

20,000 WITHOUT HOMES AND FOOD IS BADLY NEEDED

Southern Illinois Conditions Disclosed by Red Cross Investigation; 30 Ohio Towns Inundated, 20 in Indiana.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Washington, April 5.—Telegraphing from the flood district, Ernest Bicknell, secretary of the National American Red Cross society, says that 20,000 persons are homeless in southern Illinois, and that food is badly needed in the stricken districts.
At least 30 cities and towns, Bicknell said, are inundated in Ohio, 20 in Indiana, and many in Illinois, Kentucky and West Virginia.
His message adds:
"The boundary line surrounding the flooded territory is more than 2,000 miles long. The situation is extremely serious in many Indiana towns."
Bicknell also transmitted a report from Adjutant-General Dickson, of Illinois, showing the condition in that state is critical.

Cairo Levees May Hold.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Cairo, Ill., April 5.—With the river rising slowly and a choppy wind whipping the flood waters into fair sized waves, thus adding to the pressure on the levees, the situation here today was regarded as serious. It was generally believed, however, that the levees would hold.

Reports received here say that the levee is gone at Point Pleasant, Mo. If this is true, it will relieve the flood situation here.

Advisers received here shortly before noon said the citizens of Mound City, Ill., were threatened by weakening levees. Colonel Moriarity, commanding the militia here, started for Mound City at once to take charge of the situation. He also plans to investigate charges that soldiers at Mound City and Villa Ridge have been rioting.

Levees Break at Memphis.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Memphis, Tenn., April 5.—The levees confining the waters in Bayou Gavoso, on the south side, broke today, flooding five city blocks. No fatalities are reported. The break will inundate that section of Memphis flooded last year.
The city engineers have abandoned hope of preventing the inundation of the north Memphis. Prisoners from the county jail are working on the levees. Seven blocks are now under water, all of them being in the poorer districts. Hundreds of persons were rescued when the levee broke.
At 1 o'clock this afternoon Police Inspector Perry warned everyone living in the lowlands to flee.

Asks Congress for Two Millions.

Columbus, O., April 5.—Two million dollars will be appropriated by congress for the relief of the Ohio sufferers if plans completed by Governor James M. Cox here today work successfully. The governor has arranged to have Senator Fomeroy ask congress for this amount, and declares that in his belief the appropriation will be made.
Eighty seven bodies, all identified, are recovered here today.

Evansville Is Inundated.

Evansville, Ind., April 5.—Floods have inundated 20 miles of Evansville's streets today. The business section is partially under water, and many buildings there are endangered. Nearby towns report that they are in great distress.

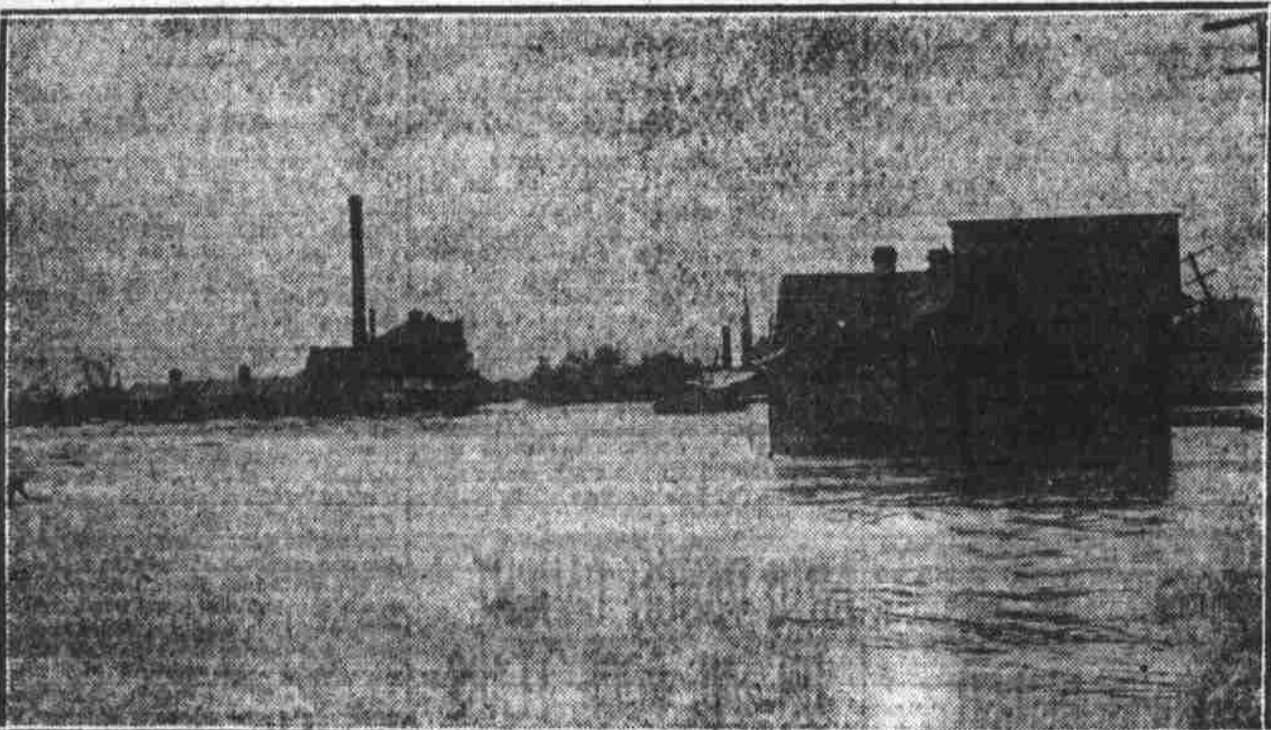
FLOOD SCENES IN CITY OF DAYTON, OHIO

It is believed that by keeping the tongers off the reserve this year entirely, the channels will become so well stocked that the Nema and Long Island reserves may thereafter be opened alternate years and the growers supplied with young growth every year. OJEDA SHUT UP TIGHT IN NAGO

Federal General Makes Feeble Effort to Break Rebel Cordon.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Nago, Ariz., April 5.—Determined to prevent General Pedro Ojeda and his command of 300 federalists from escaping into Chihuahua, 1500 Sonora constitutionalists drew their lines closer about Nago, Mexico, today, and a battle is imminent.
Ojeda retired behind his defenses shortly before midnight after a half-hearted attempt to cut his way through the rebel lines. Firing was desultory for half an hour. It is not believed anyone was wounded.
Permission of both rebel and federal leaders was granted the Cananea Consolidated Copper company today to move 40 cars of fuel oil and coke from Nago, Ariz., to Cananea, Sonora. Bridges between the towns are being repaired and it is expected that the smelters closed down early this week because of a fuel shortage, will resume operations Monday, giving employment to 3000 idle men.

JUDGE W. P. LYON DIES AT AGE OF 91

San Jose, Cal., April 5.—Judge William P. Lyon, for 25 years chief justice of the Wisconsin supreme court, is dead here today. He was 91 years old. Judge Lyon was an ardent supporter of Senator Robert M. La Follette. He had made his home in California for the last 10 years.
