

TRAINING ALONG PRACTICAL LINES, NEW SCHOOL AIM

Idea of Education Has Completely Changed, Says Dr. Edward W. Stitt of New York City.

The definition of education is changing. Dr. Edward W. Stitt, district superintendent of the great New York school system, in Portland this morning, talked not at all about theoretical, but entirely about practical training.

He said the time is at hand when Portland will have New York's problem—the education of the immigrants. The lure of opportunity in this great country and the Panama canal means of getting here will bring to the west coast the flood tide of foreign settlement, he added.

"It is the education of the older ones more than the younger that concerns us and concerns you," said the educator. Then he gave Portland some pointers out of his long New York experience.

The school buildings are to be more and more used for every orderly gathering. In that Portland had school auditoriums for political meetings during

the recent campaign, he said we are ahead of New York.

But in New York there are now 45 recreational schools. And these are covered and sheltered places for 500 clubs. The purpose of these clubs is at least a quarter as varied as their number.

They have debates on the superiority of the western or the eastern opportunity, as to whether the Panama canal should be fortified, and which is the more important, the Atlantic or the Pacific ocean. These things teach unforgettable geography.

They have elections that embody the principle of good practice in political elections.

"There was an election in one of the clubs just before I left," explained Dr. Stitt. "One of the boys said in my hearing, 'Gee, that's a skin.' His grammar wasn't good, but his moral principles were. It was a natural protest against the fact that though there were but 30 voters, 37 votes had been cast. They wanted to know how to correct the vote."

Dr. Stitt says the educational plan for newcomers in New York is to bring all the family in. The father studies carpentry and mechanics, or language, perhaps, in one room; the mother, plain cooking, housekeeping and living standards, in another. These are at the evening schools. And the children are with the parents.

There is an increasing value, said the educator, for vocational evening schools, vocation schools, and for the use of school buildings constantly for all good purposes the year around.

In an address before the teachers of Portland this afternoon, Dr. Stitt said he would use this sentence: "In the model school of the future the following advantages will greatly reduce waste: Small classes, proper light, plenty of blackboards, adjustable and movable furniture, and, above all, efficient teachers, each one being a composite creation with the spirit of a Froebel, the common sense of a Horace Mann, and the social service of a Jane Addams."

Dr. Stitt will deliver an illustrated lecture, free, at the Lincoln High school at 8 o'clock this evening. It was not known until late yesterday afternoon that it would be possible to induce Dr. Stitt to remain over in Portland long enough to give this public lecture. At a meeting of the school board late yesterday it was decided that an opportunity for Portland people to hear this noted expert should not be overlooked. The lecture will be on "The Wider Use of the School."

CORPORATIONS MUST GIVE U. S. REPORT BY MARCH 1 OR PAY FINE

David M. Dunne, Collector of Internal Revenue, Issues a Warning.

All corporations doing business in the state of Oregon have until March 1 only to file their annual reports in compliance with the requirements of the statute regulating the federal corporation tax. Unless the reports are so filed, according to information from the office of David M. Dunne, collector of internal revenue, the delinquent corporations will be heavily penalized. Last year the fines on those who failed to report ranged from \$10 to \$25. This year, it is stated, the fine will be not less than \$100.

FOUR TRAINMEN HURT IN O.-W. R. & N. MISHAP
