

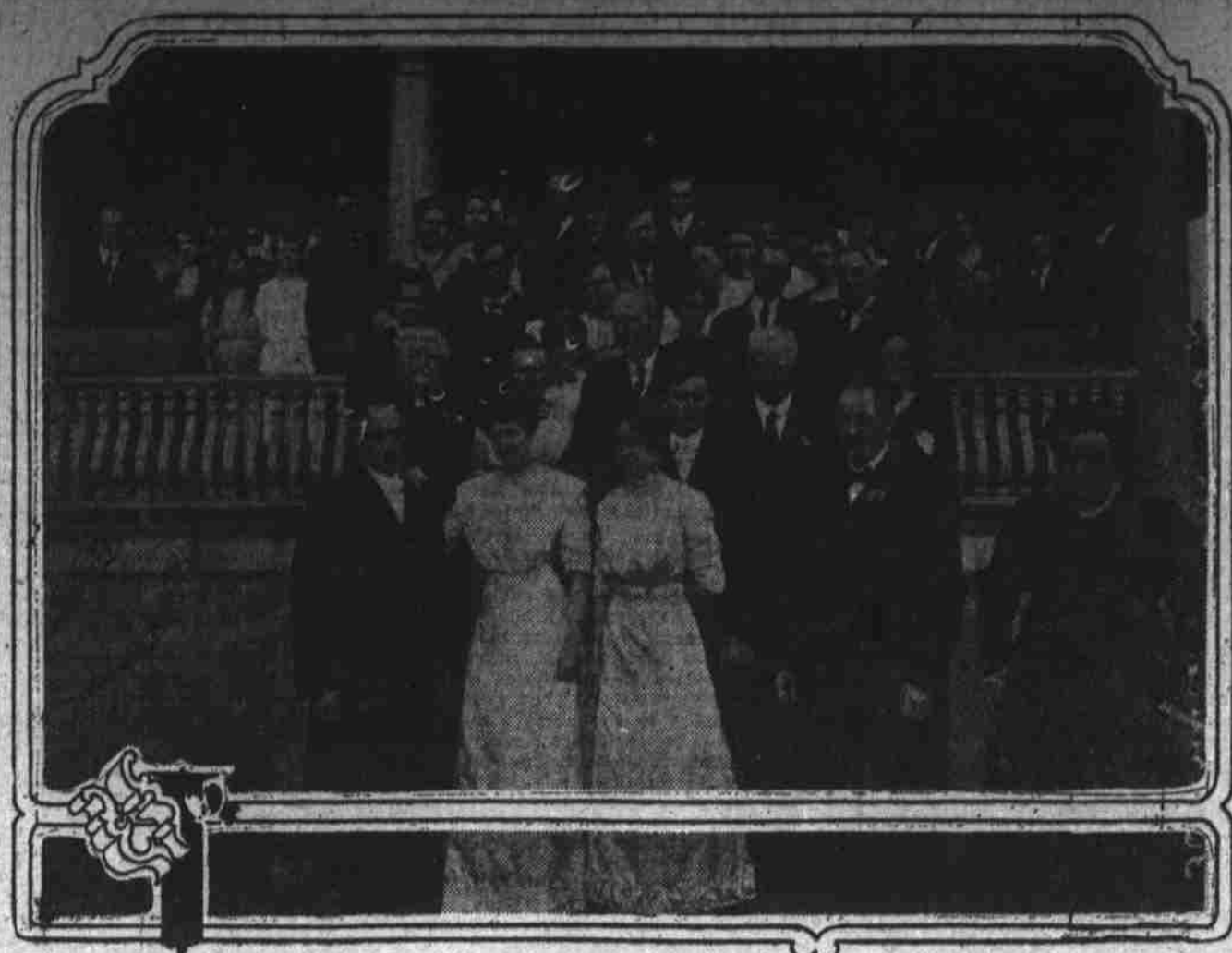
NORTHWEST WILL GET BIG NUMBER OF CONVENTIONS

CALIFORNIA VERY FIRM IN ITS STAND AGAINST JAPANESE

State Senate Adopts Measure Which It Is Hoped Will Modify Attitude of Mikado's Empire.

Sacramento, Cal., April 12.—Putting into action the determination of the people of California that the Japanese must go, the state senate this afternoon adopted a measure which, while it attains ends desired, is expected to evade open conflict with Japan and with the national administration by failing to specify the little brown man as being particularly excluded.

PRISONER TO BE BROUGHT BACK FROM SO. AFRICA

Oakland, Cal., April 12.—To secure his trial for the alleged passing of fictitious checks in this city, "Dr." Milton Abraham, alias "Sir Harry" Westwood Cooper, who conducted extensive swindling operations here and elsewhere, is to be brought back to Oakland when he concludes his 18 months' sentence in Durban, South Africa. The African sentence followed Cooper's conviction on charges similar to the ones placed against him here.

Daniel's Hens On Strike

Washington, April 12.—Secretary of the Navy Daniels brought 99 Plymouth Rock hens to Washington from his North Carolina home when he assumed office. The hens refuse to lay here. He says he will feed them with gunpowder if they don't "come through" with some eggs.

Suicide's Sister Bride of Week

Seattle, Wash., April 12.—Eugenie Temohovich Motridge, a bride of less than a week, her marriage to Fred Motridge of Vancouver, B. C., having been celebrated April 7, presumably in Vancouver, is a sister of Miss Olga Temohovich, the San Francisco suicide. Mrs. Motridge left Seattle for San Francisco this morning, a passenger on the Shasta Limited. She declined to see anyone or to discuss the affair, other than to say that she intended to satisfy herself as to the actual facts. Mrs. Motridge is young, tall, of the Russian type of beauty, fascinating in manner and speech, and attired in the latest fashions.
