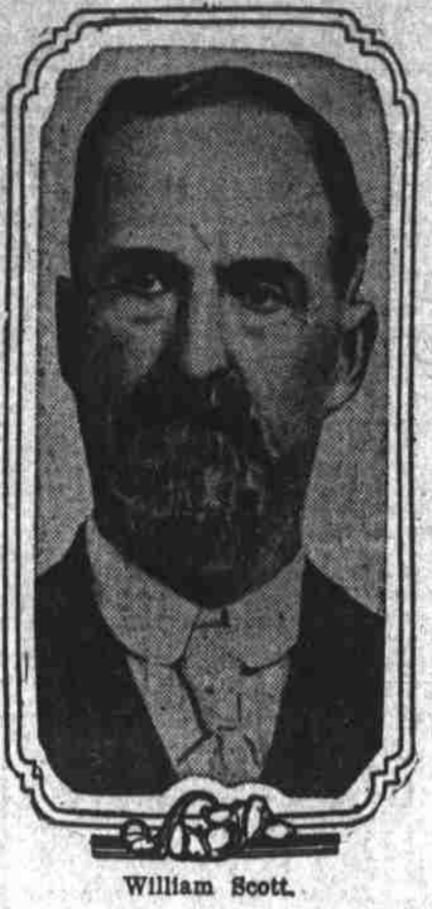

FARMS ONE PIECE FOR 35 YEARS

Wm. Scott, Inland Empire Pioneer, Recalls His Experiences.



William Scott, one of the pioneer wheat raisers of the inland empire, is in town for a few days, visiting with his son-in-law, Dr. Mann. Mr. Scott has just come from Long Beach, Cal., where he spent the winter. He is accompanied by his cousin, James A. Traxel, from Oklahoma.

"I had a sort of family reunion in southern California this winter," said Mr. Scott. "My cousin, Mr. Traxel, came out from Oklahoma. Another cousin, A. D. Scott, still another cousin, came down from Selma, Cal. We had not seen each other for over 60 years, so you can imagine we put in some pretty good hicks talking about old times in Illinois, where we were all raised together."

"I left the old home place in 1859, going from Illinois to Kansas, and next spring I started across the plains for Oregon, walking the entire distance, driving cattle."

"I settled in Umatilla county, My 640 acre ranch with the little town of Helix. My youngest boy is running the ranch now."

"I have been taking wheat off of that section of land ever since 1873, and year in and year out it is good for from 40 to 60 bushels to the acre. I am ashamed to tell you that I took 66 bushels of wheat to the acre off that ranch one year, one of the biggest records for grain production that I know of."

"My boy is out now with three eight-horse teams plowing, and he says the prospects are that we will get one of the biggest crops that we have ever had."

"I don't say that I am 75 years old any more. When I was a young fellow of 40 or 50, I used to talk about being 80 many years old, but now I am 75 years young. I never felt better in all my life."

"I get as much pleasure out of my auto as I used to get out of my bay team of trotters, and not many horses could pass the auto."

"I live in Walla Walla now, and spend the winters in Long Beach."

"I am going to stop over a few days in Portland to visit some old friends and then I will go on up to Walla Walla."

ADDITIONAL CARS PUT ON DURING RUSH HOURS

As a result of conferences held some days ago by General Manager F. W. Hild of the Portland Railway, Light & Power company and State Railroad Commission, the company has added several cars to its service during the rush hours. The greater number of them have been added to the service on the Sunnyside-Mount Tabor line and the Mount Scott line, for on these lines the records of both the company and the commission showed the greatest traffic.

General Manager Hild stated this morning that the commission had been engaged in checking up the traffic for several weeks, with the result that cars have been added to some of the lines.

"The railroad commission has been checking up our traffic," said Mr. Hild, "in addition to the figures gathered by our own employees, and we are improving the service from time to time."

STILL COUNTING TAX MONEY PAID TO COUNTY

With more to come, the total count of taxes paid prior to closing time last Saturday amounts to \$5,419,999.33. Out-of-town checks which were mailed before March 15 are coming in yet, and checks already in or which were returned on account of errors are still to be counted. Chief Deputy Huckabee expects that the total will reach \$6,000,000. Partial payments of personal taxes in which the exempted property is eliminated have been made by many, but checks made out in this manner are not being accepted, as no authority has been received by Sheriff Word to accept such payments. But two weeks remain in which half payments may be made. April 7 is the last day and after that date all taxes unpaid will become delinquent.
