

### SENATORS BLOCK 3 SALARY RAISES

#### Assessor and Sheriff of Coos and Clatsop School Head Meet Rebuffs.

Salem, Or., Feb. 21.—The fine art of salary raising met a setback in the senate yesterday. H. B. 568, by Barton, of Coos, provided for an increase of the salaries of the Coos county assessor and sheriff, the first being raised from \$1200 a year to \$1800, and the second from \$1350 to \$1800, while H. B. 569, by Anderson, of Clatsop, provided for an increase in the salary of the school superintendent from \$900 to \$1200. Both bills were lost because the senators from those counties did not approve of the raise.

### Pacific County Giant Falls.

South Bend, Wash., Feb. 21.—The largest tree ever cut in Pacific county was felled last Monday at camp 11, P. & E. The big tree measured 13 feet 6 inches at the butt and 110 inches at the top. It was cut 28 feet long because that was as large a stick as the car could handle, though the tree could have been cut much longer. The log scaled 17,000 feet. It is all solid wood, no portion of it being hollow or decayed.

### MOOSE EMERGENCY HAS INS AND OUTS

#### Bill Probably Will Be Amended to Permit Participating in City Election.

Salem, Or., Feb. 21.—Out, in, and out again is the experience the emergency clause has met in the Bull Moose bill, as it is popularly called, senate bill 258, which provides a means of putting the Progressive party on the primary ballot. Just now it is out, but there is some talk of putting it back in again. The bill was introduced in the senate and was printed without the emergency clause. The senate judiciary committee tackled it on, so that the Progressives of Portland might be enabled to nominate a candidate for mayor or at the primaries in May. In the house the bill went into the revision of laws committee, and the emergency clause was stricken out. It is now waiting third reading in that form. If the house passes the bill in that form, it will be up to the senate to concur or to refuse to concur in the house amendment. If the senate insists, it is altogether probable that the house will recede, as the emergency clause was dropped with largely because of a general prejudice against it, rather than because of any particular desire to shut the Progressive party out of the privilege of nominating its candidates for the city election in Portland by the primary method. Another Progressive party measure, the bill providing for election of the national committeemen at the primaries, has been favorably reported by the elections committee of the senate.

### BUTTER, IF PROCESSED, MUST BE SO BRANDED

Salem, Or., Feb. 21.—The senate yesterday afternoon passed H. B. 396, by Childs, which provides that all packed butter offered for sale must be branded process or packed butter, so the consumer may know exactly the kind of butter he is buying. Another bill passed by the senate was H. B. 306, by Childs. This fixes a standard for condensed milk and gives the food and dairy commission authority to analyze condensed milk. It was asserted that the different condensers were agreed on the bill.
