

ADVOCATE CHANGE IN THE NAME OF SEVENTH STREET

Citizens Want Name of Broadway, Instead; Auto Parade to Celebrate the Opening of New Bridge.

The Seventh Street league and the Northeast Side Improvement association want the Seventh street signs changed to Broadway before the Broadway bridge is formally opened, the first of next month.

A special meeting of the Northeast Side association has been called for 8 o'clock this evening at Albina branch library. The joint campaign will be inaugurated. At the same time the program for the jubilee celebrating the opening of the bridge will be arranged.

An automobile parade over the bridge, a big reunion probably in the Armory and a banquet to which will be invited those who were conspicuously helpful in securing the building of the bridge will be features.

Committees of the Seventh Street league and the Northeast Side Improvement association met yesterday and prepared a petition for the changing of the name Seventh street to Broadway, which was immediately filed with the city council. They ask the quickest possible action in order that Broadway, east and west side, may present the appearance of a boulevard by the time the bridge is opened to traffic.

The Northeast Side Improvement association has led the campaign for the Broadway bridge since its inception. The members figured prominently in the litigation between the city and the Kieran-Dunaway bridge obstructionists.

Judge M. G. Munly, president of the association, aided in representing the city in court procedure, which after being carried to the United States supreme court, was finally settled altogether in favor of the city. An announcement from the association as to the plan of the parade and the campaign to change the name of the street was issued this morning.

Admiral Van Reipen testified that the police made no effort to clear Pennsylvania avenue for the parade, and that the crowd pressed the marchers.

"I saw one man," Admiral Van Reipen said, "poking his finger at ladies on horseback and sneering and making ungentlemanly remarks. The only policeman visible was busily engaged in arresting the driver of one of the floats. I saw one boy scout, armed with a pole, trying to keep the crowd back."

employees whether they live at home. Of those we employ 1460 live at home. We do not employ women and girls not living at home at less than \$3 a week.

"I was a member of the Chicago vice commission and attended its meetings. At those meetings it was declared that low wages cause immorality among women."

He declared the commission's report was never published because it was obtained in confidence.

For Get Big Pay.

Rosenwald declared he is employing 23 women who get more than \$21 a week. Few department heads get \$2000 a year, he said. Concluding his testimony, he stated that he frequently asked his employment manager, G. H. Miller, for comparative wage figures.

Lieutenant Governor O'Hara asked Rosenwald:

"You are a public spirited man, and a member of the American Vigilance

society. I ask you as a man if you think low wages have anything to do with immorality?"

"No," replied the witness. "Wages have no connection with prostitution."

Rosenwald denied that he worked his girl employees more than ten hours a day or that his time rolls were "doctored" to make it appear that the girls worked but eight hours. Officials did not record the girls, he declared, nor was there a "speed up" system to fatigue the workers. He denied that the girls work in improperly ventilated rooms, and added that no "stock ads" were kept in the classified columns of newspapers throughout the country to attract help to his establishment on glittering promises of high wages, thereby oversupplying the labor market and making it easier to secure cheap help.

Chap Board Is Pious.

The magnate insisted that "girls admit" could get board in decent surroundings for \$2.50 weekly and admitted that a \$3 per week increase for those not materially affected the establishment's profits. He refused to say whether he considered it humane to withhold higher wages.

"My company will not obstruct any law for the good of humanity," Rosenwald declared. He suggested a national rather than a state minimum wage law, so that Illinois concerns would not be at a disadvantage.

Lessing Rosenwald, his son, next took the stand and admitted discharging two \$10 a week girls since the inquiry started.

Girl Contradicts Rosenwald.

Direct refutation of Rosenwald's testimony was made to the committee by a girl witness, an addresser for Sears, Roebuck & Co. Rosenwald had declared that no girl in his company's employ was paid less than \$5 a week.

When the Sears-Roebuck girl employee was called she swore she received \$4.50 a week, and that for this sum she worked more than 10 hours a day.

Another girl employee of Rosenwald's company also contradicted his testimony. She swore that "scolders" were employed and that the foremen regularly threatened the girls with dismissal.

"One girl," she said, "was taken to the scolding desk because, being weak and half sick, she sat down occasionally."

It has been largely through my efforts that the electorate is offered another opportunity to select commission government. At my suggestion the warning elements in the community have harmonized their divergent views as to what should constitute commission government and at present it seems that the issue will be for the first time presented to the voters fairly and squarely on its merits without any other stalking horse characters being forced upon the ballot.

"Mrs. Rushlight and I enjoyed every minute of our trip," said the mayor, avoiding further reference to politics. "We were entertained delightfully at San Francisco by Mayor Rolph, and we spent a week at Honolulu, most of the time as the guests of the mayor of that city. One of the features of the entertainment offered us was a garden party, at which some of the most famous native dancers of the islands gave a private exhibition."

Portland Forecasts Praised.

"One of the conclusions I have come to after seeing the important cities of the coast is that Portland is the best paved, best lighted and morally the cleanest of them all. There is less poverty here and more contentment among the laboring classes than elsewhere."

"I want to correct a misleading statement in a local paper concerning an interview in which a reporter, through an evident misunderstanding, made it appear that I had criticized Governor West. Sheriff Word and District Attorney Evans. The statement was made that I had accused these gentlemen of 'fourflushing.' This is an erroneous impression. I did not make such a statement. I did say that Portland could not be very immoral if such estimable gentlemen as the officials mentioned have not been able to find any more evidence of immorality and graft in Portland than had been unearthed after months of digging. I also said that I had not been 'fourflushing' when I told the public I would cooperate with the governor or any other public official in any kind of a campaign against vice. I suppose the reporter drew the inference that I had intended the epithet for the officials he mentioned in the dispatch."

TRUST AND SAVINGS BANK WITH CAPITAL OF \$500,000 IS PLAN

bank is being organized to handle certain lines of business which cannot be taken care of by a national bank," said Mr. Keating. "These lines are a legitimate part of the banking business and necessary for the accommodation of the clientele of a bank."

Will Accept Savings.

"For example, the Trust and Savings bank will be prepared to lend money on mortgage, to execute trusts, act as ex-

ecutor, administrator, guardian, assignee, trustee, receiver and depository. We will receive savings deposits and handle an investment bond business."

"The Trust & Savings bank will occupy additional quarters recently taken by the Lumbermens National bank on the ground floor of the Lumbermens building Fifth and Stark streets, across the hall from the office of the Lumbermens National. The Trust & Savings bank will do no commercial banking, but will do a savings bank business, although that part of its operations will not be commenced until the bank is moved into the library building, some time next year."

Keating Managing Officer.

In order to have identity of purpose and management between the allied institutions, Mr. Keating, who is vice president and managing officer of the Lumbermens National bank, will be the managing officer of the Trust & Savings bank as well. The remainder of the official staff of the Trust & Savings bank will be announced later. That board of directors will be identical with that of the Lumbermens National bank. The stockholders of the Lumbermens National bank will have the privilege of subscribing for stock of the Lumbermens Trust & Savings bank on a basis of fifty per cent of their holdings of national bank stock.

Capital Exceeds \$1,700,000.

The combined capital and surplus of the Lumbermens National bank and the Lumbermens Trust & Savings bank will be in excess of \$1,700,000. This powerful organization has developed within a few years. The Bankers & Lumbermens bank, a state institution, was organized in May, 1906, with quarters in the Lumber Exchange building, Second and Stark streets, with a capital of \$250,000. The bank was nationalized July 6, 1908, and in June, the next year, the bank occupied its present quarters at Fifth and Stark streets. April 10, 1910, its capital was increased to \$500,000. On July 1, 1911, capital was further increased to \$1,000,000.

Snow Trip to Valdez Begun.

Nome, Alaska, March 7.—Driving the Hennessey dog team, Michael Samuels, veteran musher, is en route today on the 2000 mile over-snow trail to Valdez. He expects to cut the usual 25 day trip by at least five days, owing to the unusually fine condition of the trail.

WILL LET VOTERS CONTROL GRANTS

Bill Extending Initiative and Referendum to City Franchises, Up at Olympia.

State House, Olympia, Wash., March 7.—Because the state supreme court decided this week that the initiative and referendum could not be applied to franchise grants by a city, the house today gave unanimous consent to Representative Keating's bill to introduce a bill that will result in submission to the voters of all proposed franchises.

It was believed that the Gandy law of 1911 extended the initiative and referendum provisions, when part of city charter to the utmost limit, but the supreme court decided otherwise. Jurisdiction of franchise cases was vested in the mayor and city council.

Governor Lister today approved the following bills:

H. B. 158, permitting an extra justice of the peace at Seattle.

H. B. 164, permitting annexation of territory to a drainage district.

The Iowa red light abatement law stands approved by the senate. It passed the upper house by a vote of 23 to 10, after four hours' debate yesterday afternoon.

This bill provides that when a house is found to be a nuisance for immoral purposes it shall be closed to all use for six months. Any citizen, as well as the prosecuting attorney, may bring action against the proprietor or lessee of a house to enjoin it as a nuisance. If the injunction is violated the owner of the building or lessee may be imprisoned for six months or fined from \$200 to \$1000, and the furniture in the

house may be sold to pay the costs.

The bill was stoutly defended by Senator White, who was aided by Senators Metcalf and Davis. It was bitterly opposed by Senators Collins, Nichols and Rosenhaupt.

PENDLETON PEOPLE SET UP "TAINTED MONEY" CRY

Pendleton, Or., March 7.—Pendleton is in the midst of an agitation for and against a Carnegie library. A proposal to provide a site and maintenance funds for a \$40,000 structure to be built by the Carnegie commission is now before

the council and there is the usual protest against the acceptance of "tainted money." The library board, prominent club women and many business men are advocating the acceptance of a part of the steel king's fortune while others, among them Judge Stephen A. Lowell, consider such a course a disgrace to the city and its people. The decision will not be announced before next week.
