Samuel A. Miles' Estate \$200,000.—The estate of Samuel A. Miles, a Colum-
bia county pioneer, who formerly lived in
St. Helena, but who recently moved to
Portland, where he died last Friday, was
admitted to probate yesterday. The es-
tate is valued at \$200,000, and is to be
divided equally among eight children and
the widow. Frank A. Miles and
William A. Miles, sons, are named ex-
ecutors in the will. The heirs are: Mrs.
Sarah Elizabeth Miles, widow; Mary E.
Butler, Jennie Cole, Cora Rubert, Lucy
A. Wharton and Grace H. Downing,
daughters; F. M. Eugene and W. A.
Miles, sons. Mrs. Wharton was given
\$2700 to purchase a lot in Colonial
Heights before her father's death. In a
codicil to the will this is deducted from
her share.

New Railroad Files Suit.—Suit was
started this morning in the federal court
by the Columbia & Nehalem River rail-
road against the Bidgett company, to
secure a proper valuation of land to be
used for a lumber railroad. The plain-
tiff company is planning to construct a
timber road south from Wood's Land-
ing. In Columbia county, through lands
of the Bidgett company. The latter
concern, it is alleged, wants to charge
over \$12,000 for the right of way, while
the railroad company believes the prop-
erty value of the right of way is not over
\$2500.

Laundry Gets Verdict.—A verdict for
the United States Laundry company was
returned yesterday in Circuit Judge
McGinnis' court in the personal injury
suit of David E. Mobley against the
laundry. Mobley claimed that the com-
pany was negligent in providing an un-
safe ladder for his use when oiling ma-
chinery. The company alleged that Mo-
bley did not use the ladder provided, but
took one which had been left by car-
penters. His leg was injured when he
fell as the ladder slipped, and he asked
\$6000 damages.

W. C. McDonnell Arrested.—W. C. Mc-
Donnell, formerly proprietor of the Cas-
tillon Grill, was arrested yesterday by
Deputy Sheriff Lumsden and Curtis on
a charge of obtaining money under false
pretenses. He is under indictment on
the charge. He is alleged to have made
false statements to the Merchants' Sav-
ings & Trust Co., now the Commerce
Savings & Trust bank, regarding his as-
sets, for the purpose of securing credit.

Bankruptcy Petitions.—L. G. Van
Bellen, formerly a partner of the Rich
& Van Bellen merchandise store, at Klam-
ath Falls, filed a petition in bankruptcy
in the federal court yesterday, naming
liabilities of \$3884.70, and no assets.
James H. Huff, with liabilities of
\$213.76, and no assets, and George H.
Blackman, a photographer of Junction
City, with liabilities of \$1785 and assets
of \$841.70, were other petitioners.

To Visit Oregon Caves.—A trip to the
great Oregon caves, 35 miles southwest
of Grants Pass, will be the next under-
taking of the Mazama club. The jour-
ney to Grants Pass will be by rail, and
the members of the club will walk over-
land from there to the caves, which are
located in Josephine county, just about
seven miles from the California line.
Though it is not generally known, the
Oregon caves are probably larger and
more extensive than the Mammoth Caves

Complaints Against Dogs.—After hav-
ing his garden scratched up three times
by dogs, John F. Toft, 487 East Twenty-
sixth street north, has complained to
the chief of police. Patrolman Roney
investigated the complaint yesterday, re-
porting this morning that the dogs of
John Toft complain belong to Mrs.
Kathleen Reicher, the noted Portland
singer, who is now in Paris, but whose
dogs are with Mrs. Isaac Lawler, 483
East Twenty-sixth street. "I have pad-
ed my garden three times, and needed it
four times," says Toft in his complaint.
"Each time it has been scratched up by
the dogs. They also carry my morning
paper away." Mrs. Lawler explained
that the dogs were unlicensed, and she
does not wish to get the license, as the
dogs do not belong to her.

Patrolman Praised.—In a letter yes-
terday to Chief of Police Slover, Arthur
C. Buchanan, sanitary engineer at 249
Burnside street, expresses his apprecia-
tion of an act done by Patrolman F. W.
Huntington in taking care of the en-
gineer's business last Friday evening
when burglars entered the place. The
patrolman found the front part of the
place broken down, exposing the office to
any passing that way. He secured
boards, nails and a hammer and closed
up the place. The officer then wrote a
note to the proprietor, telling where to
find a key and what had happened.
"I wish to express my appreciation to
the patrolman in particular, and the de-
partment in general," wrote Buchanan,
"for giving my property such good con-
sideration."

**Pool Hall Owner Objects to Police
Watching.**—When the proprietor of the
Caldwell & Company pool hall, Sixth and
Washington streets, objected to the man-
ner in which Police Patrolman Sher-
wood was watching the pool business, a
meeting of the two was held before Chief
Slover. W. H. Fitzgerald, member of the
police commission, also was invited.
The pool hall proprietor maintained that
his place is watched more closely than
is necessary. Patrolman Sherwood said
that minors are allowed to frequent the
hall. The proprietor claimed that such
minors are not messengers, who carry
the baseball scores to him. The result
of the conference was not made public.
Chief Slover does not say what action, if
any, will be taken in the matter.

M. K. McLean Struck by Street Car.—
While crossing Pine and Fifth streets at
11:40 o'clock last night, M. K. McLean,
manager of the Oregon Hotel, was
struck by a street car, sustaining slight
injuries that required medical attention
at the Good Samaritan hospital. The
shock appears to be the most serious
feature of the accident. R. D. Patton
was conductor on the street car, which
was a Depot and Jefferson street car.
H. C. Burgess and F. L. Wheeler were
near by and assisted the injured man to
the curb, where temporary aid was
given him. At first his condition was
thought serious. The hospital reports
this morning that he will soon be able
to leave for his work.

Woman Motorist Arrested.—Mrs. I.
Aronson, wife of the Washington street
jeweler, was arrested yesterday after-
noon by Patrolman Cameron for leaving
her automobile in front of a fire hy-
drant. In the municipal court this
morning the case was continued indefi-
nitely. The arrest is in view of enforce-
ing the observance of the traffic ordi-
nance. Mrs. Aronson explained to Cap-
tain Moore that she left her machine for
a moment, going into a store, not think-
ing it was in front of a hydrant.

Would Aid Women's Plan.—For the
purpose of aiding efforts of the Women's
Republic club to lower the high cost of
living, Councilman Maguire has in-
troduced an ordinance granting the or-
ganization a revocable permit for the use
of the city property on North Third
street, between Hoyt and Gilean streets,
as a site for a small public market. The
ordinance also permits of the erection of
a frame structure, 24 by 265 feet. Mr.
Maguire will introduce the ordinance at
tomorrow's council session.

Police Annual Inspection, May 11.—
The police will have their annual in-
spection soon after May 11. This was the
order of the chief this morning, urging
all members of the department to bring
their buttons and brush up their clothes,
otherwise getting ready for the annual
affair. Captain John T. Moore is put-
ting the men through a course of mili-
tary drills each week at the Armory.

Warrant for Indian.—A warrant was
issued in the United States district
court yesterday for the arrest of Joe
Hays, an Indian, charged with stealing
cattle from Alice Patawa, a squaw of
the Umatilla reservation. Hays is held
at Pendleton. He is said to have sold
the cattle to Judge J. A. Fee, at Pendle-
ton.

Culture Union will hold its regular

Eleventh and East Alder streets, Thurs-
day night, April 10; the subject is, "Valu-

IN EARLIER DAYS

They say that in the west we have a
shifting population and in many west-
ern cities this is true. Portland has
long borne the reputation of being the
New England of the Pacific coast. It
has established its standing for con-
servatism and solidity.

If you will look over the directory
for 1873 you will find that many of
our merchants who were in business
here 40 years ago are still in business.
Forty years ago William G. Beck
was in business in Portland as a dealer
in guns, pistols, toys and was agent
for Wheeler & Wilson's sewing ma-
chines. He is still in business, his pres-
ent business being loans and real estate.
In 1873 John Clark was a harness
maker at 72 Front street. Mr. Clark
is still in the same business.

C. A. Dolph was a member of the law
firm of Dolph, Bronnough, Dolph & Sil-
mon.

Everding was a member of the
firm of Everding & Beebe, a firm deal-
ing in flour and produce and having an
office at 10 North Front street. Mr.
Everding is still a commission mer-
chant.

R. Everding was a member of the
firm of Everding & Farrell. They
handled hay, grain and produce and
were located at 152 Front street. Mr.
Everding is still in the commission
business.

J. K. Gill in those days handled sheet
music and musical instruments. Mr.

Gill for many years past has been in
the book business.

S. L. N. Gilman was an auctioneer
in 1873 with A. B. Richardson. He is
now in the second hand business.

S. Harris had a retail dry goods store
then at 121 First street. He is in the
trunk business nowadays.

L. C. Henriksen was located at 103
First street, in the jewelry business,
which business he is still pursuing,
after 40 years.

Henry Hewitt was vice consul for
Sweden and Norway and was a member
of the firm of Hewitt, Wilson & Co.,
who were shipping and commission
merchants, wholesale grocers and agents
for fire insurances, at the corner of
First and Ash streets. Mr. Hewitt is
still in the insurance business.

Ed Holman was one of the proprie-
tors of the City Dray company. He
is now proprietor of the Holman Un-
dertaking company.

Jacob Kahn, or "Uncle Jake," as he
is usually called, was a member of the
firm of Kahn Brothers, with offices
at 145 Front street, where they handled
hides and wool.

Julius Kraemer was a partner of F.
S. Allen. They had a shoe store at 43
Front street. He is now in the real
estate business, with offices in the
Henry building.

John McCracken was consular agent
for the Hawaiian Islands and was a
commission merchant with offices at
14 North Front street.

H. L. Pittock is listed in the 1873
directory as one of the proprietors of
the Clackamas Paper Mill with offices
at the corner of Front and Stark streets.
Mr. Pittock has remained in the same
business, as well as that of publishing
the Oregonian, ever since.

Dr. C. H. Rafferty at that time lived

in the city of East Portland and was
one of the proprietors of a drug store
between First and Second streets, and
was a partner of his brother, David
Rafferty.

Sol Rosenfeld was a member of the
firm of H. Rosenfeld & Co., cigar deal-
ers at 21 Front street.

For 40 years Andrew Caring has been
wielding the razor. Forty years ago
he was a member of the firm of Jubin
& Saling, proprietors of a barber shop
on Morrison street, between Front and
First. He has not changed his occupa-
tion during all these years.

Ben Selling appears in the old direc-
tory as clerk for P. Selling, who had a
general merchandise store at First and
Yamhill and whose residence was on
Sixth street between Washington and
Alder.

L. Samuel in those days was an ad-
vertising agent and publisher with an
office at 93 Front street. He is now
general manager of the Oregon Life.

George L. Story handled paints and
oil. At present he is in the fire in-
surance business.

Joe Simon was in those days, as he
is now, an attorney.

D. W. Wakefield was a member of
the firm of Atkinson, Woodward & Co.
Their office was at First street between
Stark and Oak. Mr. Wakefield is still
handling Portland real estate.

H. Wolf had his clothing store and
residence at 93 Front street. His pres-
ent business is the manufacture of
shirts and overalls.

Many of the young men who ap-
pear in the directory in those days
as clerks are now proprietors. In the
foreword of the directory some of the
things in which particular pride is ex-
pressed is the fact that street cars
have been introduced successfully, hav-

ing started the present year, 1913. An-
other fact of which special mention is
made is that the railroad has been built
as far south as Roseburg and that the
west side railroad is completed from
Portland to the town of St. Joseph on
the Yamhill River, 45 miles.

"Our railroads" may be fairly
credited the rapid progress and vast im-
provements made in Portland during
the last few years. Ideal estate has
advanced more than 100 per cent, and
farm lands along the railroad lines have
also greatly advanced," says the fore-
word of the directory.
