

ARCHITECT FIGHTS WITH INSPECTOR

Lee De Camp Pays \$10 for Violating Code and \$10 for Lawless Actions.

When Lee De Camp, architect for John W. Condit's Empress theatre, defied A. S. Lotsepeich, deputy building inspector, when the latter directed him to see a permit for certain alterations in the theatre building, told the inspector he might "knock his eye out," and declared if he didn't get out of the building he would throw him out, he got himself into serious trouble.

His arrest for violating the building permit ordinance followed, and in the municipal court this morning he was fined \$20 by Judge Tazwell.

The work for which De Camp refused to take out a permit as required by city ordinance, consisted in putting a balcony in one of the store rooms on the Broadway side of the theatre front, and in laying a wooden floor in the Park street annex to the structure. In some respects the work was also in violation of the building code, according to Building Inspector Lotsepeich.

Noticing the work, Lotsepeich, who is inspector of the entire downtown district, went to De Camp and told him that he must take out a permit before he could proceed, and that construction there could be only in conformity with the building code.

This appeared to anger De Camp, it is said. He not only refused to comply, but threatened Lotsepeich in violent language with bodily injury, so the latter reported to his immediate superior, R. E. Krenner, chief inspector of construction.

De Camp even ordered Lotsepeich to get off the sidewalk in front of the theatre. This the deputy refused to do. He did not forget to mention the incident, however, in his report.

Manager Piering of the theatre also took a hand in the general disturbance. He used some rather heated language toward Lotsepeich, it is said. His arrest, however, was not ordered.

After the reception accorded to Lotsepeich, Krenner himself went to the theatre. He was told by the workmen that they were "working under orders" and that they had nothing to do with a permit. They refused to stop work.

De Camp even went so far, it is said, as to tear down a notice posted by one of the deputies, directing him to get out of the building.

In court this morning he was fined \$10 on his own account, and another \$10 on account of the violation of the law by the workmen under his orders.

Manager Piering of the theatre, went to see Mayor Rusk after the police court incident, and agreed to see that an application is made for a permit before further work is attempted. He said there would be no more defiance of the authority of the city to regulate building construction.

J. C. Wilson and B. A. Whitford, who formed the firm of J. C. Wilson & Co., stock brokers, and Peter J. Burke, a former employee of the company, were indicted on felony charges by the federal grand jury in connection with the thefts that resulted this morning in Baker's plea of guilty to the embezzlement charges.

Immediately after the indictments were returned bench warrants were issued by United States Commissioner Krull and given to Marshal Burnham to serve. The men, it is expected, will be taken into custody before night. The bond for each has been fixed at \$10,000.

The Wilson firm had connections in New York and Chicago, Portland and Puget Sound. The face of the indictment against the three men reads: "For conspiracy to procure Charles F. Baker to abstract funds of a National bank."

The body contains clauses accusing the three of conspiracy to aid, steal and induce Charles F. Baker to steal and misappropriate the funds of the Crocker National bank. The instrument recites many of the specific instances in which Baker applied the money of the bank to his stock speculating account with Wilson and company, which he did under the name of George Balke. Burke, it is charged, was the man who had the panic stricken Baker in his clutches and was instrumental in his dealings with J. C. Wilson and company.

Whether the matter of compelling the Portland Railway, Light & Power company to put an extension from its Mount Scott division to the Mount Scott cemetery, comes under the railroad commission act, or the Marketway public utilities act, is a question which was not settled this morning when the case came up for hearing before the state railroad commission.

The question of the extension of the line coming within the classification "street railway" or "public utility" is the legal point. As attorneys representing the company were not ready this morning the case went over until next Saturday.

The police admit that the discovery that she had \$1000 in coin with her in easy reach may disprove their theory that financial embarrassment caused her act.
