Municipal Departments Should All Be 100 Per Cent Perfect, Says W. H. Allen in Address to Society Women.

"Every municipal department should be 100 per cent efficient. Every business organization, whether made up of either men or women, should be 100 per cent efficient," said William H. Allen before a group of society women of Portland in the home of Mrs. Solomon Hirsch this morning.

Dr. Allen said if he had a great amount of money to spend for philanthropy he wouldn't spend it for expensive hospitals where he could shelter only a few, but that he would try to spend the money to do practical good for the greatest number of people where they live.

Dr. Allen described the training school for efficient administration that has been established largely through the efforts of Mrs. E. H. Harriman. It trains men to serve expertly and efficiently as comptrollers, health officers, school supervisors, engineers.

He was introduced by Charles D. Mahaffie. Guests were received by Mrs. Hirsch, whose home is at Washington and St. Clair streets.

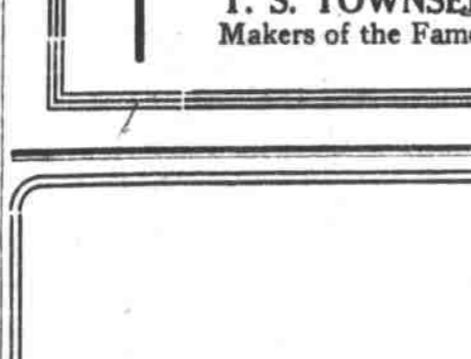

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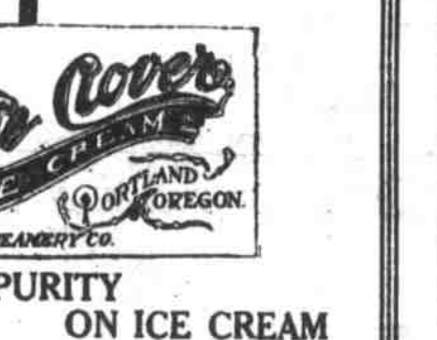
