to obtain the payment of a judgment for \$200 secured in November, 1910, Attorney C. M. White, representing W. F. Ball, had a Lane arrested and held in the county jail yesterday afternoon. Lane acted as agent for Ball and others in the sale of real estate and did not turn all of the proceeds over to Ball and his friends after making the sales. After the judgment was secured every possible means was taken to force Lane to pay, but nothing has been accomplished and the arrest followed.

Good Reputation Brings Parole.

The good reputation which Christ Hansen has borne, the defense that he was drunk at the time and a strong letter of recommendation from former employers won him a parole this morning from Circuit Judge Morrow on his plea of guilty to cashing a bad check on the Lafayette state bank through a Spalding hotel. He was given a sentence of one year in the county jail before being paroled. The check was for \$20 and was cashed December 26 last.

DESCHUTES POWER BILL NOW APPEARS SAFE

(Staff Correspondence.)
Salem, Or., Feb. 14.—The Deschutes power bill, which carries \$50,000 for the investigation of the water resources of the state, now appears to be certain of passage in the senate. It passed the house two days ago, but because of amendments made there, it has not yet been re-received by the senate committee, on ways and means.

Senator Perkins, chairman of that committee, who was for some time opposed to the bill, says he now considers it satisfactory, and declares it will be reported to the senate from his committee with favorable recommendation in double-quick time. The report is expected to be unanimous.

Senator Day's bill for investigation of the power project at Cello has been reported in with the appropriation cut from \$25,000 to \$15,000.

The only peril to these bills has been the big Columbia Southern project, costing \$500,000, which has passed the house, and is now fluttering between life and death in the senate. Whatever its fate, it is no longer believed that the Deschutes bill, which is general in terms, and applies to all parts of the state, will be held up or seriously opposed by the friends of other measures involving appropriations for special projects.

HERMAN WISE FOR REVENUE COLLECTOR

Friends of Herman Wise, one of Astoria's prominent business men, for two years mayor of that city, and a delegate to the last Democratic national convention in Baltimore, are earnestly doing everything within their power to secure for Mr. Wise his appointment to the office of collector of internal revenue for Oregon. Six federal appointments are to be made by President Wilson shortly after his inauguration, for the state at large, and friends of Mr. Wise want Astoria represented in the appointments.

Mr. Wise, who was in Portland this morning, said that he has already announced himself as a candidate for the appointment and has the support of a number of organizations of his own city and from other parts of the state.

"I know that I can do Portland a great deal of good," said Mr. Wise, "if I am appointed to this office. I want the chance to boost for Portland and for the entire state. I am not seeking the office for political reasons or that I feel that a federal appointment is due me."

According to Mr. Wise, all of the presidential electors have signified their intentions of working for his appointment, and many of the delegates to the national convention have pledged their support to him.

When in Baltimore Mr. Wise published a paper boosting Oregon and Portland. Mr. Wise has been in the mercantile business in Astoria for a number of years.

HOUSE OPENS FISHING AT MOUTH OF ROGUE

Salem, Or., Feb. 14.—After being buffeted about for weeks, slammed by committee and lambasted on the floor of the house, the Rogue River fishing bill, which amends the initiative measure of 1910, closing the stream altogether, by opening it for 30 miles to commercial fishing, passed the house yesterday afternoon.

On its final alignment, after one amendment to prohibit all selling and another to put the people of Josephine county on the same footing as those at the mouth of the Rogue, had been defeated, the vote was 28 to 14.

FIREMEN TO ENFORCE ARBITRATION DEMAND

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WILSON'S FIRST DAY IN CAPITAL TO BE SIMPLE

Washington, Feb. 14.—Plans to guard President-elect Woodrow Wilson from the time he arrives here March 3 until the hour of his inauguration, occupied the attention of the inaugural committee here today. There will be virtually no formalities on the day of Wilson's arrival aside from his reception at the Union station by a joint congressional committee.

From the station Wilson will go directly to his hotel, where he will remain until evening, when he will be the guest at a smoker to be given by the Princeton Alumni association.

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JOB HARRIMAN'S FEE IN McNAMARA CASE WAS \$15,000

Associate Counsel With Darrow Takes Stand; Admits Visiting Bank on Day Bribe Money Was Taken.

Los Angeles, Cal., Feb. 14.—Wordy battles between Defense Witnesses Job Harriman, formerly associated as counsel in the defense of the McNamara, and Assistant District Attorney Ford marked today's session of the trial of Clarence S. Darrow, accused of jury bribing.

Harriman admitted that he went to the bank November 28, 1911, the day that Detective Bert Franklin alleged Harriman had a secret conference with Darrow, who immediately afterward gave the detective \$1000 to bribe Prospective George N. Lockwood. Harriman explained his visit to the bank by saying he withdrew \$500 to meet a note falling due on that date.

After the witness had testified that he did not visit Darrow's office on the day in question, Ford took up the cross-examination. Now, after that note you told us about had been paid, when did you next see the note?" asked the prosecutor.

"About January 23, 1912, when my secretary came back from testifying before the grand jury."

"Who found the note then, and where?"

"Well, I think he got it from the files, but said—"

"Never mind what he said," snapped Ford.

"I have a perfect right to tell what he said," retorted Harriman, turning angrily to the court. Ford changed his tactics and questioned the witness closely regarding his money transactions with the defendant.

The witness admitted under cross-examination that he received \$15,000 for his work in the defense of the McNamaras.

MRS. HENRY S. GILE IS LAID TO REST

Funeral services for Mrs. Matilda Crellin Gile, 63 years old, wife of Henry S. Gile, a retired business man of 770 Planders street, who died at St. Vincent's hospital, Wednesday as the result of an operation performed several days before, were held this morning from the Church of Our Father, Seventh and Yamhill streets. Burial was in the Riverview cemetery. The funeral procession was made up entirely of automobiles.

Mrs. Gile was born in 1844 on the Isle of Man. After coming to the United States with her parents, when still a young girl, she came across the plains in 1853 to Oregon. After living here for some time she moved to Pacific county, Washington, where she lived until 1882. Returning to Portland, she stayed here for six years before going to California with her husband.

In 1891 the couple returned to Portland, where Mrs. Gile had since resided.

Besides a husband she leaves a son and two daughters. They are Abigail Gile, Katherine and Eleanor Gile of this city.

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
