

DEADLY FLOOD TO FLOOD WORK OF DAYTON

Will Require Two Weeks to Dig Out Mud and Months to Make City Habitable Once More.

Tent City at Dayton.

Dayton, Ohio, April 1.—That it will be ten years before Dayton recovers from the disastrous flood which has almost ruined the city was the prediction here today of Major Thaddeus, military aide to President Wilson, who came here with Secretary of War Garrison.

"It will require two weeks' hard work even to make an impression on the debris in the streets, alleys and doorways," Major Thaddeus said, "and it will be two months before the city will be comfortably habitable. We have established a tent city for refugees on the fair grounds to relieve the congestion and to prevent the spread of disease."

Flood Conditions Improving.

(United Press Staff Wire.)
Columbus, Ohio, April 1.—Flood conditions are fast improving here today and normal conditions soon will be restored. A cleanup campaign is on in full blast. The dead list is unchanged. The sewer and his assistants are searching the vicinity of Greenlaw and Mount Calvary cemeteries, where a large area still is inundated. An enormous amount of wreckage is reported there.

Miss Mabel Brockman, of the National Red Cross, inspected the flood district today and conferred with Governor Cox. She proposes that Columbus establish a system of relief similar to that used in San Francisco after the great earthquake and fire.

Four more corpses were recovered today, making a total of 70 found.

TEXT OF DECISION ON FREIGHT RATES

I. C. C.'s Ruling on West-Bound Transcontinental Commodity Rates.

(Washington Bureau of the Journal.)
Washington, April 1.—In the matter of the transcontinental commodity rates west bound the text of the Interstate Commerce Commission decision rendered yesterday upholding the rates says:

"For many years the transcontinental rates have maintained lower commodity rates from east of Colorado common points to Pacific coast terminals than to points intermediate, such as Reno and Spokane, upon the theory that the former were forced by competition of steamship lines from the eastern seaboard via Panama. Following the amendment to the fourth section of the act in 1910 and the progress of the commission based thereon, the carriers have filed tariffs in which it is proposed to increase the terminal rate to or in excess of the interior rate on all commodities which are not actually or potentially affected by this water competition. These tariffs are under suspension in this proceeding.

Following hearings before the commission here in which the parties have been in informal conference between themselves and with the commission, and by their mutual consent, most of the items in the controversy have been adjusted satisfactorily to shippers. Upon consideration of all the facts the remaining rates under suspension, except certain ones that are specifically modified herein, are not found to be unreasonable and the order of suspension as to them is vacated."
