

## TO ASK RECEIVER FOR 'PLANTATION'

International Lumber & Development Co. Stockholders Try to Save Remnants.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Philadelphia, Pa., April 21.—That a receivership would be asked for the International Lumber & Development Co., whose officers were found guilty today of conspiracy to defraud hundreds of investors all over the country out of millions of dollars by means of misrepresenting the holdings of a plantation in Mexico, has been decided by a number of stockholders. They claim that in nine years \$3,000,000 was obtained on the payment of stock, and that of that amount, \$1,500,000 was paid back in "dividends."

Should Judge Wilmer of the United States court refuse to grant a new trial when the five defendants are brought before him, probably this week, under the law such can be given sentences of life imprisonment besides a fine of \$10,000 in each of the 24 counts.

The charges grew from the exploitation by the concern of a 250,000 acre plantation in the state of Campeche, Mexico. It was represented in the literature sent out that the proceeds of the \$6,000,000 of stock were to be expended in clearing the plantation and

## TO TOUR AMAZON; IS 80 YEARS OLD

Commodore Benedict Starts on 12,000 Mile Trip to South America.

Benedict of the New York Yacht club signing the clearance papers, the yacht Onelda will leave New York harbor Wednesday for a run of 12,000 miles in the waters of South America, including a trip up the Amazon. Sinclair and Mr. and Mrs. Colgate Hoyt.

The Onelda, which will convey the party, is the 300-foot yacht formerly owned by John Hays Hammond. Her present owner is 80 years of age, and is now embarking on what he thinks will be his last long voyage into foreign waters. Commodore Benedict has made many trips into unusual parts of the world. 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## ACCOMPLICE OF MILLER SAID TO BE GARROTTER

## NEW S. P. SHOPS AT SPRINGFIELD

Valley Town Considered to Be Ideally Located for the Plant.

Plans are being prepared by the Southern Pacific for a large shop to be located at Springfield, about three miles from Eugene. The proposed shops will not replace the Southern Pacific shops in Southeast Portland, but the intention is to operate them as division shops, with the main plant for the heavier work at Springfield. The matter is yet in embryonic state and at time has been fixed for the beginning of development of the project.

Springfield is regarded as particularly well located for the main shops, largely by reason of the fact that it is only a short distance from Natron, where the Oregon Eastern, also known as the Natron cut-off of the Southern Pacific, will connect with the main line. The Oregon Eastern will form a connection between Natron and Weed by way of Klamath. Quite a distance of the line has already been built and the boring of some large tunnels is now being prosecuted. How soon the link will be completed is yet a matter of conjecture, however.

## "GOVERNOR" POLLINGER, NOTED VIGILANTE, DIES

Says It Takes Action on Rate Increases Only on Initiative of Others.

(Special to The Journal.) Butte, Mont., April 21.—C. Pollinger, aged 67, one of the famous pioneers of the northwest and early day Vigilante, died Saturday at Pasadena, Cal. He gained the sobriquet "governor" because of his activity in running down law breakers in the early days of Montana territory and stringing them up to the nearest tree.

"Governor" Pollinger helped hang five road agents, who were executed with Sheriff Plummer by Vigilantes near Banock. He also aided in the arrest of Boone Helm and Jack Gallagher, notorious desperadoes of the early days, who had the territory terrorized until Pollinger and the Vigilantes got after them. Pollinger came across the plains in Montana in 1882, engaging in mining. He assisted in the building of the Columbia turnpike, one of the first in Pennsylvania.

## JUDGE APPROVES UTILITIES BODY

Says It Takes Action on Rate Increases Only on Initiative of Others.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Seattle, Wash., April 21.—The old minimum gas rate of 25 cents is restored in Seattle, unless the supreme court should reverse the decision of Judge Albertson, who knocked out the 50-cent rate, approved by the state public service commission.

In a lengthy opinion Judge Albertson hands the state public service commission an emphatic rebuke as to its attitude on rate regulation.

"It is the attitude of the commission," the judge said, "that it need not concern itself over any increase of an established rate, and is not called upon to demand any showing of the necessity or propriety thereof, unless somebody else bears about the application and protests with alacrity."

"It is clear to my mind that the statute should be repealed or radically amended."
