

### RIGLER FORMALLY RESIGNS POSITION

#### City School Superintendent Reiterates His Former Statement.

Frank Rigler, city superintendent of schools, in a formal written communication presented at the meeting of the school board last night repeated his former oral statement that he is not a candidate for the office again.

"In taking this step," said Mr. Rigler, in part, "I am prompted by what serious reflection has convinced me is the best interest both of the school district and myself. The work of the office has grown so heavy and the correlated activities so numerous that a younger and more robust man is needed for their proper performance."

Mr. Rigler said that he thought he could still be of much service to the schools in directing the work of vocational teaching. The board did not consider the appointment of a successor to Mr. Rigler last night, but action may be taken at a special meeting next Tuesday. L. R. Alderman, present state superintendent of public instruction, has been warmly recommended for the position and D. A. Grout, assistant superintendent, is understood to be a candidate.

#### Gain Is Indicated.

Enrollment in the city schools for the first six months of the 1912-13 school year totaled 26,411, an increase of 816 over the same period last year, according to figures contained in a report from Superintendent Rigler. Of this number Mr. Rigler said that 15,377 were girls and 11,034 were boys. In the last school month the average number of pupils belonging was 25,418, the report showed, of whom 98 per cent were in actual daily attendance.

#### Request Is Received.

A request was received from Walter Asher asking that the superintendent's salary be raised. Representing members of the district, L. P. Brassers asked that the name of Weston school be changed to Woodmen.

#### Joint Request Received.

A joint request was received from the Associated Collegiate Alumnae Oregon, the Mothers' Congress and the Parents' Teachers' association, asking the board to appoint a woman physical director.

### PREFERS CHILDREN'S BED AS MEMORIAL

(United Press Leased Wire.) Santa Barbara, Cal., March 21.—Mrs. Robert Louis Stevenson, widow of the author, does not approve of a suggested plan that public school children by public subscription, raise funds to construct a permanent memorial at her husband's grave.

In a statement issued at her home at Montecito, near here, she said that the grave already is marked by a suitable monument, designed by Bruce Porter and set in Burgin, and adorned by bronze tablets. She suggests that a more suitable expression of esteem would be the endowment in Stevenson's name of a bed in a children's hospital.

#### CHILD OPENS EYES AS FUNERAL STARTS

(Special to The Journal.) Eugene, Or., March 21.—W. N. Cobb, of this city, writes his wife from Sisters, Or., of a strange occurrence at the funeral of a cousin, the 4-year-old daughter of A. Oster, of that place. She had apparently died of smallpox and from fear of contagion burial was arranged for the same day. The funeral procession was about to start for the cemetery, when the parents and onlookers were startled to see the eyes of the child open. A physician was hurriedly sent for and methods of resuscitation resorted to with the result that the child is now well on the road to recovery.

### URGES NEGROES TO BUY LAND

#### Advice Given by Booker T. Washington; Save Money, He Advises.

In his address at Gypsy Smith auditorium last night, Booker T. Washington, president of Tuskegee Institute, urged the people of his race to invest some of their money in farm land in the northwest, that they might have it to sell to the Europeans who he said would come, willing to buy, after the Panama canal is opened.

Dr. Washington was introduced by Colonel E. Hofer of Salem. Approximately 5000 people heard the address, which was in the nature of an appeal to the negroes in Portland. Dr. Washington advised the people of his race to save some of their money for a "rainy day," which he said is sure to come.

"You negroes of Portland are only few in number," Dr. Washington said, "but remember that you represent the millions of your fellows in the south. They will be judged largely by your actions. If you lead good, conscientious, honest, upright lives, obey the laws of God and man and become good citizens, your lives will reflect to good advantage on the lives of the vastly greater number of negroes in the south. If, on the other hand, you are not good, law-abiding, God-fearing citizens, the general effect will be just the opposite and you will put all the negroes in the country in a bad light."

#### ORCHARDISTS WELCOME COLD AT HOOD RIVER

(Special to The Journal.) Hood River, Or., March 21.—A fierce snow storm visited the Hood River valley Thursday and the thermometer rapidly sank toward the zero mark. The cold spell is welcomed by the orchardists, as it will retard the flowing of the sap in the fruit trees and prevent loss from later frosts.

New York, March 21.—Charged with selling large tracts of Deal, N. J., lands to which the original titles were not clear, George W. Young, husband of Madame Nordica, the opera singer, with

his brother, Alvin, and two others, was indicted today by the Hudson county grand jury. Young is one of the principal stockholders in the Port Au Feu Realty company.

### SWINDLERS IN EAST SELL LOTS IN FAKE TOWNSITE

Centrals, Wash., March 21.—Charles R. Cook, a Centrals business man, yesterday received from a friend in South Dakota a map of the fake townsite of Port Washington, supposed to be located in Pacific county, and lots in which are being sold throughout the middle west for from \$200 to \$250. The

map shows factories, railroads and public park. The South Bend Commercial club asserts that the townsite was laid out years ago, but that deeds were never filed with the Pacific county auditor.
