Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, April 7.—The women of the household who have their hearts set on some day owning a piece of land, and the young people just out of school who are looking for opportunities, will find as much of real interest to them in the O. A. C. summer session, which opens June 16 and lasts six weeks, as will the school teachers who are anxious to prepare themselves for advanced positions and bigger salaries.

FAMOUS WOMEN OF HISTORY

Duchess of Devonshire, 1757-1806

The life of Georgiana, Duchess of Devonshire, should be one of untiring happiness and final content. Superficially viewed, she possessed everything that could bring contentment. Noble by birth, she was married before she was 18 to him who was at that time the greatest unmarried nobleman in England. Great riches and stately homes were hers from the day of her birth to her death in her fiftieth year. She was welcomed in the most exclusive circles of the court and the most powerful coteries of the politicians. She had intellect and a most engaging manner—the word "charming" said Fanny Burney, who tried to dislike her, "was coined to apply to the Duchess of Devonshire." Her beauty was the talk of the town and the toast of the most aristocratic tables. She charmed alike the courtiers and the rabble. "If I were God Almighty," cried a fellow in the streets of Westminster when she was canvassing for votes for some friend, "I'd make you queen of heaven!"

The wreck of this girl's life began with her marriage. Yet on every hand this marriage was hailed as a most fortunate one. The bride, daughter of Earl Spencer, was warm hearted and affectionate, with a passion for all that was beautiful in art, a great liking for society, and a certain talent for coquetry. The Duke of Devonshire, to whom she was married, was rich and aristocratic, but in every other respect unfit to be her mate. He was reserved, uncommunicative, formal, frigid. Walpole, writing of a capricious June, said: "The weather, which on Monday was as hot as Lord George (Gordon), is now as cold as the Duke of Devonshire."

Punch once depicted a noble lord immaculately groomed, with a butler's close cropped whiskers and a monocle regarding against his young wife who had perched herself on his knee. "My first wife," he is saying with frigid dignity, "would never have ventured to take such a liberty, and she was a Spencer."

Georgiana was herself a Spencer, of as good blood as the duke himself, but she soon found that her natural ardent manifestations of affection were met with cold and haughty reserve. There was hardly even a honeymoon before the duke's demeanor congealed. Worse than all to the girl bride, robbed of the demonstrative love which was her due, it speedily became apparent that there were others to whom his grace was more devoted. Some women under such conditions would have moped, or retired to seclusion. Georgiana threw herself with abandon into the whirl of society and politics.

The Duchess of Devonshire had three children, the youngest a son about whose birth there was a strange suspicion, never allayed until his death. Resident at Devonshire House was a Lady Elizabeth Foster, who came there originally as a friend of the duchess, and whom the duke later married. The duke, cold and reserved as he was, became infatuated with her and Lady Elizabeth gave birth to a child at the time that the duchess became a mother for the third time. It was rumored that the legitimate child was a girl; the illegitimate a boy, and that they were secretly changed. The boy grew to manhood and in his turn Duke of Devonshire. In his childhood he never lived under his mother's care, but always had a separate establishment near his father. His legitimacy was generally questioned, some averring that he was the child of the duchess by Charles Fox;

THE APPLE AS FOOD

By J. A. Hesk, M. D.

By far the most common fruit food is the apple. The apple is adapted, perhaps, more than any other fruit to a great variety of uses in the household. It is most frequently used raw, but is also employed in making pies, puddings and pastries of different kinds. Fully four-fifths of the ripe fruit in water and one-fifth solid material. About 15 per cent of the apple consists of nutritive materials. There are very small quantities of protein and fat, both not exceeding 1 per cent, while more than 14 per cent of the ripe fruit consists of carbohydrates in the form of sugar. The food value of the apple, therefore, depends almost entirely upon this sugar. The flavor of the apple is determined both by the quantities of sugar contained therein as well as by certain etheral oils, and by a substance which is common to most fruits, known as tannin. Tannin in the pure form is harmful to the system, but in the apple the quantity is so small that it produces no ill effects whatsoever.

RAILROADS PROBABLY TO REFUSE INCREASE

(United Press Leased Wire.)

New York, April 7.—Replying to an appeal of firemen for increased wages, Elisha Lee, chairman of a committee of representatives of eastern railroads, indicated today that the demands would not be met. He said the railroads had suffered tremendous losses as a result of the Ohio floods and had also been hit by extra expense by the enactment of such reforms as the fall crew law recently enacted in New York and New Jersey.

The Pennsylvania railroad west of Pittsburgh, he said, had lost an aggregate of a mile and a half of steel bridges in the floods, and the New York Central and the Baltimore & Ohio each had been damaged to the extent of at least \$2,000,000.

MORTON, WASH., TO HAVE CITY WATER SUPPLY

(Special to The Journal.)

Chehalis, Wash., April 7.—Morton, the lively terminus of the Tacoma Eastern railroad, 40 miles east of Chehalis, is arranging for a water supply for domestic and fire purposes. Bidding of a bonus of \$1000, which will be paid the water company to put in an adequate service, is under way. A modern, 40-room hotel is being built, and the railroad company is just completing a large bunkhouse building, which is said to be for officers for engineering and construction crews that are expected soon to begin extension work on the railroad. Opening up of the wagon road from Morton to Mineral and other good things are under way at Morton.

Depot Fill Is Rushed.

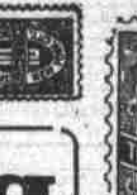
