

MORGAN'S BODY IS ABOARD LA FRANCE BOUND FOR U. S.

Remains for Late American Financier Rest in Improvised Mortuary Amidst a Wealth of Floral Tributes.

Havre, April 5.—With the band playing and flags fluttering, the big French liner La France gave no sign of being a funeral ship as she slipped into the channel at 6 p. m. today, with the body of J. Pierpont Morgan aboard and headed for New York.

This was in accordance with the expressed wish of Mrs. Herbert L. Satterlee, daughter of the great American financier, who died last Monday in Rome. On coming aboard she asked the ship's officers to recognize in no way the presence of her father's body on the steamship. It was at her request that the usual ocean caissons prevail on the La France on the trip across, and the regular dances, concerts and games will go on.

Body Laid in Stateroom.
Mrs. Satterlee, her husband and Miss Helen Morgan Hamilton, granddaughter of Morgan, accompanied by Dr. Dickson, went to their cabin as soon as they came aboard from a hotel this afternoon, shortly before sailing time, and did not come on deck as long as last was in sight. They did not visit the mortuary on E deck, improvised by throwing two staterooms together. The door of this was locked, no guard was visible, and there was no outward sign that it was a room of death.

Floral Offerings Are Many.
Inside, the mortuary is hung with black velvet, trimmed with silver, and the place is half filled with the costly floral pieces, many of them from royal houses, that showed on the casket in Rome, Paris and Havre.

A big crowd of Americans living in Paris and Havre accompanied the Morgan party to the quay, and stood with uncovered heads until the La France slipped from sight.

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his personal antipathy for President Francisco I. Madero, which he showed in many ways, he would not use his great moral power with the men of the new government in his behalf. It is certain they would not have refused a clear and determined petition of Mr. Wilson, which was the only means of saving the lives of the prisoners. This he did not do, in spite of cablegrams from Washington, in spite of the passionate and pitiful appeals of Mrs. Madero and Mrs. Pino Suarez, in spite of the manifest desire of the other diplomatic representatives, in spite of the petition that I made to him in the embassy in the name of Masonic lodges of the Valley of Mexico, of which I am a worthy grand master, and in spite of the clamors for clemency of all the people in general.

"I accuse Mr. Wilson having known that Mr. Madero and Mr. Pino Suarez were going to be sacrificed with the

pretext of an imperious political necessity although General Huerta and General Diaz made a solemn promise in the presence of diplomatic representatives that if the prisoners would sign their resignations their lives would be respected and they would be allowed to leave for a foreign country.

"I accuse Mr. Wilson of having washed his hands, like Pilate, when the prisoners were not allowed to leave for Europe after having signed their resignations, thus making Mrs. Madero and Mrs. Pino Suarez, who because of the assurances Mr. Wilson made to them, were waiting for their husbands at the Vera Cruz railway depot.

"I accuse Mr. Wilson that, although knowing that the new government still retained as prisoners Mr. Madero and Mr. Suarez, after they had signed their resignations, thus breaking the promise of which the same ambassador was a party thereof, he refused to put them under the protection of the American flag with the pretext that he did not desire to be responsible for the future actions of President Madero and Vice President Suarez.

Charges Double Conduct.
"I accuse Mr. Wilson, the ambassador, of double conduct, having one attitude and advice for the members of the new-born government and another, which he pretended to have with Mrs. Madero and Mrs. Pino Suarez.

"I accuse Mr. Wilson of not having accurately informed his government of the occurrences in Mexico, and of always justifying the victors.

"I accuse Mr. Wilson of having mixed himself up in the politics of Mexico to the extent that in answering a communication of General Huerta, he openly advised him to have the Mexican congress authorize his acts. This was badly taken by the great majority of Mexicans, especially as the government of the United States had not recognized the change of government in Mexico.

Tried to Retain Post.
"I accuse Ambassador Wilson of using means among the members of the American colony of this capital of Mexico to have the government in Washington keep him at his present post.

"There is no doubt that this would be repulsive to most Mexicans after the part played by Mr. Wilson in the last political tragedy in our country.

"I make these concrete charges with the faith of a man of honor and in peril of my life, hoping for justice from the American people and the American government.

(Signed) "LUIS MANUEL ROJAS, Grand Master of the Grand Lodge, Valley of Mexico, Congressman of the United States of Mexico, elected vice-president in the month of September."

Letter From Knox.
Accompanying the charges is a copy of the following letter from Secretary of State Knox:

"Luis M. Rojas, Grand Master of the Lodge of Mexico, Mexico City: Sir.—The department acknowledges the receipt by reference hither from the president, to whom it was addressed, of your telegram of February 20, requesting that this government do all it can to save the lives of Francisco I. Madero and Jose Maria Pino Suarez.

"In reply you are informed that this department had, as a matter of course, several days prior to the death of Madero and Suarez and immediately after their arrest, informed the authorities of Mexico City, through the embassy, of the unfortunate effect which would be produced in this country by an unjust or improper treatment of the deposed president and vice president.

"I am, sir, your obedient servant," "KNOX."

Wilson Brands Charges False.

Mexico City, April 5.—Ambassador Henry Lane Wilson, immediately after reading the charges made against him by Luis Manuel Rojas tonight, dictated his reply to the correspondent of the International News Service as follows:

"Luis M. Rojas was not vice president of congress, but second vice president of the chamber of deputies, an entirely separate and important position.

"His charges are without exception absolutely false.

"No representatives of Huerta or Diaz met in the embassy with the diplomatic corps prior to the downfall of Madero. The only relations that with Huerta and Diaz prior to the downfall of Madero have been reported to the department of state and had for their sole object the preservation of American lives and property.

"My relations with President Madero remained friendly to the last, and I have received an expression to that effect, coupled with thanks for my efforts in behalf of the family, from the present head, Ernesto Madero.

"These charges are born in malice, and have no foundation whatsoever, nor can one single scintilla of proof be adduced to substantiate them."

W. HAYWOOD AND LESSIG FREED ON FREE SPEECH PLEA

Labor Leaders Discharged From Custody Upon Order of New Jersey Supreme Court Justice.

Patterson, N. J., April 5.—The 25,000 silk mill strikers of this city claimed a signal victory today when Justice James F. Minturn, of the supreme court, freed William D. Haywood and Adolph Lessig, labor leaders, from the charge of "unlawful assembly" on which they were held in \$5000 bail each and hundreds of their followers had also been arrested.

Haywood and Lessig appeared before Judge Minturn on writs of habeas corpus obtained from that judge last Tuesday after Recorder James F. Carroll had sentenced them each to six months at hard labor on a "disorderly person" charge, and held them to the grand jury on the "unlawful assembly" charge, based on one of the most ancient of the state's colonial blue laws. On writs of certiorari the two labor leaders had been freed on \$500 bail from the six months' sentence pending a future hearing before the supreme court.

Courtroom Is Crowded.
The courtroom was packed with strike sympathizers as well as representatives of the manufacturers and on the streets for blocks around the building small groups of strikers moved to and fro waiting for the decision. They were not allowed by the police to congregate in any one spot.

At the conclusion of the evidence Judge Minturn delivered a strongly worded decision in which he made it clear that in his opinion the city courts had not administered true American justice to the strikers. He declared there had been no disorderly conduct nor unlawful assembly and said the inalienable right of free speech was also involved.

Prisoners Are Discharged.

meeting of jubilation at Haledon tomorrow afternoon, with Haywood as the star speaker. Nearly 300 strikers held in jail on the same charge of "unlawful assembly," were liberated in custody of counsel by Recorder Carroll soon after Judge Minturn's decision.

Wool Growers Settle Straw.
The opponents of free wool were tonight settling on the sugar development to aid their cause. They say that they are willing to consent to a very material reduction of the wool tariff, but insist that free wool would cost the ranchers of the far west millions of dollars.

Veteran senators who called at the White House today agreed that the mixup in the sugar schedule means a prolonged session of congress.

Senator Smoot, one of the Republican leaders, who is interested in keeping up the tariff because of the beet sugar industry in his state, declares the tariff would not be out of the way before the latter part of July.

"Talk of a short session is amusing," said Smoot. "Personally, I believe that we will be here until nearly August 1, and that there will be no legislation other than the tariff enacted."

FATHER OF 5 SMALL CHILDREN DISAPPEARS

Bernard P. McGinnis disappeared March 22, and his friends and wife are greatly concerned as to his whereabouts. McGinnis was working on a new building at Seventh and Washington streets and drew his pay and took his tools on the night he disappeared. His wife and five children, the youngest but 13 days old, were left penniless and cannot account for his absence. The police have been requested to search for him, as it is feared he has met with an accident or foul play.

McGinnis is 38 years old and has the reputation of being steady and sober. He is a Spanish war veteran and has worked on the police force. He was employed as a strikebreaker by the Harriman system at one time. His wife resides at 298 1/2 Russell street.

Walter Arrested.
H. M. Hudson, 30 years old and a waiter, was arrested last evening by Detectives Hyde and Vaughn for the larceny of \$60 and a watch from a woman. Hudson is in the city jail.

'WOOL SENATORS' ARE NOT EAGER TO JOIN WITH SUGARS

Attempts to Make Combination to Fight Abolition of Tariff Have Thus Far Failed of Success.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Washington, D. C., April 5.—Overtures were made tonight to effect an insurgent combination of senators against free wool and sugar to defeat the administration tariff bill. So far the effort has been unsuccessful. Negotiations will continue tomorrow. The "sugar senators" are said to have made the initial overtures to the anti-free wool members. To secure votes from senators opposed to placing lumber on the free list is also planned.

Louisiana's delegation in congress today was leading the fight against free sugar. After conferences all day with Democratic leaders, Senator Russell awaited word tonight from the sugar cane growers and manufacturers of his state whether or not he should accept the ultimatum of President Wilson that a cent a pound duty shall be placed upon sugar for three years and that it shall go on the free list afterward.

Asks Growers to Decide.
Senator Russell wired his constituents, asking the sugar interests to hold a mass meeting and decide upon acceptance or rejection of Wilson's ultimatum. He said he and other Louisiana senators in congress will abide by the decision of the growers and manufacturers.

Russell interceded with Chairman Simmons of the senate finance committee this afternoon. He told Simmons that the sugar senators were planning to bolt the administration tariff program if the president's sugar schedule is insisted upon. Simmons gave Russell little encouragement.

Plots for Sugar Tariff.
Robert Ewing, Louisiana Democratic national committeeman, also pleaded with Senator Kern of Indiana, the president's spokesman, in the senate to lessen the rigor of the administration's sugar ultimatum.

QUIET PREVAILS AT AUBURN MILLS

Strikers Give Up Picketing Upon Reinforcement of The Militia.

Auburn, N. Y., April 5.—With two companies of militia standing guard over the rope and twine factories here there was little likelihood of trouble from the striking employees of the International Harvester company and the Columbian Rope company.

Conferences between the mill officials and representatives of the employees were held during the day but no progress was made toward an early settlement of the strike. The mill owners took the initiative this afternoon when they served notice on the strikers that unless they returned to work by next Tuesday the mill would be closed and the machinery sent to Europe where business would be resumed.

Strikers Abandon Picketing.

Following the shooting of four men and two women during a fight with the police yesterday and the arrival of Company C of the state militia to reinforce the local company, the strikers appeared to realize that the odds were entirely against them and made practically no attempt to picket the mills since early this morning. After some disturbance at that time the troops drove about 300 strikers back from the mills and maintained their lines about the factories throughout the day. With the troops on guard the district about the twine mills is now virtually under martial law.
