

WOMAN MIGHTY FORCE IN WORLD FOR GOOD

Mrs. Emma B. Carroll Defines
Woman's Relation to Man
and Society.

Declaring that the American woman is about to be accorded recognition on the high plane that is her due, Mrs. Emma B. Carroll clearly set forth her conception of woman's rights and duties in an able address Thursday evening at the dinner tendered Mrs. M. L. T. Hidden by the clubwomen. Mrs. Carroll said in part:

"Woman's real position, her relationship to man and to society and her meaning to both in the evolution and improvement of the race, is yet to be defined. In the breast of the female, however, are aspirations, and some are already getting away from the thought that they were created solely for the purpose of catering to the physical man and making of themselves nothing more or less than household drudges; they are beginning to realize that they have a right to growth and to progress, that it is a sacred obligation not only to themselves but to society.

"Only great women can produce great men, and the day is fast disappearing when any weak inferior woman will be considered good enough for marriage. Men in Oregon will realize in the years to come that the enfranchisement of their women was a great step forward. From the legal emancipation of American women will spring the ideal marriage, the ideal parenthood and the ideal society. The progressive women of today are the superior products of their race. They are not the women who waste their time in a butterfly existence.

"There is not a man or woman in Portland who should allow anyone else to do his thinking for him. No home lives are better than those in which the woman is the head of the household. With over 4000 men on our public school boards and less than 40 women, what can be said of the justice of men toward women on the part of American women themselves? What greater concern should any parent have than that of knowing to what use the long hours spent in school are consecrated and what influences work there upon the child? Parks, playgrounds, pure air, pure water, clean streets, the smoke nuisance, public markets, sewerage, markets, good roads, bill and sign boards, anti-cigarette leagues, are each and every one different phases of domestic economy that affect and concern men, women and children. These are the business of one sex quite as much as the other, and in a position to be sincere. The press, our greatest teacher and power to form right thinking for the masses, is not exempt from its share of responsibility, and cannot longer cloak its own interest and indifference under the guise of objectivity that it prints what society wants."

Attracting the attention of every club woman in the United States will be the council meeting of the general federation of clubs to be held in Washington, D. C., on April 21, 22, 23 and 24. The gathering has been arranged for the purpose of bringing club women together for the object of discussing the best methods of advancing the interests of the general federation. No credentials will be required and an invitation to attend has been extended to all club women interested.

A most interesting program has been prepared under the direction of Mrs. William Andrews of Washington, D. C. Mrs. Eugene Kelly of Charlotte, N. C., and Mrs. A. L. Christie of Butte, Mont., assisted by a local committee at Washington, Mrs. Pennybacker, president of the general federation, will open the meeting with an address of welcome on Monday. The deliberations will begin Tuesday, of Tuesday afternoon there will be a reception to the clubwomen at the White House, and in the evening an address on art by F. Hopkinson Smith. On Wednesday there will be a visit to the congressional library followed by business sessions for the discussion of department work. Thursday the visitors will be guests of the Maryland federation and the day will include a visit to Baltimore, the Walters Art gallery, a luncheon and a trip down the Potomac to Mt. Vernon. MOUNT VERNON IS DESCRIBED TO D. A. R.

Washington's Home and Environs Discussed at Meeting of Willamette.

At the meeting of Willamette Chapter, D. A. R., Wednesday, Mrs. R. E. Clements read a most interesting paper on "Historical Pilgrimages From Mount Vernon and Washington." In the course of her remarks Mrs. Clements said:

"To Ann Pamela Cunningham belongs the credit and honor more than to any other one person for the preservation of Washington's mansion. Although a hopeless invalid almost from infancy, this noble, patriotic woman carried to a successful end her plan for the preservation of this historic landmark, which now stands as a monument to the Mount Vernon Ladies' association. Mount Vernon was purchased by Virginia in 1855, the property including 200 acres of land, the mansion, tomb, garden grounds and wharf, and the entire property is under the government of a board of regents.

"The place, at time of its purchase from a direct descendant, John A. Washington, was in a dilapidated condition. It was necessary to rebuild outbuildings which had perished, construct a sea wall to protect the front lawn with its fine trees from the erosion of the tides which were steadily undermining the bluffs, and especially to preserve the tomb from the effects of decay; also to secure the return, if possible, of such relics connected with Washington, as might be found scattered throughout the country, and of all articles of furniture which had been there in his time. This to be done such a way as to emphasize the character of the place as a home and avoid the characteristics of a museum.

"The pleasantest and most picturesque route to reach Mount Vernon from Washington, is down the Potomac. About an hour brings one to the landing at the foot of the grounds. Mount Vernon stands on a wooded eminence commanding a beautiful view of the river and the opposite shore. Fronting the mansion are shaded lawns and below is the deer park occupying some 25 acres. The trees are well kept, the gardens and orchards. About 150 acres are in woodland and 70 acres are utilized for farming operations on a small scale.

"In all, there are about 30 buildings on the estate.

"The mansion, containing 19 rooms, is a simple structure of wood, two and a half stories high, with a gambrel roof, built on Colonial lines, dignified and harmonious in its simplicity. The main part is 56 feet long by 47 feet in depth. Along the entire front runs a broad portico, 25 feet in height, with square pillars.

"By donation and purchase, the regents have managed to collect quite a respectable number of Washington's personal belongings. There is the great carpet, specially manufactured for him and presented by Louis XVI, his parlor mirror, bookcase, traveling trunk, dressing table and various articles of wearing apparel. To be found in "The Study" a bureau, secretary, a walnut table, two pine writing tables, writing desk and apparatus, circular chair, arm chair, dressing table, oval looking glass, eleven glass cases, oval of surveying instruments, a globe, two brass candlesticks, a sword, four canes and seven guns.

"This was evidently the general's sanctum where he attended to his correspondence.

"The income available for the preservation of the estate is derived mainly from the 35c admission which is charged for the use of the grounds, and the privilege of adding in the upkeep, to all who come."

Frederick Schepman, on account of the rain the meeting was not largely attended and so was given over to informal discussion at the close of which refreshments were served. On Thursday of this week the club meeting will be given over to a rehearsal of the operetta, "Princess Chrysanthemum," which the club is to give soon.
