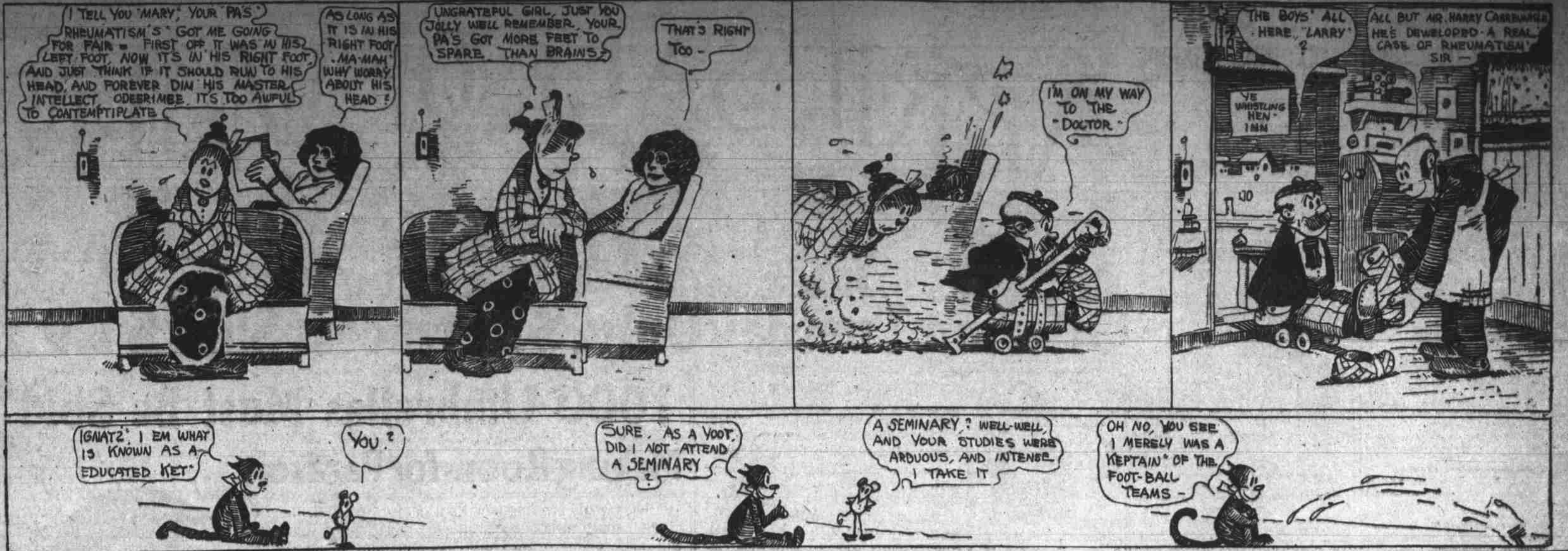

Resume of Yesterday's Events Briefly Paragraphed for the Entertainment of the Busy Reader.

Eastern. The weather men at Washington have prophesied moderately warm temperatures throughout the great central valleys, the Rocky mountain region and the plains states. They predict that "the first storm of importance will appear in the far west Tuesday or Wednesday, move eastward and cross the great central valleys Thursday or Friday, and reach the eastern states near the end of the week." Federal Judges Sanborn, Hook and Adams are conferring at St. Paul with the chairman of the Union Pacific, Robert S. Lovett. The dissolution of the Union Pacific and Southern Pacific railroads is under consideration. Threatened trouble with the Moros in the Philippines has been averted. Reports to the war department say that the army of 4000 belligerent tribesmen who practically laid siege to Jolo and dared the American garrison forth to battle, has dispersed. Twenty-five babies were dropped in Manila by a plane flying over the city on the wings of the eastern cyclone. Complete outfits for the infants and mothers were sent out by the baby department of the relief committee. Manufacture parlors at Chicago will be made the subject of investigation by the Illinois senate white slave probe. Fifty of these concerns have invaded downtown office buildings since the vice district was closed. "Massage and bath houses" will also be probed. "A man must have faith in God, faith in himself, faith in his fellow men and faith in his government before he can do any work of importance in the world," so declared William J. Bryan Sunday in the second of the series of Sunday afternoon Christian Endeavor meetings for men at Washington.

CARDINAL TAKES EXCEPTIONS TO OSLER REMARKS

Eminent Cleric Regards Scientist's Statements as Constituting an Attack Upon Christianity. (Special to The Journal.) Baltimore, Md., April 21.—When part of the speech of Sir William Osler at the dedicatory exercises of the Phipps Psychiatric Clinic at the Johns Hopkins hospital was read to Cardinal Gibbons, the prelate exclaimed: "I am shocked." Sir William, who is professor of medicine in Oxford university, said in part: "Primitive views will prevail everywhere of man's relation to the world and to the uncharted region about him. So recent is the control of the forces of nature that even in the most civilized countries man has not yet adjusted himself to the new conditions and stands only half awake rubbing his eyes." "Ninety per cent of our fellow creatures, when in trouble, sorrow or sickness, trust to charms, incantations and to the saints. Many a shrine has more followers than Pasteur; many a saint more believers than Letetiers." "Less than 20 years have passed since the last witch was burned in the British isles." "Attacks Scientists' Attitude." "Scientists in any line sometimes make statements such as that of Dr. Osler," said the cardinal. "And only a short time ago I had to defend some truths that Thomas A. Edison attacked." "These scientific specialists think their statements should go unchallenged, but this one of Dr. Osler shall not and I shall write to him asking him to retract it." "I would like to call the attention of Dr. Osler to the fact that Pasteur was a devoted Catholic and put his trust in the saints. He said that as his knowledge of medicines increased, his faith grew likewise. The statements attributed to Dr. Osler are an attack on Christianity. "I am surprised that he should make such attacks in this age." "What do the things that Dr. Osler preaches stand for, anyhow. Fifty years hence all his teachings may be overthrown by new discoveries. His whole doctrine is based on theory." "Fifty years ago the scientists of that day imagined they knew all that was to be known of medicine; yet today their conclusions are overthrown by later discoveries." "Dr. Osler Will Explain." Dr. Osler, when informed that the cardinal regarded his reputed utterances as an attack on Christianity, appeared to be greatly disturbed. "I am no enemy of the saint," he declared. "I will talk to my friend, the cardinal, about this as soon as I get back from New Haven."

CONTROL OF SPUD BLIGHT OUTLINED

No Practical Seed Treatment Has Been Found, O. A. C. Expert Says. (Special to The Journal.) Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Or., April 21.—The general loss of a large part of the potato crop in the western portion of the state, due to the blight, or, better, late blight, has given rise to the question of how best to control this pest another year, says L. D. Bailey, assistant plant pathologist at Oregon Agricultural college. "Many inquiries have been coming to the department of plant pathology asking what seed treatment can be used. "There is no practical seed treatment for the control of this fungus pest. Growers must select the seed with care, so that a crop of diseased potatoes are not used. Even then many tubers will be planted that carry the blight fungus in a dormant condition, ready to start infection of tops if warm, moist weather prevails. The most that can be hoped for is to use seed that will germinate well. Later, if conditions are favorable for blight, it will be necessary to spray with Bordeaux mixture. Do not wait until the fungus has established itself in a field before spraying. "The foliage should be kept well covered from the time the blossoms open, so that the spores which are scattered by air currents will be killed as soon as they fall on the leaves. Three applications at intervals of about two weeks have generally proved sufficient, except in case of prolonged warm, moist weather. For the first, use the 4-5-50 strength mixture, and for the second and later applications 6-6-50 mixture. "I would not wish to argue against seed treatment as a general practice, however, for we have several other diseases which can be largely controlled in this way. Use formalin, 1 pint in 30 gallons of water, and soak the potatoes with crates or sacks for 2 hours before cutting, then spread out to dry."

"COLD GOODBYE" SAID BY 3 AUTO BANDITS

(United Press Leased Wire.) Paris, April 21.—Mouning the gullotine at intervals of three minutes, Soudy, Callen and Moncey, three of Bonnet's automobile bandits, were executed in the order named at 4:30 a. m. today. The men were convicted of many murders. The three bandits were executed prematurely on the boulevard Arago, just outside the Prison de la Santé, to forestall a demonstration. Troops surrounded the gallotine to prevent a small mob from witnessing the executions. Soudy was executed first. As his head was placed on the block, he said: "It is a cold goodbye, friends." He died at exactly 4:30 o'clock. Callen died silently and coolly. Moncey cried "Goodbye" as the knife fell.

LEAVENWORTH CONVICT FALLS HEIR TO TITLE

(United Press Leased Wire.) Leavenworth, Kan., April 21.—A telegram was received at the federal prison announcing that Convict Fred Grey, by the death of an elder brother in England, would succeed to the title and a large estate. PLAINTIFF IS TAKEN TO JAIL ON PERJURY CHARGE

(Special to The Journal.) Fort Worth, Texas, April 21.—Francis M. Pope, Denver capitalist, was sent from the witness stand to jail on a charge of perjury in the district court here today, in the midst of his defense against a suit by the Commonwealth Bonding and Casualty Insurance company of Fort Worth to cancel a \$10,000 accident policy. Pope's left foot was shot off while he was alone, soon after the policy had been issued. The company claims he rolled his foot off to get the insurance money. A note given by Pope to F. W. Wright of Denver was produced to show that Pope had promised to pay Wright to testify he loaded the shotgun the day before Pope started on a hunting trip and that he forgot to unload it.

OREGON FIREMAN SUICIDE BESIDE PASCO BRIDGE

(Special to The Journal.) Pasco, Wash., April 21.—The body of George Swarthout, a Northern Pacific fireman, was found beside the railway tracks near the N. P. bridge early Sunday morning, with a bullet hole through the head. A revolver, one chamber empty, was found beside the body, and all evidence indicates suicide. His mother later arrived from her home at Pendleton and took the body to that place today. She can describe no cause for his suicide, as he had just returned from a visit home and seemed to be in his usual health and good spirits. He was a member of the Odd Fellows lodge at Lexington, Or., and the body was taken in charge by the lodge here. He had been firing out of Pasco for about three months, and the only cause for suicide suggested is despondency following a recent illness.

HEBO BARN BURNS, WITH HORSE

Cloverdale, Or., April 21.—A barn belonging to A. S. Lane of near Hebo was burned Friday night about 12 o'clock. One horse, about 80 bushels of oats, hay, harness and one wagon were destroyed. Total loss is about \$300, with \$200 insurance.

FREE SHINGLES WORRY MILL MEN

Washington Makers Protest Against Giving "Edge" to B. C. Mills. (United Press Leased Wire.) Tacoma, Wash., April 21.—Protesting against placing shingles on the free list, as proposed by the new tariff bill, shingle men of Washington have asked the cooperation of all lumbermen on the Pacific coast, with a view to petitioning congress to allow the present tariff to remain. The Red Cedar Shingle Manufacturers' association, representing about 175 shingle mills on the coast, has addressed a letter to the West Coast Lumber Manufacturers' association, with headquarters at Tacoma, setting forth its views on the removal of the present tariff of 50 cents a thousand. It is pointed out that the removal of this tariff would give shingle manufacturers of British Columbia, who practically draw from the same timber belt as the mills on this side of the line, an undue advantage. He says that already the British Columbia mills have an advantage because 80 per cent of the labor employed in the Canadian mills is local. The opening of the Panama canal will put the American manufacturer at a further disadvantage, as shingles from Canada will be sent in foreign bottoms, whose freight rates are approximately 15 per cent less than the charges by American ships.

SACRAMENTO SUFFERS \$300,000 LUMBER FIRE

(United Press Leased Wire.) Sacramento, Cal., April 21.—Originating in the plant of the Knox Lumber company, a fire swept the lower portion of the business district early today, entailing an estimated loss of \$300,000. Fanned by a stiff south wind, the blaze quickly spread to the adjoining lumber yards of Friend & Terry, and the two lumber plants were completely gutted before the fire department could respond to a general alarm. Sparks were scattered broadcast by the wind, and soon the entire block bounded by Front, Second, L and M streets was in flames. The block destroyed by the fire is occupied by a number of warehouses, and contains, besides the lumber plants, the following houses: Athens hotel, Diggs Implement company, Woods Curtis company, the Leich warehouse, Crane & Co. and the A. S. Hopkins Co.
