

CLANTON CHARGES NOT FOUND TRUE

Gill and Schuebel Say Their Informant Was Greenman at Bonneville.

(Staff Correspondence.)
Salem, Or., Feb. 21.—The assertion by Representative Gill of Clackamas that he had been given to understand that his colleague Schuebel's bill cutting down the deadline for commercial fishermen to 600 feet below Oregon City falls would lose two votes in the senate if they appeared to testify against Fish Warden Clanton, played a prominent part in the investigation of Clanton before a joint house and senate committee. Gill and Schuebel, after a visit to the Bonneville hatchery, made the charge some weeks ago that 2,000,000 salmon fry had met death in the fish ponds there through the fish warden's carelessness. They obtained a committee to investigate, which visited the hatchery Sunday.

Gill wrote a note to Game Warden Finley, who was before the committee, saying he would testify if he were subpoenaed, but that he would not come otherwise, because he did not care to risk killing Schuebel's fish bill. When Finley read this to the committee, they insisted that Gill and Schuebel should appear. So did Fish Warden Clanton. Gill and Schuebel related what they said Superintendent Greenman of the hatchery told them.

The committee will report that there is no evidence to prove the charges that Clanton caused the death of the fish, and that none of the charges against him have been substantiated. It will be in the nature of an exoneration of Clanton.

EAST SIDERS COMPLAIN AGAINST CAR SERVICE

In a sweeping denunciation of the service accorded them by the Portland Railway, Light & Power company, the East Side Business Men's club, the Sunnyside Improvement club, and the Laurelhurst Improvement club yesterday mailed a complaint to the railroad commission, requesting that body to take up the matter at the earliest possible moment.

The main grievance of the clubs is that the company has repeatedly refused to build a cross-town car line on Thirty-ninth street. They also desire other cross-town lines, as follows: On East Twentieth street, south to the Woodstock car line on Gladstone avenue; on East Eighty-second street, from

The duty of the official charter board will not end when a commission plan

draft has been completed and submitted to the council. Each member who has approved the commission plan of government should respond to every call from the public for explanation, said Acting Mayor George L. Baker this morning.

"The most important thing is to set the advantages of commission plan government before the people as administered under the charter proposed that the people will gladly and with confidence adopt it by large majority," he continued.

"All the work which has been done—and it is great—will be fruitless unless the charter is adopted."

"We won't be any nearer our goal and realize our plan until the government of city affairs is in the people's hands," the commission plan says.

"We won't be saving the money and the waste of time and effort that we deplore under present conditions unless the people vote for the change with a decisive majority."

"And the people won't vote to adopt a charter that they know nothing about."
