She will load for Europe, the larger part of her cargo to be made up of wheat. The Steinbek was in port since February 28.

Also the rates are said to be the highest for so early in the season for a great many years,

She is the British ship Crown of India, Captain Hunter, which arrived from Cape Town on December 27. She is at Westport load-ing for the United Kingdom under charto Comyn, Mackall & Co. She is said to have been delayed on account of the difficulty in getting lumber.

CROWN OF SEVILLE SAILS

Harrison Liner Due Tomorrow for Lumber and Flour,

On her second trip to this port this month, the British steamship Crown of Seville of the Harrison line sailed from Nanaimo for Portland last night. She will be due to arrive here tomorrow evening, and Thursday morning she will be expected to begin loading lumber for the Philippines for the United States government. The contract for the lumber was let to Balfour, Guthrie & Co., local agents of the Harrison line, and in addition to the cargo for the quartermaster department they will ship some flour to Manila to fill the remainder of the space on the steamer. She will sail from here with about 4,000,000 feet of Douglas fir and between 600 and 800 tens of flour. She will steam for Manila direct.

CABIN BOY SICK

Armand Caberduc Gets Typhoid on French Bark Vendee.
