Japanese Woman's Estate.—Miss Uryda, Okita, the Japanese woman who was murdered in a rooming at Fourth and Flinders streets last Monday, left an estate worth \$450, of which \$400 was cash and the remainder clothes and personal effects. She was 40 years old, and resided at 84 North Tenth street with her only brother, Kenji Uryda, 25 years old. Her brother petitioned for the probate of the estate, and on his recommendation Kivalichi Otsubo was appointed administrator. In addition to the brother, the woman was survived by her mother, Yae Kurose of 13 West Shin street, Hiroshima, Japan. Y. Matsui, H. Iji and D. T. Uchida were appointed appraisers of the estate.

Do You Eat Meat?—You'll get it cheaper, says Frank L. Smith, the beef trader. Smith has closed several of his small markets in the suburbs and will put his efforts in his three downtown markets, where you get a fresh steak for 20c. Extraordinary choice Oregon creamery butter (fresh daily) is 60 cents. Boiling beef and corned beef are 10 cents. Roasts of pork and pot roast beef are 12 1/2 cents. Rib steak is 15 cents. Boy Arrested.—Walking boldly into the Lumbermans National bank yesterday, a boy 15 years old was placed under arrest for having forged the name of G. K. Hershey to a \$40 money order February 24, and designed the alias of G. H. Larsen to the order. The boy stole the order and after he had cashed it went home to St. Paul, Minn. Prior to cashing the order he had beaten his way to Portland as a hobo and a few days ago he returned by the same route. He is being held by the juvenile authorities and his parents have been communicated with. His case has been continued until work shall have been received from his parents as to what can be done.

Junk Dealer Held.—Joseph Adler, junk dealer, was held in the grand jury yesterday in the municipal court on a charge of obtaining \$350 from Joseph Simons, a man for whom he was acting as agent. Both men have been dealing in junk. Attorney Max Cohen appeared for Adler. Attorney Leonard represented Simons. Adler claimed the dealing was of a partnership nature, while Simons claimed Adler was his agent. In his opening remarks, Attorney Leonard protested to the court against interruptions by the clerk, saying it was the business of the court to stop him when misstatements were being made.

On His Way to Portland.—H. G. Dunlap has written a short-hand letter to the Portland Commercial club that he likes the Oregon metropolis so well that he is now enroute, with the view of making this city his home. This would not arouse anyone's curiosity particularly, but for the fact that Dunlap says he is walking it all the way from Fort Worth, Texas. The letter was written in Utah, and he hopes to cover the entire distance by foot. He says he was in Portland a few years ago and after seeing many other places since then drew the conclusion that the Rose City is the city for him.

Find Man Is Dead.—Word that H. C. Kay, summoned for duty on the May jury, died five years ago, has been received at County Clerk Coffey's office. Taxes are being paid on property which is still in Mr. Kay's name, which accounts for the summons. Another prospective jurymen who has been called by death was P. D. Lane. His property is still assessed in his name. One hundred and fifty summonses were issued this month, as it was feared that owing to the number of cases to be tried there might be a shortage were the regular panel of about 25 less called.

Aged Invalid Wants Freedom.—The release of Daniel J. Haynes, an elderly attorney, from the St. Joseph's Home for the Aged, East Thirtieth street and Hase Line Road, is sought by a writ of habeas corpus. The petition for the writ has been filed in the circuit court. John Naze, who signed the petition, says Haynes has been moved from place to place since February 15 by his wife and daughter, Mrs. K. S. Ervin, and that he was placed in the home contrary to his wishes on April 25. He states that Haynes is an invalid and is confined to his bed.

Mollala Organizes Commercial Club.—Mollala organized a commercial club Tuesday night at a meeting and banquet given at that place under the auspices of the Grange. C. C. Chapman, manager of the Promotion department of the Portland Commercial club, who was present, says the keenest of enthusiasm was displayed and that the new organization promises to become a very important factor in the promotion of that section of Clackamas county.

Develop Factory Business.—The factory making special request and stamped envelopes for the government, at Dayton, Ohio, and which was put out of business by the floods, is working full blast again and notice was received at the Portland postoffice today that merchants and business men may put in full orders for these supplies henceforth. The factory is working three weeks behind time, but with double shifts it is fast catching up in the orders.

Bankruptcy Proceedings.—A petition in bankruptcy was filed with the federal clerk yesterday by C. W. Lamar, a real estate dealer who resides at 1761 Sixth avenue, Fulton Park, and who has offices on the fourth floor of the Corbett building. His debts are \$136,382 and assets are \$1901. Albert Hign, a farmer of Gilliam county, filed a petition in bankruptcy today, listing liabilities of \$947.50 and no assets.

Susan Dickinson Dies.—Mrs. Susan Dickinson died yesterday morning at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Dwight Woolworth, 714 Forty-third avenue S. E. She was 84 years old. Mrs. Dickinson was survived by three daughters and one son. They are Mrs. Freeman L.

Harford, Newberg, Dr. Mrs. J. C. Greenman, Kansas City; Mrs. Dwight Woolworth, Portland, and H. L. Dickinson, 4223 Sixty-second street. The funeral will be held at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning from the Woolworth residence.

Parole John Maybrick.—The good record of John Maybrick and the fact that he had been drinking at the time brought him a parole this morning from Circuit Judge McGinn after he had been sentenced to from one to seven years for stealing watches, razors, knives and other little things from the front street gymnasium. Maybrick pleaded guilty to the charge and was placed under parole to Lewis H. Dawley. He is about 25 years old and has been a painter at Tigardville, where he bore a good reputation. He spent nearly four months in the county jail awaiting trial.

Doctor Wins Suit.—Dr. Wyle G. Woodruff was successful in defending a damage suit instituted by Charles Johnson for \$20,000 because of alleged carelessness on the part of Dr. Woodruff in caring for Johnson's broken ankle. The jury last night brought in a verdict for Dr. Woodruff, which was signed by nine members. Dr. Woodruff contended that Johnson was at fault in the nature of his ankle to set properly, charging that Johnson failed to take proper care of the injured member while it was encased in the plaster cast.

Burglar Disturbs Prayers.—As a family on Harford avenue was saying prayer last evening immediately before retiring, a burglar at an outside window disturbed the devotion. The husband called the police, and Patrolman Woodward responded immediately. While the patrolman was going to the home, however, the burglar slipped away from the window, walked away from the home, but was found a short distance down the street. He explained that a mistake had been made, thinking that the home he had visited was one of a friend.

Suit Against City.—The suit of the Hordford Transportation company against the city on account of damages sustained by the launch Rowena which struck a submerged piling under the new Hawthorne bridge in March, 1911, was tried yesterday before Circuit Judge Davis and has been taken under consideration. Damages to the extent of \$219.95 are asked. The city claims that the piling was left by Robert Wakefield & Co., an independent contractor, and the city is not liable for the damage.

Workmen's Mass Meeting.—M. C. Reed will speak against the commission charter at the Socialist hall above Circle theatre tonight at 8 o'clock. Last Thursday evening Dr. C. H. Chapman spoke for the charter before a large and enthusiastic audience. The meeting tonight will give the workmen ample opportunity to decide upon the relative merits of the two factions. All workmen are urged to be present.

Damage Suit Falls.—A jury in Circuit Judge Davis' court yesterday held that the Portland Railway, Light & Power company was not responsible for the injury to Mrs. A. B. Masters' ankle received when she stepped from a car into a hole in the pavement at Third and Morrison streets last January. A verdict for the company was returned. Mrs. Masters asked \$15,125 damages.

Companies Incorporated.—Mason Wittenberg, F. C. Stettler and Clarence M. Eubanks filed articles of incorporation this morning with County Clerk Coffey of the Dallas Development company, capitalized at \$50,000. Articles were also filed with Mitchell Point Lumber company by Miles D. Jameson, A. Glover and Jacob Rieger for \$20,000.

Favor Commission Plan.—"Commission Form of Government" was the subject of an address given last night by L. M. Lepper, before the members of the M. Tabor Progressive Men's club, in the hall at East Fifty-second and Belmont streets. Most of those who attended the meeting declared themselves as being in favor of the proposed commission charter for Portland.

Dr. Drake to Lecture.—Dr. Emma F. A. Drake, physician, author and lecturer, the corresponding secretary of the World's Purity Federation, is spending a few days in Portland before starting on her lecture tour through western Oregon, and is to give one of her stirring lectures in the Union Avenue Methodist church tonight.

Auto Is Stolen.—While E. E. Sieret, of Peterson & Sieret was attending a theatre last night, some one took his Springfield from in front of the theatre. The police found the machine at 2 o'clock this morning in front of the Hotel Oregon. The machine was apparently none the worse for what use it might have had.

BURKE WOULD START NEW PLAN IN COURT

"I am a one-term candidate," said Attorney W. A. Burke, candidate for municipal judge, last night in his South Portland talks. "If I cannot successfully carry out my policies in that term, I cannot do it in a second," he said. "If elected, I shall set in motion my ideas on the first day of the term. I know now what they will be and am ready to show the people of Portland there is a new way to deal with the usual police court case."

"We have been following the old idea of punishment for one and fine for the other fellow, until we have gotten into a channel. In order to carry out some of the things I have in mind, the business of the court must be absolutely unalterably divorced from politics. That's what changes the course of many judges. It's the second term facing him. Too many officers want to favor this friend or that fellow because it may mean support in the next race. That's wrong."

"Some of the things I propose to start on the first day of the term are to help the unfortunate and unemployed men to get more attention to cases involving the liberty of the fellow arrested; hold semi-private trials for women and children, and start a movement of 'don't-do-it-again' for the man who was careless. For the man who violates the law when he knows he is doing wrong, the punishment should be the rockpile or a fine sufficient to teach him a lesson."

IN EARLIER DAYS

One of the best private collections of old books in the city is owned by C. C. Chapman, secretary of the Commercial club. For years he has been picking up rare prints and early editions. To the lover of the quaint and curious there is a fascination about looking over old books.

In Baltimore and in New Orleans, in New York and Portland, Maine, but particularly in Philadelphia and Boston, I have spent hours in the old book stores and book stalls looking over musty, time-worn leather-bound volumes.

A day or two ago I dropped into a second hand store here in Portland. Old books have, like people, a personality. It is interesting to pick up an old book and find the notes and underlinings of its former owner who probably has been dust for several generations.

I found several books that I wanted and after I had paid for them Walter Baker, the proprietor, knowing my fondness for the antique and the curious, said: "Here is a book you will be interested in." It was an old leather-bound book entitled "A New View of London." "Take it along with you and look it over for a day or two," said Mr. Baker.

I took it to a friend of mine, a scholarly Englishman. Together we looked it over. The inscription of the map which accompanied the book read, "A New Map of London, showing the Burrough of Southwalk and the various suburbs of London." The map was dated 1707.

"How that takes one back to historic London and the England of the earlier days," said my friend. "See, here is marked Good Man's Field, that is where Bunyon was burned. Here is the Upper Moore Field where the old train-beds were drilled in archery. Here is historic Cheapside. Here is the old bridge across the Thames with the houses shown between which the traffic passed. I remember stopping to watch the work of excavating for the new bridge when

the old one was torn down. The workmen uncovered a beautiful tessellated marble floor and among the antiquities found was a box of coin which had been taken by the bridge tender for toll. We say that there is nothing new under the sun and it almost seems as if this were the case for among the coin found in this old toll box were some counterfeit Roman coins.

Here is Smith Field, where the martyrs were burned and here is historic old Lester Square where all of the duels in the days of the early Georges were fought. This field opposite St. James Palace, where the Balkan conference was recently held, you will notice is marked "decoy." In those days the royal tables were supplied with ducks from this lake. Dogs were trained to chase the wild ducks from one screen to another until they came to a narrow entrance covered with a netting where they were caught, sometimes hundreds of them being caught in one snaring.

Here are the historic law courts marked on the map—the new temple, the old temple and the middle temple, as well as Lincoln Inn and Gray's Inn where the different guilds of Barristers resided.

Here is the old Globe theatre on the south side of the river, just west of London Bridge, where Shakespeare was an actor. Here, too, are the historic old streets and post roads leaving London—Charing Cross The Strand, Fleet street, High Holborn, one of the main arteries of traffic in those days—Cheap side, and here is Whitechapel, leading into the main road to Harwich, White Horse Lane, which leads to Hangman's Acre. Here is the road to Ware, to Islington, to Croyden and here the famous road to Oxford.

It is almost like reading history to trace the course of the Thames and notice the historic names. There are the Parliament Stairs leading down to the river. Here are the Westminster Stairs, the Temple Stairs, the Black Friar Stairs. Here below the bridge is Billingsgate and Wapping Old Stairs. Here is Bell Wharf and Execution Dock.

Turning from the map we turned the yellowed pages with their old-fashioned s's looking like f's, and read the de-

scriptions of the various lanes and markets, courts and alleys, yards and lanes of London of the elder day. The descriptions of the various work-houses, burial grounds, charity schools, ferries, keys, palaces, fraternity houses and prisons and houses of nobility, sound very old-fashioned to our ears.

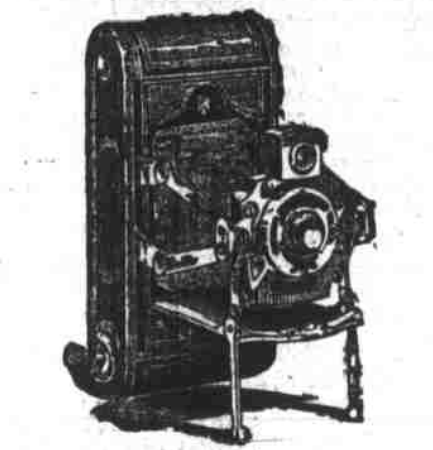
