I think that I shall turn Hellmann and Cunningham over to Nick Williams. Both of them show great promise but they need the experience to be gotten from playing regularly. They ought to help Nick out. If I pulled Bancroft over it would break up Nick's infield combination, which looks like a winner."

It is quite likely that Lou Stanley will become a member of Nick's pitching staff, according to the talk of Manager Mac this morning. He didn't say so in as many words, but the release of Jerry Gits, one of the two southpaws Nick had been carrying, gives a hint as to his belief. Williams needs a couple of southpaws and Stanley would be an ideal man for him. Nick liked the Atlantic coast boy as soon as he saw him at Vinalia and made a request for him then if he was to be turned loose by the Beavers.
