

MORGAN FORTUNE OF \$100,000,000 IS LEFT TO HIS SON

Major Portion of Immense Estate Left to J. P. Morgan Jr., Including Art Treasures He Has No Time to Dispose Of.

art subjects as suitable souvenirs and mementos to his close friends. His old yachting companions, privately known as the "Coral Club," are to receive appropriate pieces of silver valued at \$1000 to be designed and engraved under the direction of the executors. The yacht *Corsair* goes to the son.

The will discloses that there exists an underground passageway leading from the late financier's Madison avenue residence to an alley opening on the next street north.

Belief in After Life.

In one respect the document is the most remarkable ever left by a great financier. His opening sentences showed his complete belief that there was nothing in his life that has not been cleansed from his soul, and that "it would be presented faultless before the throne of the Heavenly Father."

His religious bequests include \$500,000, the income from which is to go to the support of the Ministry of St. George's church and \$100,000 for New York missions.

The will was witnessed by John G. Milburn, Edna M. Blackmar and Lewis Case, Esq., and the witnesses to the will were Joseph H. Choate, Robert H. Gary and Lewis Case, Esq., all of New York city. It is expected that the will will be probated here Monday.

Text of the will.

"I, John Pierpont Morgan, of the city, county and state of New York, do hereby make public and declare this my last will and testament, in the manner and form following, that is to say:

"Article 1—I commit my soul into the hands of my Saviour, in full confidence that having redeemed it and washed it in his most precious blood, he will present it faultlessly before the throne of my Heavenly Father, and I entreat my children to maintain and defend at all hazards and at any cost of personal sacrifice, the blessed doctrine of complete atonement for sin, through the blood of Jesus Christ, once offered and through that alone.

"Article 2—It is my desire to be buried in the family burial place, prepared by my father in Cedar Hill cemetery at Hartford Conn., and I hereby direct that my body be there interred, on the west of the monument and of

Dispositions of Largest Fortunes

New York, April 19.—J. Pierpont Morgan left \$100,000,000 to his son, John Pierpont Morgan Jr., and residuary estate absolutely to his only son.

John Jacob Astor left \$5,000,000 to wife; \$5,000,000 to daughter and residuary to his son, Vincent.

E. H. Harriman and Mr. Sage left their entire fortunes absolutely to their wives without reserve.

Cornelius Vanderbilt left \$1,000,000 to his son and residuary to his second son, Alfred Gwynn.

Jay Gould left a \$5,000,000 special bequest to eldest son George, and divided all the rest equally among his five children, girls and boys alike, giving each one more than \$1,000,000.

W. H. Vanderbilt gave \$5,000,000 to each of five daughters to be held in trust for their sons, Cornelius, W. K. and George.

Marshall Field left about \$10,000,000 to public museums and charities and tied up \$55,000,000 to be held intact during the life of his daughter and grandchildren.

The place where my father's remains are interred.

"I wish that in all arrangements for my funeral the same general course be followed that was adopted in the case of my father, except that the service be held at St. George's church in the city of New York, with the bishops of New York, Connecticut and Massachusetts and the rector of St. George's officiating.

"Article 3—I direct that all my debts, funeral and testamentary charges be paid as soon after my decease as can conveniently be done, hereby giving my executors full power and authority to recognize and pay as among such debts any promise or obligation made by me verbally or otherwise which, although not in such form that the holder could compel payment thereof by my estate, my executors think proper to be paid in my own judgment, or because, from memoranda or verbal directions left by me, or from other sources, they are satisfied that it would be my wish to have paid.

Provision for Mrs. Morgan.

"Article 4—As a first claim and charge upon my estate and the income of my real and personal property, and of all other right of inheritance, or succession to any other part of my estate, I make the following gifts and provisions, to be paid to the benefit of my beloved wife, Frances Louisa Tracy Morgan:

"Section 1—I give and bequeath unto my executors and trustees the sum of \$1,000,000 in trust to collect and receive the income thereof, and to pay the net income unto my wife, Frances Louisa Tracy Morgan, during her natural life, and upon the death of my said wife I give and bequeath the capital of said trust fund unto such persons and in such estates, interests and proportions as my said wife shall in her last will and testament or by her last appointment direct that my body be there interred, on the west of the monument and of

"I give my wife this power of disposition in order to enable her to make such legacies as she may desire to her relatives or for friends or charity.

Assures Wife's Income.

"Section 2—After my death my said wife shall receive the income which will be produced by a certain trust fund now held by me as trustee under a deed of trust dated July 1, 1887, made to me by my father, Junius Spencer Morgan, which fund has been very largely increased during my lifetime.

"I direct my executors to set apart out of my estate such sum as in their judgment will be sufficient to yield under all probable contingencies an income which, together with the income which my said wife will be entitled to receive under said trust deed will amount in the aggregate to \$100,000 a year.

Morgan then set forth provisions insuring his widow \$100,000 income even if necessary to be paid out of the capital of the estate.

Son Made Residuary Legatee.

He then set forth that John Pierpont Morgan, Jr., his residuary legatee, be permitted to give bond, to insure payments of income to the widow. He left to his widow the country place called Cragston, at Highland Hills, N. Y., and the town house on Madison avenue in New York city. In reference to the country estate, the will said:

"and give and bequeath unto my said wife absolutely for her own use all furniture, clothing, pictures (except family portraits), works of art, silver, plate, ornaments, bric-a-brac, household goods, books, linen, china, glass, horses, carriages, automobiles, harness and stable furniture or equipment, and all implements, plants and tools which I have stock which may be in or upon my country place at the time of my death, or shall then be customarily used by me in connection therewith."

Gives Widow Madison Avenue Home.

After describing technically the town house, the will reads: "And my dwelling house known as 219 Madison avenue, erected thereon, with the free use during her life as appurtenant thereto of the underground tunnel connecting said house with Thirty-seventh street by way of the alley way opening from the block on the north in Thirty-seventh street; also the lot or parcel of land, with the stable or garage, thereon erected, known as number 33 East Thirty-fifth street in said borough of Manhattan, together with all furniture, clothing, pictures (except family portraits), works of art, silver, plate, ornaments, bric-a-brac, household goods or supplies (except wines), books, linen, china, glass and similar articles or house equipments which may be in said dwelling at the time of my death, and all horses, carriages, automobiles, harness and stable furniture or equipment and all implements and tools which may be in said stable or garage at the time of my death, or shall then be customarily used by me in connection therewith."

Relieves Wife from Liability.

"I direct that no inventory or security shall ever be required of my said wife in respect of any of the articles of personal property by this section of my will bequeathed to her for her life and that neither she, nor her estate, shall ever be held liable for any consumption, use, damage, loss, or injury in respect to any of said articles."

Morgan provided that all taxes and insurance premiums charged against the property left his widow should be paid by J. P. Morgan Jr., from the residuary estate. After completing reference to the widow, the will took up the provisions for the children, beginning as follows:

Children Get \$3,000,000 Each.

"I give and bequeath unto my son, John Pierpont Morgan Jr., if he survive me, the sum of three million dollars, and it was provided that in case the son died before the father the three children should be equally divided among the children of the son.

To each of his three daughters Morgan left \$3,000,000, providing they survived him, as all of them did. They are Mrs. Hurlbut Livingston Satterlee, Mrs. William Hamilton and Miss Annie Tracy Morgan. The married daughters are permitted to dispose of

their bequests in their wills as they see fit.

Miss Annie Morgan, in case she marries, and has issue, may dispose of her bequest as she chooses. If she marries but dies without issue she is permitted to bequeath to her surviving husband any part of the bequest not to exceed \$1,000,000.

All Bequests in Trust.

All four of the \$3,000,000 bequests are to be held in trust by the executors and trustees, the incomes to be respectively paid over to the son and the three daughters, the will provides that in case a daughter died before her father, the sum of \$3,000,000 should be held in trust for her children, who were to share and share alike.

The will then reads as follows:

"Section 7—I in case my said son, John Pierpont Morgan Jr., shall die before me, leaving a wife surviving him, then and in that event I give and bequeath to my said executors and trustees the sum of \$1,000,000 in trust to collect and receive the income thereof, and to pay over the net income annually to the widow of my said son during the term of her natural life.

"Section 8—I give and bequeath unto my son-in-law, William Pierpont Hamilton, the sum of \$1,000,000.

"Section 9—I give and bequeath unto my son-in-law, Herbert Livingston Satterlee, the sum of \$1,000,000.

"Article 6—I give and bequeath all my wines unto my said son, John Pierpont Morgan Jr., or, if he shall not survive, unto his son, Junius Spencer Morgan Jr., desiring, however, that the legacies should divide equally among the children of my said son, Junius Spencer Morgan, as he thinks proper among my son-in-law and my friends.

Son His Successor in Art.

"Article 7—I bequeath and transfer to my son, John Pierpont Morgan Jr., all my right, title and interest as patron or fellow in perpetuity in the Metropolitan Museum of Art in the city of New York and in the American Museum of Natural History in said city, and all similar rights in other institutions of a like general character, of which I may die possessed. If my said son shall, at the time of my death, already have in his own right such a fellowship or similar right in any of said institutions, then I give and bequeath such fellowships, or other right in said institutions, unto the eldest child surviving me of my said son, who shall not have in his or her own right such fellowship or similar right in said institutions, and I hereby request said corporation to transfer any such rights in accordance with the provisions of this bequest."

Bequests to Relatives.

Morgan left \$100,000 to Jennie Bigelow Tracy, widow of his brother-in-law, Charles Edward Tracy, and to his sister-in-law, Clara Tracy Hopkin, and Julian N. Brown.

Setting forth that during many years they have been members of his household, Morgan left \$100,000 to Lucy Edridge Lee; \$100,000 to Ethel Bates Wace and an annual income of \$10,000 to Florence M. Rhett. These three bequests are in the form of trust funds to be held during the lives of the beneficiaries.

\$500,000 to Episcopal Church.

Morgan left a fund of \$500,000, the income of which is to be paid over to St. George's Protestant Episcopal church of this city for the support of the ministry of the church. He left a fund of \$100,000, the income of which is to be applied to the support of missionary stations in the Protestant Episcopal diocese of New York.

To his friend, J. Beaver Webb, he left \$50,000.

He instructed his executors to set aside a sum sufficient to yield a net annual income of "1000 pounds sterling" (\$5000) to be paid to his friend, Mrs. Alice Mason.

Monument to First Wife.

"Article 11—I give and bequeath to the House of Rest for Consumptives the sum of \$100,000 to be designated as: 'The Amelia Sturges Morgan Memorial Fund,' and applied to the corporate purposes of said House of Rest for Consumptives.

"Article 12—I give and bequeath to each of the members of the *Corsair* club at the time of my death, as a souvenir of myself and as a token of my personal affection for them, a piece of the silver of the *Corsair* to be bequeathed and purchased for the purpose by the executors of my will.

"Article 13—I give and bequeath to my friend, Mary G. McIlvaine, if she survives me, the sum of \$250,000.

He left an annual income of \$35,000 to Dr. James W. Markoe, saying: "I make this provision for the benefit of Dr. Markoe and his wife in recognition of my long friendship and his devotion for many years of almost his entire time and energy to the service of the Lying-in hospital, an institution in which I have been greatly interested."

Gifts to Employees.

"Article 14—I give and bequeath to each of the employees, at the time of my death, of my firm of J. P. Morgan & Co., except Charles W. King, above named, an amount equal to one year's salary of such employee at such time, and I give unto each person who shall survive me, who was at the time of the dissolution of my firm of J. P. Morgan & Co., of London, an employee thereof, an amount equal to one year's salary of such employee at the time of such dissolution.

"Article 22—I give and bequeath to my valet, Edward Phillips, if he shall be in my employ at the time of my death, the sum of \$15,000.

"Article 23—I give and bequeath the following annuities in recognition of faithful service:

"To Mrs. Margaret Henderson, my housekeeper at Prince's Gate, London, 500 pounds (\$2500) per annum.

"To Henry Bender, my butler at Prince's Gate, London, 250 pounds (\$1250) per annum.

"To Mrs. A. King, my housekeeper at Dover House, Southampton, 250 pounds (\$1250) per annum.

"To J. P. McLeod, my gardener, at Dover House, Southampton, 250 pounds (\$1250) per annum."

After making specific provision for the payment of all these annuities, the will continues:

"Article 24—I give and bequeath the sum of \$1000 to each servant in my household, whether New York, Cragston, Prince's Gate or Dover House, who shall be in my service at the time of my death, and shall have been continuously employed by me for not less than five years next preceding, other than those above mentioned to whom I have herebefore given legacies or annuities.

Women to Give Play.

The ladies' auxiliary of the North Portland Commercial club will give a play entitled "Hearts and Diamonds," at Thiel's hall, on Killingsworth avenue, opposite the Piedmont car barn, next Wednesday night. Proceeds are to be used to forward the park campaign.

TO END TONG WAR BY PROHIBITING TOURIST PARTIES

Such Action Will Compel Chinese Merchants to Bring Bloodthirsty Countrymen to Terms.

(By the International News Service.)

San Francisco, April 19.—A partial strike has been laid upon Chinatown by the local police department as a result of the assassination of Lem Poon by a Chinese while he was walking on the streets in company with a white bodyguard on Friday afternoon.

Chief of Police White today ordered 12 uniformed policemen into the district. Their duties will be to instruct eighteenthers that there is danger in the district and that they would do well to leave.

White also instructed that eight-seers automobiles and Chinatown guides be advised that they will not be permitted to take tourists through the district in the evening.

By this method the police hope to bring the warring tong to account. Several hundred tourists are in the habit of visiting Chinatown every night. They patronize the stores and

are a source of income to the merchants of the district.

Merchants Moved to Action.

If tourists are kept out of the district the police take the view that Chinatown merchants will soon put a stop to the war between the Bing Kong and the Suesy Sing tongs.

"Moreover," said White today, "the incident of yesterday shows that the Chinese highlanders have no great consideration for the lives of white men. Five shots were fired from rifles at Lem Poon and Tom Wren, his white bodyguard. Three of these shots went wild. It was the merest luck that Wren was not killed."

FIVE HUNDRED AUTOS TO MOVE IN PARADE OVER THE NEW BRIDGE

who plan to join the line of march are asked to report to Mr. North by 2 o'clock. This request has been made through J. C. Beck, president of the Seventh Street Improvement association.

The right of the line will form at Alberta and Williams avenue, facing south. All Peninsula clubs will form west of Williams avenue in Killingsworth, under direction of J. H. Nolte. The Vancouver contingent will form in Williams avenue north of Killingsworth. All others will form in streets lying east of Williams avenue and north of Alberta street.

Each club and organization is asked by the grand marshal to have a banner on the first auto in line that the sides may know where to place it. The vanguard of the procession will be composed of two autos of police. In the first auto will ride Captain of

Police Moore with a couple of officers. Directly behind this will come one of the big eight-seater cars carrying the police band.

The first auto in the parade proper will be occupied by Mayor Rushlight, M. G. Munly, Ralph Modjeski, designer of the bridge, and Councilman Menefee.

In the second auto will be County Judge Cleeton, and Commissioners Lightner and Hart, composing the county court.

The third car will be occupied by representatives of the press.

In the fourth car will ride Mrs. H. A. Heppner, representing the Greater Portland Plans association, and her little daughter Hengletta, who will take a prominent part in the christening of the bridge, in which she will assist Caroline Levy, niece of J. C. Beck, representing the west side, and Mary Evelyn Munly, daughter of M. G. Munly, representing the east side.

The fifth auto will contain Mrs. June McMillan Ordway and Miss Hobbs, author of a poem dedicated to the opening of the bridge.

Mayor Will Accept Structure.

Next will come autos carrying members of the executive board and city council, then officers and members of the North East Side Improvement association, the Seventh Street Improvement association, members of the various commercial organizations, an auto bearing Colonel Young of the Twenty-first United States infantry, Adjutant General Finzer of Oregon, Col. Jackson and Maj. James McI. Wood, the North Portland Commercial club and the Peninsula Improvement association, the Irvington Tennis club, the Rose City Park Improvement club, the Laurelhurst club, the Vancouver contingent representing Southwestern Washington, headed by the Twenty-first infantry band, the Portland Automobile club, the

East Side Business Men's club, and affiliated clubs on the East Side.

All other organizations will fall in behind the East Side Business Men's club.

The exercises of formal acceptance and opening of the bridge will be brief. The draw spans will be raised when the head of the procession starts to cross the bridge from the East Side.

As the east gate is reached, Mr. Modjeski, the engineer, will formally turn the bridge over to the mayor, who in turn will call the executive board to order and accept it. Then will follow the ceremony of turning it over to the county court.

Next the mayor will step forward and press a button, and on the instant the tall spans will begin to descend and the draw will be closed.

Then, as little Misses Caroline Levy and Mary Evelyn Munly, representing west and east side, stand each on the edge of one draw span and clasp hands in the drawing of flowers, the procession will start on to the west side, and the ceremony will be ended.

Vancouver will be represented in the parade by a delegation of citizens in 25 or 30 automobiles, headed by the regimental band from Vancouver barracks.

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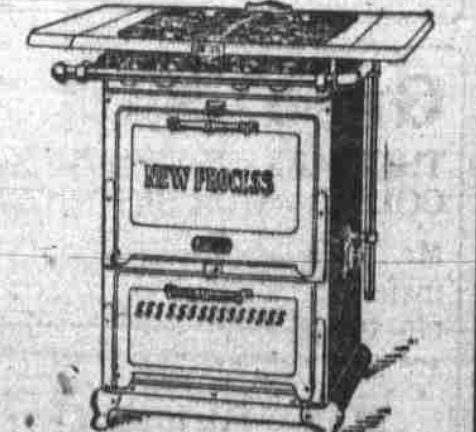
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
