salary increases for the city attorney, city engineer, city treasurer, city councilmen, judge of the municipal court and clerk of the municipal court will probably not be voted on, as City Attorney Grant has asked the city council to rescind the resolutions putting them on the ballot. In the case of the city councilmen, the salary raise amendment would be ridiculous, anyway, as the offices of fifteen city councilmen have been abolished.

Amendment Is Important.
One of the important charter amendments that will come up before the voters at the June election is that amending the commission charter so as to retain the docks commission in its present form. The commission charter provides that all present boards and commissions shall be abolished in six months, but it is strongly contended that the docks commission should be made an exception.

Mayor Rushlight has called a special meeting of the city council for next Friday morning at 10 o'clock, at which time the amendment will be voted on. The lawmakers may rescind the resolutions placing salary increase amendments on the ballot.

It was the general sense of the meeting that the newly adopted commission plan of government offers Portland opportunity for better government than it has ever had, providing that the proper men are elected to office. It was also the understanding that the element opposed to clean government will be organized to get the results they desire. To offset this effect, to induce good, conscientious men to run for office, the ministers were on record as favoring organization of themselves for purposes of dissemination of reliable information among the members of their congregation.

President Foster Pleased.
"By the adoption of the commission charter, we have achieved an opportunity," said President Foster of Reed college, who was the invited speaker of the morning. "The charter can be a power for good or evil. It is essential that there be elected to office men who can make it powerfully good."

President Foster urged that an organization of citizens be formed to inquire into and spread broadcast facts of the lives and standing of candidates for office. He insisted, however, that membership in such an organization be limited entirely to those who have no self or corporate interest in the election, and to those whose interests are for the good of the city and the citizens as a whole.

President Foster reviewed briefly the meaning of the coming World's Christian Citizenship conference and exhibit on the conservation of human life, which is to be held at the college Friday, Saturday and Sunday of this week.

President Foster suggested that the presidency of the association be represented by one of the less prominent denominations, Rev. Luther R. Dyott and Rev. Delmer H. Trimble, both of whom have been nominated for the presidency, announced their willingness to resign in favor of any other members. The matter was left to the nominating committee.

The annual election will be held at the next monthly meeting on the first Monday in June.

WAKEFIELD CASE IN JURY'S HANDS

Judge Morrow Finished In-
structions at 10:40 o'Clock
This Morning.

The \$408,000 suit of Robert Wakefield & Co. against the City of Portland went to the jury at 10:40 o'clock this morning, following instructions given by Circuit Judge Morrow.

The suit is to recover for work and extras claimed to have been performed and furnished on the two Mt. Tabor reservoirs constructed by the company. Judge Morrow held that any material act by either party which necessarily prevents the completion of the contract may constitute an abandonment. He held, however, that changes, additions, deductions or violations of stipulations must be considerable and material in value and effect to constitute abandonment.

Judge Morrow stated that abandonment at any time effected the entire time of construction.

Should the jury find for the company Judge Morrow instructed them that they must determine the reasonable value of the work done and materials used and should then deduct from that amount, \$458,563.31, the amount which the city has already paid. The limit of a verdict for the plaintiff he stated must be \$408,000, the amount sued for. A verdict for the plaintiff he stated would do away with the counter claims of the city since both are based on the theory that the contract existed throughout the work.

A verdict for the city must carry with it the full amount of \$750,000, claimed as penalties and \$300,000 which was agreed should be deducted on account of lowering the upper reservoir. Interest cannot be allowed on any amounts awarded he instructed the jury.

The original contract called for \$544,000 expenditure and later \$30,000 was allowed for extras. The contract was entered upon October 19, 1909.

TWO MAY BE FATALLY INJURED IN RUNAWAY

John Kiermeyer, a dairyman of West Portland, and wife, were probably fatally injured about 12:30 o'clock today when the horse they were driving ran away and dumped them on the street.

The horse, a dark bay, was unmanageable when they were taken to St. Vincent's hospital. It was believed their skulls were fractured.

The couple live on a farm on the Slavin road. Today the driving team was taken down Front street near Jefferson when their horse became frightened and ran. When it reached 381 Water street the horse tried to go around a heavy lumber wagon. The wheel of the light rig struck the wagon and the elderly couple were pitched into the street.

E. E. Versteeg, Democrat, was nominated for the council in the ninth ward. L. Jennings in the third ward; C. I. Duggett in the tenth ward; Clyde and Dr. Hampton received the Democratic nominations for councilmen-at-large. Roscoe P. Hurst was named for municipal judge, while for city attorney, Frank S. Grant, the only Republican primary candidate, was named by the Democrats over Mon, Democrat, and City Treasurer, Charles E. Replogle, Democrat.

Local candidates, who were named over Whittem, Democrat, A. L. Barbur also received the nomination for city auditor.

Besides H. R. Albee for mayor, the Progressives nominated P. G. Wilde for auditor, Adams for treasurer, Lon L. Parker for municipal judge, Edward J. Brazell for city attorney, and M. L. L. Duggett for councilman-at-large.

Dr. Victoria Hampton, a Democrat, was nominated for councilman from the second ward, Benjamin Goodman from the fifth ward and Charles H. Beard from the tenth ward.

MRS. SHEPARD ONG IS BURNED IN EXPLOSION

Mrs. Shepard Ong, mother of Dr. H. F. Ong, a prominent local physician, and a Mrs. Ladd, a neighbor, who lives in the same building, were painfully burned by an explosion of gas this morning in Mrs. Ong's apartment, when Mrs. Ong struck a match in the room in which a leak in a gas pipe had occurred.

Mrs. Ong accidentally pulled a gas jet from the connections, and was advised by the gas company to stop up the leak with soap. While working in the room, she struck a match and the explosion resulted, burning both women seriously about the hands and face. The burns are "only superficial," and will leave no scar.

The fire department was called to put out the blaze that resulted, but this had been extinguished before its arrival.

SPORTSMAN SLAIN ON SALMONBERRY

Camper Finds Body Two or
Three Years After Supposed
Robbery and Murder.

Bay City, Or., May 5.—Henry F. Plus of Portland, a camper on the Salmonberry river, notified county officials that he had found the remains of a man.

Coroner Hawk held an inquest and a verdict of "death by violence from unknown hands" was returned.

The body was found at mile-post 52 of the Pacific Railway and Navigation, near the junction of the Nehalem and Salmonberry rivers. No personal property was found on the body. The man was about 5 feet 10 inches in height, weighed about 160 pounds and his age may have been 35 years. There was a small gold filling in the right side of the left center incisor. He wore a blue shirt and high sporting boots at the time of death. Apparently he had been dead for two or three years.

The body had been robbed and thrown into a small hole on the bank of the river.

U. S. COURT OF APPEALS AFFIRMS CONVICTION OF A. F. OF L. LEADERS

The lengthy opinion of the district court of appeals.

In his opinion Justice Van Orsdel said: "Had the court below imposed penalties not greatly in excess of those which we now deem adequate, we would not have felt justified in holding that there had been an abuse of discretion. Since the penalties are so unreasonable we are called upon to modify that judgment, and we prefer to err, if at all, on the side of moderation. No one, however, can read this record without being convinced that Gompers has been the chief factor in this contempt. Hence more severe punishment is merited in his case than in those of the other respondents."

Justice Sheppard held that a criminal contempt charge is an "offense against the United States" and is therefore subject to the bar of the statute of limitations. He urged the reversal of the entire judgment of the lower court.

Gompers is today at a hospital here undergoing treatment for ear trouble and Mitchell is at his home in Mount Vernon, N. Y. Morrison refused to make any comment on the decision.

WAS GOING 40 MILES AN HOUR ON LINTON

O.-W. R. & N. ISSUES NEW RATE TARIFF

The O.-W. R. & N. company is distributing a new tariff, number 67-B, naming rates effective June 4 from Portland to points in Idaho and Utah on the Oregon Short Line. This tariff is a consolidation of the Idaho and Utah tariffs published separately and also contains the reduced commodity rates on articles manufactured at Portland as recently agreed to by the O.-W. R. & N. and Oregon Short Line upon request of the transportation committee of the Portland Chamber of Commerce.

These rates are a substantial reduction from those formerly in effect and give Portland manufacturers opportunity to largely increase their business in Idaho in competition with eastern manufacturers.

NEW EVIDENCE AGAINST DUFFY

Sheriff Receives Letters From
Women Which May Cause
Federal Charge.

With letters pouring in from all over the country from women who are alleged to have corresponded with C. H. Duffy, alias J. E. Ellis, alias Rev. F. T. Richards, who is now in jail on a charge of swindling Anne Bock out of \$1950 after he had married her under the name of Ellis, Sheriff Word is sure that he has enough evidence to secure Duffy's conviction on the federal charge of misusing the mails.

The latest letter to be received by Sheriff Word was one this morning from Mrs. Frieda C. King, of Memphis, Tenn. Inclosed with her letter is one said to have been sent her by Duffy, although the signature is that of J. E. Nellis. A letter of recommendation which was sent to Mrs. King by Rev. F. T. Richards is also in the hands of Sheriff Word.

Rev. F. T. Richards was the name signed to the letter of recommendation sent to Mrs. King by Duffy. This name is also one which was signed to other letters of recommendation received by women in other parts of the country.

In the letter to Mrs. King, Nellis, said by Sheriff Word, to be none other than Duffy, gave his address as 1279 East Thirty-first street. This is the same as he wrote in letters to Mrs. Ellis.

In the letter sent to Sheriff Word by Mrs. King in answer to a telegram sent by Word, she evidences great surprise that a man whom she was planning to marry should be arrested and be in jail. She states how she had corresponded with Nellis and was going to have him invest a large amount of her money in a sawmill plant which he was contemplating. According to the letter she was to marry him and become business partners in the venture.

Duffy, alias Ellis, alias Richards, will have a hearing in the justice court within a few days.

LITTLE STRANG GIRL DIES; TO HOLD INQUEST

Marela Strang, the 5-year-old daughter of Mrs. Lillian Strang, died this morning at the Good Samaritan hospital from the effects of poison given by the mother several days ago. An inquest will be held to determine the criminal responsibility of the mother, who is considered out of danger at the hospital. Mrs. Strang gave birth to her three children poison, then attempted to kill herself. The husband came home a short time after this attempt, and found the wife attempting to counteract the effect of poison. The other two children are in a serious condition at the hospital.

Astoria Fisherman Fined.
