

CHINESE GUNMAN, SUSPECT IN TONG WAR, IS ARRESTED

Wong Suey, Vice President of Hop Sing, Taken by Detectives in Cabin North of Vancouver, Wash.

Wong Suey, a Hop Sing gunman, who carried in his pocket a black and ugly revolver of large caliber, was arrested this morning near Fisher's Landing, on the Washington side of the Columbia river, in a cabin north of Vancouver, by Detectives Tichenor and Abbott, of Portland, after they had gone there in the police automobile in response to a tip that he was hiding there.

Wong Suey is vice president of the Hop Sing tong in Portland. He had \$219 in his pocket when searched.

The detectives returned to Portland with the captive Chinaman at 2 o'clock this afternoon. He was booked ostensibly as a witness to the shooting Sunday night of Lam Foon and Chung Ah Kong, the Bow Leongs who fell before the bullets of Hop Sing players.

Wong Suey was found in a cabin with five other Chinese. He was lying in a bunk under a heap of blankets. The detectives learned that he had been there since Monday morning.

Tichenor and Abbott had information that Wong Suey was in Portland the night of the shooting. He fled that night to this hiding place. So well was he kept hidden that white men about the camp did not even know of his presence there.

So far no trace has been found of Lew Koon, the crafty Hop Sing leader whose (regarded as the directing hand in Sunday night's murders.

With the discovery that Fong Gue Long, the San Francisco Hop Sing gunman believed to have been one of those who did the actual shooting, is scarred with many bullet wounds, the police and District Attorney Evans believe the case against him has been greatly strengthened.

Found on Body.
Fong Gue Long was required to strip down in his cell. His body was found, however, the scars of half a dozen bullet wounds. One of them showed that he had once been shot through the lungs. Almost every one of the scars was that of a dangerous wound.

Under orders from Chief of Police Slover, the Chinatown patrol is still heavily strengthened. The chief fears that another outbreak like that of Sunday night is imminent. He has ordered an inquest to be held at 4:30 o'clock this afternoon at Dunning & McEntee's undertaking establishment over the bodies of Lam Foon and Chung Ah Kong, the murdered Chinamen.

No trace of the firebug could be found. The case will be turned over to the police.

GET \$581 FOR 2 MONTH CRUISE

Halibut Schooner, Washington Maintains Its Reputation for Luck.

Seattle, Wash., March 19.—Every fisherman aboard the power halibut schooner Washington, which arrived in Seattle Sunday morning after a two months' cruise in Alaskan waters, today received a check for \$581 as his share of the money received for the catch.

During the time the Washington was in the north, she made three shipments to Seattle in addition to the big catch she brought down. Each one of the shipments met a good market which accounts for the large dividends.

The latest trip confirms the belief along the waterfront that the Washington is one of the luckiest halibut schooners running out of Seattle. Her luck has been a byword for the past 15 months, during which time she has netted her owner, E. B. Larson, \$4800, or an average of \$320 a month. This includes several months during which she was laid up.

DOCTORS ENTHUSIASTIC OVER FRIEDMANN NOW

 New York, March 19.—Twenty cases of tuberculosis of the bone were treated at Mount Sinai hospital today by Dr. Friedman of Berlin. He also is prepared to treat physical deformity cases in the same institution tomorrow.

Dr. Friedman was immensely pleased over reports of progress in the cases of tuberculosis he treated today. He said that the 17 patients inoculated with Friedman's vaccine were examined, and marked improvement is said to have been noted in each case. Physicians present at the examination were enthusiastic over the results.

The Philadelphia board of health has invited Dr. Friedman to go to that city, saying the governor of Pennsylvania would grant him a special license to practice.

MEET TO DECIDE ON BRIDGE ACTION TONIGHT

 Vancouver, Wash., March 19.—At the regular meeting of the Commercial club tonight, some definite action will be taken relative to raising funds for the construction of Pacific highway bridge or the matter will be dropped until the next session of the legislative two years hence.

It is contended that bonds in the sum of approximately \$500,000 against the county can be floated, and what is needed for half of the construction price of the bridge used. Should this method be adopted and the bonds voted, the structure will be made a toll bridge from which sufficient revenue will be derived, it is thought, to meet the interest and in time take up the bonds.

LOU A. HEBERLIE KILLS HIMSELF AT GRANTS PASS

 Grants Pass, Or., March 19.—Lou A. Heberlie, a resident of Grants Pass, committed suicide at noon today by hanging himself in a small shed at the rear of his home here. He was found dead by his wife on her return home from the funeral of a neighbor. Heberlie was formerly well to do, but lost his money in a mercantile failure, since which time he has held a suicidal mania.

IT PAYS TO TELEPHONE IF YOU ARE AN OWNER

New York, March 19.—One hundred and ninety nine million dollars was the gross receipts of the American Telephone & Telegraph Co. last year, according to the yearly report issued from the company's offices here today. The receipts show an increase of \$7,000,000 over the 1911 figures.

The report also shows that there are 7,455,000 Bell telephones in use in the United States.

FIVE MEN ARE INJURED WHEN ENGINE EXPLODES

Port Gamble, Wash., March 19.—Five men were burned, one of whom, Owen Larsen, will die, when the steam drill in the engine room of the Puget Mill company's plant here, blew up at 1 o'clock Tuesday afternoon. The boiler had been tested by the inspector Monday and reported by the rocks and bushes being made into the cause of the accident.

Dies After Wandering in Hills.

Grants Pass, Or., March 19.—Joseph Green, a blacksmith, who escaped from his attendants while delirious from pneumonia Sunday and wandered in the hills all night, died Monday morning. The funeral was held today at 10 o'clock. Death was due to the exposure during the night in the hills when Green was unprotected except by a light shirt and a pair of trousers, his bare feet being badly frozen by the rocks and bushes before he was found by woodcutters. He was about 35 years of age, unmarried, and lived with his mother on Fourth street.

THREE INJURED IN UNDERWORLD GO

Saloon Men Are Attacked With Knives and Bricks at Pendleton.

Pendleton, Or., March 19.—Three men are seriously injured and another slightly as result of ambush of several saloon men last night in this city by an underworld gang.

Charles Morrison, proprietor of the Olympia bar, has a deep cut on the side of his head, many contusions and several ribs torn. Carl Churchill has a broken jaw, and Roy Stuart may lose one eye from knife wounds.

Stuart, Churchill and Nelson St. Denis are bartenders at the Olympia and early in the evening Ernest Todhunter, a notorious character, was seen to take money deposited on the bar by a patron. An altercation ensued and Todhunter was ejected from the saloon.

Shortly after closing hours, Morrison and the three bartenders went to a wooden joint for lunch and on coming out were attacked by five or six men armed with knives and vitrified brick.

Before the police arrived all had made their get-away. Only one other than Todhunter was recognized. It was shortly thereafter that warrants were issued for the arrest of the gang.

ENTIRE NORTHWEST IS IN STORM'S GRIP

 Pendleton, Or., March 19.—Spring is not yet a sleek and snow storm began early this morning and has been continuing all day. "No damage reported to grain, but sheepmen will suffer as they are in the midst of lambing season."

La Grande, Or., March 19.—Union county is blanketed in snow again today, following a six-inch snowfall last night. It is estimated that the snow is of considerable length of time.

Hepner, Or., March 19.—It commenced snowing about 3 o'clock this morning and about the inches of snow is on the ground now.

Walla Walla, Wash., March 19.—A heavy fall of snow started at an early hour this morning and from indications will continue some time. Farmers say no damage will be done wheat.

Seattle, Wash., March 19.—Snow covers Seattle to a depth varying from two to three inches. The storm commenced late yesterday afternoon and continued throughout the night, the heaviest fall occurring between 6 and 8 o'clock this morning, when a cold north wind blew the clouds away. Reports from sound points show the snowfall to be general throughout western Washington.

JUSTICE COMES TOO LATE FOR INSANE MAN

 Columbus, Ohio, March 19.—Stirred by the "injustice of the sentence," Governor Cox today pardoned William Welch, aged 35, who was given a life sentence in the state penitentiary for stealing \$1 worth of bacon when he was hungry. A few months of prison life brought Welch face to face with his fate, and constant brooding over his sentence broke his mind, and today he is believed to be hopelessly insane.

Six years ago Welch, penniless and hungry, was wandering through southern Ohio looking for work. At Greenville he opened the door of a dwelling and stole a few pounds of bacon. Welch was caught, brought into court and admitted his guilt. Then the judge sentenced him to life imprisonment, declaring the laws of Ohio provided that sentence for anyone breaking into an occupied dwelling with intent to steal and that he "had no other alternative."

KING OFFERED JOB BUT IT'S NOT BIG ENOUGH

 Washington, March 19.—Judge King was offered a position as assistant attorney general, assigned to the agricultural department, at \$5000 a year, but declined it on account of the insufficient salary. Later he was told the position was under civil service, so he wondered whether the job was on him. Now he is questioning whether assistant attorney general is really under civil service. He thinks not.

SENT TO PENITENTIARY FOR TEN YEAR TERM

Louis H. Magley was sentenced by Judge Gatens today to ten years in the penitentiary for his part in the robbery of R. A. Kennedy, on January 3. Magley's partner, Corbett H. Griggs, who pleaded guilty, is now serving a similar sentence.

Magley's attorney, Seneca Fouts, asked Judge Gatens to permit Magley to be sent to New York and from there to be deported to his native country, Greece, on condition that he enlist in the Greek army and never return to America. The judge refused, saying this is a matter for Governor West to decide.

MAYOR RUSHLIGHT IN THE GRAND JURY ROOM

At the request of the grand jury Mayor Rushlight appeared before that body this morning to answer a few questions regarding conditions in city institutions. He was there but a few minutes.

Cleveland Memorial Dedicated.

 Caldwell, N. J., March 19.—In the presence of hundreds of spectators, the home in which President Cleveland was born here was dedicated today as a permanent memorial to the late chief executive. The dwelling is 113 years old.

MECHANICAL EQUIPMENT OF DOCKS GIVEN PRAISE

System Impresses Edward Holman; Returns From Trip; Visited Europe.

"Mechanical equipment of Portland docks is entirely up to standard," said Frederick W. Mulkey, chairman of the Portland dock commission, this morning after his return from New York city, Washington, D. C., and other eastern cities.

In Washington Mr. Mulkey consulted with the engineer of the department of public docks, on matters relative to the proper mechanical equipment of Portland docks. "Some Portland shippers have made complaint," said Mr. Mulkey, "that Portland docks are not properly nor adequately equipped with mechanical appliances. After consulting with eastern experts, however, I am convinced that Portland is well fixed in this respect, the real difficulty being in the fact that the shippers themselves are not familiar with just what dock requirements are."

"The authorities have prepared a detailed report on the mechanical equipment of New York city docks, and I have requested that 20 or 30 copies of this report be sent me. When they arrive I shall distribute them among the heaviest shippers in Portland so that they may read up and learn some things of which they are probably ignorant. I am more than ever satisfied after my visit east that Portland shippers have no just complaint to make relative to the mechanical equipment of our docks."

Mr. Mulkey says that his visit east was largely for purposes of rest and recuperation and that outside of a little dock business he had no official or professional experiences while away.

He said he had no intention of disposing of the goods he stole, but was going to use them for his family.

He said he had no idea the postal inspectors were working on the case, and that his first arrest came as a big surprise to him. Martin had been employed as assistant mail messenger for about 15 months. The man holding the contract for conveying the mail to and from the trains had turned the job over to him as assistant.

Martin has lived in Salem several years. He married a widow with 10 children, most of whom are now at home. "None of them work."

DECREEES FORFEITING 80,000 ACRES OF LAND TO THE U. S. SIGNED

1500 acres in Lane county; Olean Land company and Wilson River Lumber company, 2000 acres in the Coast range near Tillamook; Steward B. Eakin, Orin Robinson and the Booth Kelly company, 2000 acres southeast of Eugene; Elk Creek Lumber company, 1200 acres in Douglas county; Charles H. Chick, Constantine Morton and Everett P. Lewis, 2100 acres along the McKenzie river, east of Eugene; John A. Black and J. J. Kenney, 2300 acres in Douglas county.

Hardship is worked into these people by reason of the fact that they have been cutting lumber from these tracts, and in many cases the sole existence of mills depend upon them. An agreement has been reached by the government attorneys with these people, whereby they are to continue their cuttings with the understanding that the timber claimants will buy the lands at \$2.50 an acre, according to the compromise agreement.

The stipulations were presented this morning by Glenn V. Husted, special assistant to the attorney general. He spent the winter in Portland taking testimony in the 25 cases which were ended in the action that transpired in court today. Forty-five of the land purchasers have expressed their willingness to have their cases taken up in this manner and Mr. Husted will begin on the 20 that remain sometime next month.

PRaises SOUTH AMERICAN DOCKS

System Impresses Edward Holman; Returns From Trip; Visited Europe.

Edward Holman, the well known third street undertaker, accompanied by Mrs. Holman, returned to Portland Tuesday night from a three months' trip abroad. The Holmans sailed from New York December 12 for the east coast of South America, stopping for a day or so at all of the larger ports from the mouth of the Amazon river to Buenos Ayres. Mr. Holman was very much impressed with the superior shipping facilities provided at the large South American ports.

Discussing his trip today, Mr. Holman said: "Every port from the mouth of the Amazon to Buenos Ayres has magnificent concrete docks, and great roomy steel constructed warehouses. Between the docks and the warehouses is a belt line railroad connecting with the trunk lines from the interior. These people know the value of deep sea shipping in building up their cities and developing the country, and they don't hesitate to spend money on their shipping facilities. There is no finer or more complete system of docks and warehouses anywhere than are to be found at Bahia, Rio Janeiro, Buenos Ayres and other Atlantic coast cities of South America."

"In spite of the fact that the South American cities are beautiful and thoroughly modern, we were anxious to get away to London, so great was the heat down there in January and February. I noticed in South America that the complete absence of the American flag on the shipping. I saw not one ship flying the American flag in any South American port."

SUBURBAN POOL ROOMS LINED UP BY SHERIFF

Sheriff Word this morning instructed all of his deputies in the Mount Scott, Leas and surrounding districts, to see to it that card playing in poolrooms is stopped. He told them also to prevent minors from entering such places.

Last night men from Sheriff Word's office raided Erickson's saloon, Second and Burdette streets, and arrested three men and the alleged table keeper on a charge of gambling. An attempt to arrest the proprietor, J. J. Russell, who has been arrested a number of times recently, failed because Word's deputies were unable to find him.

The cases of all the alleged gamblers who have been arrested since last Saturday will probably be heard in the justice court this afternoon.

AUDITOR SAM MARTIN WANTS TO BE SHOWN

Under the contract of Willden & Lewis, architects of the new courthouse is shown to him, County Auditor Sam Martin will refuse to honor the demands of the architects for payment of \$4000 on their fee. Such was the declaration today of Mr. Martin after he had conferred with District Attorney Evans regarding his right to be shown the contract.

The architects have already drawn \$73,500 in fees for planning and supervising the courthouse building. Mr. Martin says that a copy of the contract has never been on file in his office, although he had made payment to the architects because their bills had been passed on by the county court. From now on Mr. Martin will refuse the architects' demands until he has a contract on file in his office.

TARIFF WILL BE ONLY SPECIAL SESSION TOPIC

ACCUSED WILL BE RETURNED TO DUBLIN

Within Francis Henderson, held in custody by government officers on charges of the British government that he is a fugitive from Ireland justice, will be returned to Dublin, Announcement that he would grant the extradition permission was made this afternoon by United States Commissioner A. M. Cannon, before whom the hearing was held last Friday. Sergeant Paget, of the Dublin police force, is here awaiting to take Henderson in custody.

"Authorities in the United States are divided over the legal question that came up in this matter," said Mr. Cannon. "The theory of the defendant's attorney was that he could not be extradited because Henderson's alleged act was made a crime applicable to him after the treaty was adopted in 1889. 'The best authorities in the United States favor the position I have taken in a matter of this kind. English authorities all favor extradition under these circumstances, and that being the case the United States should also allow extradition.'"

Henderson was arrested seven weeks ago on a warrant sworn to by the English consul. He is charged with embezzling, as a broker, in Dublin, Ireland. About two weeks ago Sergeant Paget arrived with all papers concerning the case. In the hearing last Friday Attorney Veezie for the defendant held that because Henderson's charged crime had not been included in the original extradition treaty between the two nations, he could not be extradited from the country. Attorney Hiram Johnson for the British government held that a subsequent amendment to the treaty, which included embezzling as an extraditable crime, would demand Henderson's return. The point was a complex one and Mr. Cannon required briefs from both sides before making a decision.

Henderson has no appeal in the case except direct to President Wilson.
