

OREGON MEN HAVE FLOOR OF HOUSE TO TALK ON TARIFF

Sinnott Makes Notable Speech for Wool Tariff; Hawley Repeats More Familiar Arguments for Protection.

(Washington Bureau of The Journal.) Washington, April 26.—Representative Sinnott with a general discourse on tariff matters, and Representative Hawley with a speech in which he told how in his infancy he devoured Blackstone and naturally said a few things about the tariff, and Representative Sinnott, with a learned treatise in scholarly diction about wool and its right to protection, made this something of a field day for Oregon on the floor of the house.

It was late before any of the Oregonians were able to secure the floor, but, considering that the house was weary of tariff talk and that attendance has been light all week, the Oregonians received good attention. Hawley covered a wide range with his talk, which contained arguments that have long been favorites with protectionists. Sinnott had a speech which was the result of careful study and which was notable for its style and originality.

Sinnott's Speech Original. Sinnott said that because of the peculiar and unique relations of his state to the Democratic party, its interests and welfare were entitled to more than a perfunctory hearing. Referring to the pledge of the Democratic platform for "legislation that will not injure or destroy legitimate industry," he declared that "punic faith," would be an euphemism in comparison with such Democratic faith, pledges and performances if the tariff bill should pass in its present form.

Says Wool Grower Has Suffered. "The sheep men of my district," he said, "are at a loss to know why their great industry is classed among the illegitimate industries."

Giving statistics to show the vast investment in the industry, he compared the cost of production in the United States, South America and Australia, and then contended that the wool grower has suffered by comparison with the wool manufacturer for years.

He insisted that the west was as much entitled to free manufactures as the east is to free wool.

Sinnott took the ground that in taking the duty off of wool, the party had violated the pledge that no legitimate industry should be injured.

Chamberlain Given Support.

If the messages being received by Senator Chamberlain are any index, then the people of this country are generally in favor of America's management of the canal for the benefit of her own commerce first. There is very general approval shown of Senator Chamberlain's resolution to abrogate the Hay-Pauncefote treaty.

The senator himself is firmly convinced that this is the proper course to take.

INTRODUCTION OF JONES ACT BRINGS PANIC IN MANILA

W. D. Wheelwright Says Uncertainty of American Policy Regarding Philippine Independence Hurts Islands.

Just how a rumor that the Philippines might get their independence affects business interests of the islands was explained by W. D. Wheelwright, president of the Pacific Export Lumber company, who returned yesterday from a five months' trip around the world.

Mr. Wheelwright was in Manila when Representative Jones introduced a bill in congress recently, which if passed would give the Philippines independence in a few years.

"Upon receipt of the news in the Philippines," said Mr. Wheelwright, "business was prostrated. Banks began calling in loans, building stopped, and every one having financial interests prepared for bad times. Later, news came that the bill probably would not pass and then things began to pick up, but the effects of the panic were still in evidence when I left."

"I interviewed a number of business men in the islands concerning what would happen should independence be granted the Philippines. I found the general opinion is that the islands are nowhere near ready to handle their own governmental affairs independent of the United States. To give them this power would be tantamount to inviting chaos."

"The great mass of Filipinos are contented and talk of independence is confined for the most part to agitators who want to get office and control of the government for selfish purposes."

"There is very little American capital being invested in the islands, when compared to the money being poured into business by the British. This is because uncertainty exists as to whether the United States will continue to hold possession of the country. Given assurances that present government supervision would continue to exist for even two generations, more American money would be attracted to develop the undeveloped resources of the islands."

"Manila is getting to be an increasingly important port of the east. It is backed by a wonderfully productive country which needs only to be developed to bring wealth to a nation."

Mr. Wheelwright left Portland November 5. While his journey was actuated by business he found time to visit many interesting spots of the globe. Among places he stopped at were London, Liverpool, Marseilles, Port Said, Cairo, Leno, Cairo, Egypt, Bombay, Delhi, Calcutta and Madras, India; Manila, Hongkong and Shanghai, China, and Yokohama, Japan.

BRYAN'S VISIT TO WORK CHANGE IN ALIEN LAND BILL

Opinion Fully Expressed in California Capital That Secretary's Coming Will Result in Altered Policy.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Sacramento, Cal., April 26.—While all anti-alien legislation is being held in abeyance today, pending the arrival of Secretary of State William J. Bryan early Monday, discussion of the probable effect of his visit on the pending legislation is overshadowing all other topics at the capital.

Although it has been freely predicted that Bryan's visit is primarily a diplomatic move, with the intention of assuring Japan that her interests will be looked after by the federal government, there is a growing conviction among some of the legislative leaders that Bryan will succeed in materially changing the character of the alien land bill that is eventually to be enacted.

"I think there will be a great deal of 'laying down' on the part of the Democrats, and on the Progressive side, too," said Assemblyman Stanley Benedict, Progressive leader of the Los Angeles delegation, today. Benedict is close to the administration.

Senators Are Reticent. On the senate side the legislators are extremely reticent in expressing an opinion on the effect of Secretary Bryan's visit.

"I could not say what effect his coming will have," said Senator Campbell, Democratic leader, today. "We will not know until we ascertain just what Bryan will ask."

Senator Thompson, Progressive, who aided in framing the Birdsall bill, and who is preparing drastic amendments that will apply to 100 foreigners ineligible to citizenship, announced that he would submit a copy of his amendments to Bryan upon his arrival.

"Until we learn the stand the secretary of state takes, it will be difficult to predict the effect of his visit," said Thompson.

URGE REHABILITATION OF REPUBLICAN PARTY

Advocating the rehabilitation of the national Republican party, the executive board of the Republican club, at its regular meeting last evening adopted resolutions to that effect and in line with their plan of reorganization they elected Jay S. Hamilton of the Hamilton Lumber company, president of the club.

At a meeting to be held next Wednesday evening, the club will consider and decide upon its stand relative to the primary election to be held May 3. The resolution passed by the executive board is as follows:

"Resolved, by the Republican club of Oregon, that we favor the holding of a national convention of the Republican party in the near future, to aid and assist in the rehabilitation and upbuilding of the Republican party, by providing for an amendment of the rules in regard to the appointment of delegates to the different states, so as to have the number represent more nearly the party vote as cast in the presidential election of 1908; and also for the purpose of adopting a new platform in harmony with changed conditions and advanced principles."

"Resolved, that a copy of this resolution be sent to Charles D. Hilles, national chairman, and Ralph E. Williams, national committeeman for Oregon, respectively."

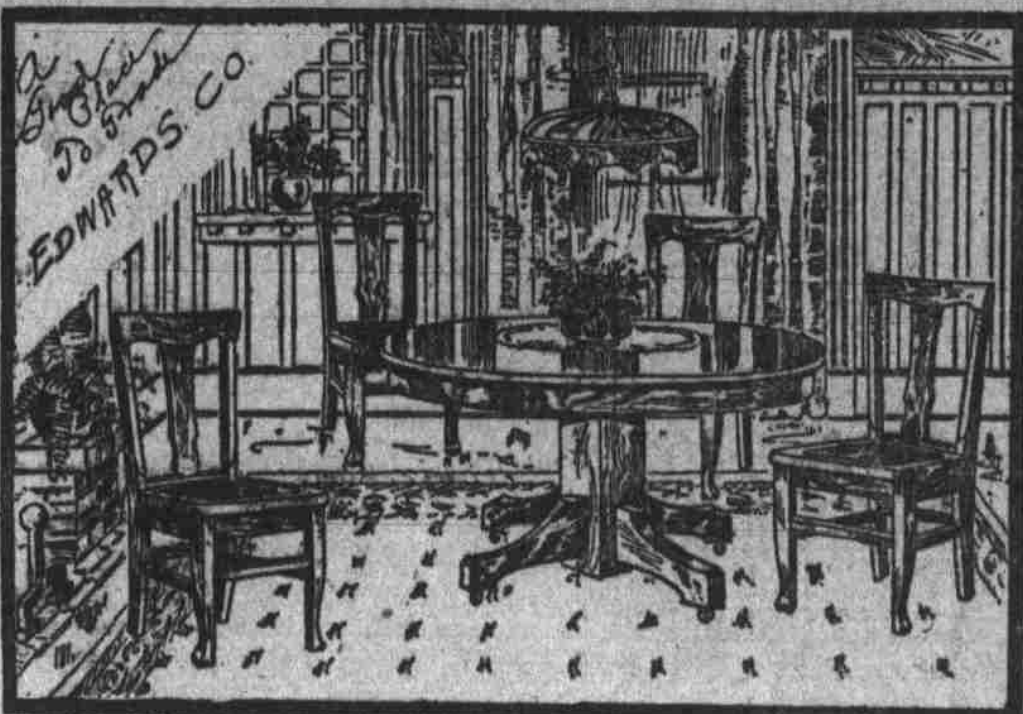

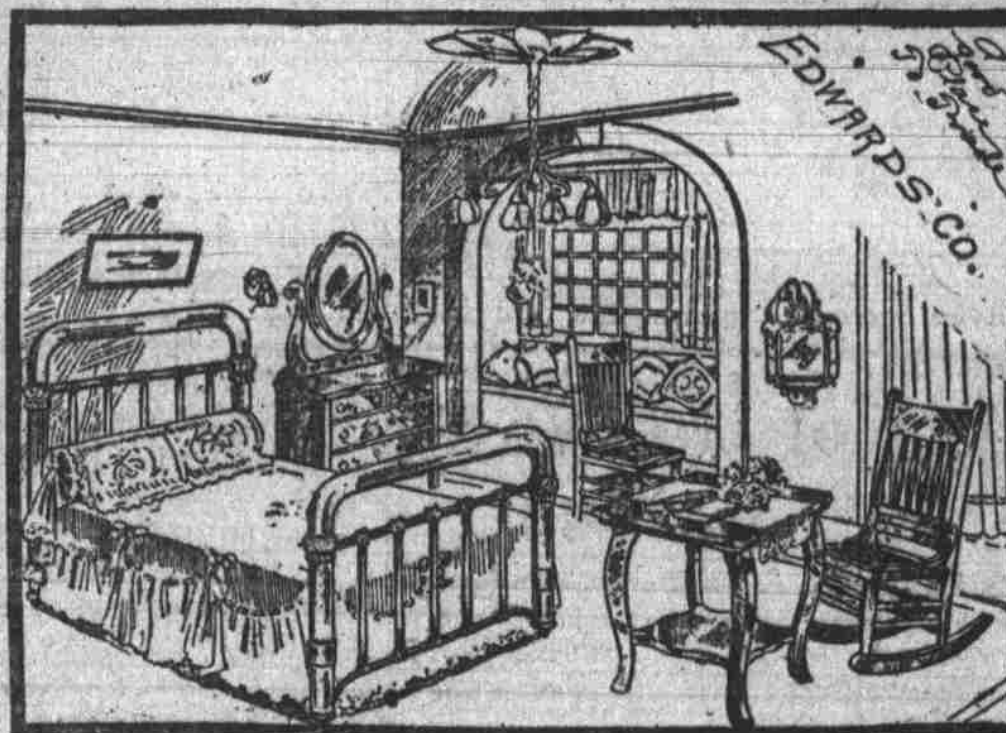

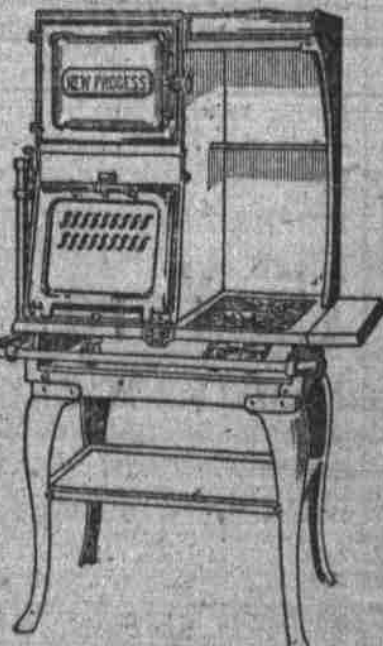
