

ALUMCHINE DEATH

LIST DOWN TO 30

**Twenty Bodies Found So Far;
Injured Number 70; Loss,
\$200,000.**

Baltimore, Md., March 8.—Not more than 30 persons met death in the explosion of 300 tons of dynamite being loaded on the British tramp steamer Alunchine yesterday at Curtis bay, a Baltimore suburb, according to revised lists compiled here today.

The number of injured is placed at 70. The bodies of 20 dead have been brought to the morgue, but prevailing cold weather probably will delay the

Tales of heroism today were numerous. John Goodhue, in a launch, saved 18 persons and tugs from Curtis bay saved everyone aboard the tug Atlantic. The United States navy collier Jason was wrecked along with the Alumchins and the tug Atlantic. The monetary loss is estimated at \$200,000.
