Sunnyside Improvement Club.—A very enthusiastic meeting of the Sunnyside Improvement club was held Wednesday evening. The movement to secure a gymnasium for the Sunnyside school was discussed, and the park board was urged to do all in its power to expedite the work of providing a playground and swimming tank in the Laurelhurst park. It was also the unanimous opinion of the club that a movement should be started at once to secure a clubhouse for this thickly settled district. A public meeting will be held Monday evening, April 21, at 8 o'clock in the Sunnyside school auditorium at which W. C. Benson will speak in favor of the commission form of charter. Gay Lombard will speak against it.

The unusual opportunity for all teachers and students above the 2d grade to see the famous Ben Greer players. Monday afternoon at the new Lincoln High school has been made possible by the Portland Shakespeare Study club, presenting Goldsmith's "She Stoops to Conquer" at the low prices of 25c and 50c. The school board have consented that all city schools above the third grade should dismiss to enable the teachers and pupils to reach the auditorium in time for the 3 o'clock performance. So far the demand for tickets has been so large that a capacity house is expected for both performances. Those desiring tickets should obtain them at once.

Team Steps in Front of Cars.—As west side local Southern Pacific train No. 1 came creeping up Fourth street yesterday morning, a team hitched to a garbage wagon, belonging to a Chinaman named Mori, and which was backed up to the curb in front of a restaurant on Taylor street, walked deliberately in front of the engine. The horses sustained severe bruises on the legs. The wagon was not touched. The fact that the train was moving very slowly is all that saved Mori's outfit from being smashed to pieces. The Chinaman had left his team for a few moments and before he returned the accident happened.

German Theatre Association Incorporated.—Articles of incorporation of the German Theatre association of Portland, Ore., were filed yesterday with County Clerk Coffey. E. E. Schroeder, Otto F. Decker, Ernest Baer, Martin D. Del and Lillian D. Del were the incorporators and the capital was placed at \$1000. A real estate company to be called the Mt. Hood Valley company, was incorporated by J. A. Pettit, George T. Morris and Florence F. Pettit, capitalized at \$5000.

Filling Gulch.—Filling of the Hawthorne Park gulch will be commenced in a few days, the Pacific Bridge company, which has the contract for the work, having commenced laying tracks on East Salmon street from the river front to East Eleventh, whence spurs will be built parallel with the gulch. The gravel will be taken from the river on cars and hauled direct to the fill. The track is of temporary nature only, and is being laid on top of the macadam pavement. The gulch is filled with water and has for years been a breeding place for myriads of mosquitoes.

Give \$2500 for Man's Death.—The estate of V. F. Merrill was yesterday awarded \$2500 by a jury in Circuit Judge McGinn's court against the Missouri Bridge & Iron company and the Pacific Lime & Gypsum company on account of his death. Merrill while employed by the bridge company was erecting the steel work of a mill for the gypsum company at Gipsium, Baker county, Oregon, received a smashed and cut hand when a beam fell catching him. He was rushed to the first aid to the injured. When he showed signs of weakness he was given a drink from a bottle which was later found to have contained a poisonous disinfectant and died as a result. Mrs. Elizabeth F. Merrill, as administratrix of the estate of her husband, filed the suit for \$7500. The verdict was reached at 4:40 o'clock.

Moumal and Maher Win.—The suit of H. Moumal and P. J. Maher against Alfred Parkhurst, to secure the specific performance of a contract for the rental of the corner of Second and Couch streets, was decided in favor of Moumal and Maher by Circuit Judge Morrow yesterday. Parkhurst claimed that he had made a subsequent lease which he could not break, but the evidence showed that this lease had been made after the suit was filed and had been dated back to show that it was made prior to that date. Moumal and Maher intend to have a workingman's hotel built on the property on the most modern and sanitary lines.

Six Freed from Unhappy Wedlock.—Five uncontented divorcees were granted yesterday by Circuit Judge Morrow and one by Judge Kavanaugh. Drunkenness, cruelty, non-support and desertion were the causes. Those granted by Judge Morrow were: Agnes Peterson from Tony Peterson; Harriet Maddock from Cyrus Maddock; Stanley Lutz from Theresa M. Lutz; Rose Yanke from George Yanke and Maude Malon from Harry C. Malon. The one granted by Judge Kavanaugh was to Grace White from W. J. White.
