PUBLIC SCHOOL SYSTEM, FREED FROM POLITICS, THRIVES IN GRAND RAPIDS

Mark Norris Tells of Efficiency Gained by New Plan of School Management.

Mark Norris, a prominent and wealthy man of affairs and president of the board of education of Grand Rapids, Mich., and his daughter, Miss M. A. Norris, are guests at the Portland hotel.

Mr. Norris having been called here by his timber and banking interests.

The public school system of Grand Rapids is known to be one of the most advanced and efficient in the country and it was of this that I asked Mr. Norris to tell me something.

"Seven years ago the public schools of Grand Rapids were taken out of politics," said Mr. Norris. "Prior to that time the board of education consisted of 25 men, two elected from each ward, together with the mayor. The board now consists of nine men, elected at large for terms of three years each. Under this plan inaugurated seven years ago, the system was placed on a civil service basis, was divided into two separate divisions with two separate heads, one of these is the superintendent of schools and the other is the superintendent of business. Marked economy was at once attained, there being a saving the first year of \$45,000 on incidentals alone. In fact the plan has been so notably successful that a bill is now pending in the legislature to operate all the schools of the state in the same way.

"Grand Rapids was the first city in the state to take her schools out of politics and make the board a separate municipal organization. The only connection with the city government is that the council can veto the budget, which is very unfortunate, for in most instances, it seems, that councilmen are totally ignorant of the needs.

Difficulties That Are Met.

"From an educational standpoint Grand Rapids has some peculiar problems. For instance there is a strong element among the Catholics and Hollanders, who attend the parochial schools, at least 25 per cent of the children of the city are in the parochial schools. In view of this, we have opened our industrial departments of the public schools to these pupils, who would otherwise be unable to get any industrial training. Fourteen hundred pupils are attending these departments. In the past seven years five of the old school buildings have been condemned and torn down on the grounds of bad lighting, or for the reason that they were fire traps or were structurally unsafe. These buildings have been replaced with new, fireproof buildings modern in every respect. Two new high schools accommodating 2,500 pupils have been erected. The total enrollment in the public schools of the city is approximately 17,000. Our teaching corps numbers 625. We have 39 school buildings, the finest high school building having cost \$450,000. Our total investment in public schools and equipment is between \$4,000,000 and \$5,000,000. Our high schools are very strong and have an enrollment of 2,500 pupils. We opened open air schools last summer and so successful were they that they have been continued this winter, although there was 8 or 10 inches of snow on the ground when I left."

Mr. Norris will explain the open air

The Kribs residence occupies a half block and is a large 12 room structure with exterior walls of stucco. It is of pure California mission type of architecture and is one of the first dwellings of mission style erected in Portland.

That was in 1841, and for three weeks the young man was the only student. He was graduated in 1845, went to Yale and was given a bachelor's degree and then returned to Ann Arbor and received a bachelor's degree, thus he held two degrees given in the same year.

Mark Norris was graduated from the Ann Arbor institution with the class of 1879 and last year his son, Samuel Abbott Norris, was graduated with the class of 1912.

MINISTERS INDORSE MOVING PICTURES

CHAMBERLAIN BELIEVES SUIT WILL BE HURRIED

Washington, March 13.—"While I was unable to call on the attorney general yesterday afternoon," said Senator Chamberlain today, "in company with Senator Lane, Slinnott, Lafferty and Judge King, I am very anxious that the land grant forfeiture case should be expedited as much as is consistent with a proper regard for the interests of the government. I understand that the duties of special assistant attorney general Townsend will be lightened so that he can push the case more vigorously. The people of Oregon have been manifesting a considerable anxiety to have this case settled, and especially those who have settled on the lands in question. I feel sure that the administration will hasten this case as much as possible."
