

CODE FOR CHARTER ADMINISTRATION WILL BE PREPARED

New York Municipal Bureau Now Exporting Port of Portland Methods, May Undertake Work.

The methods of the Port of Portland commission are being exported by Herbert Sands of the New York bureau of municipal research. He commenced the work yesterday morning. Mr. Sands will give particular attention to the ways in which the port funds are expended in comparison with the results obtained. He expects to spend several days in the investigation. He and other representatives of the bureau may then, at the instance of the Portland research committee turn their attention to the formulation of the administrative code required in section 20 of the new charter. The code, it is pointed out, is the most important part of the charter so far as administration is concerned. It requires that the heads of the departments outline or have outlined what their departments are to do as quickly as possible after election, that cost accounting and efficiency records be kept and that a purchasing agent be employed. The code will bring about a departmental organization of the city's business and unify purchases in a way not possible under the old charter. It is believed if the outline of the administrative code be prepared as an expression of the citizens' interest in the new method of the city government that it will be of as much value to the people as to the mayor and commissioners when they assume office. The section which provides for the code reads as follows:

Must Publish Financial Statement.
"A complete code, providing for the administration of the powers and duties of the different departments and for their organization shall be enacted by the commissioners as soon as possible after their election. Such code shall provide for a uniform standard for the purchase of materials and supplies and shall provide a purchasing agent not under civil service rules to inspect and test the quality and quantity of the materials and supplies purchased and determine their exact conformity to specifications. Provision shall be made for the transfer of employees from one department to another. Methods shall be devised for the publication of charts or diagrams showing the financial condition, growth, receipts and expenditures of the different departments. These publications shall be made at least every six months and shall be so published as to give a comparison of the condition at such period with that at a prior period. Each department shall keep time reports and cost data and efficiency records of its employees which shall be made the basis of promotions and increase of salary. Methods shall be provided for by which the heads of departments may determine and compare the work accomplished by the department with reference to its expenditures."

To Complete Program.
"A definite system of accounting shall be provided for each department showing the work performed and the material furnished compared with the cost thereof so itemized that it can be determined whether each department is becoming more efficient or less efficient. "All stores and supplies of the city shall be properly housed, segregated and tabulated and a perpetual inventory kept showing the additions and depletions thereof. Each department shall keep time reports, time records and reports of expenses to be compared with the prior month and prior year which shall show percentage of increase or decrease and shall also keep stores and material accounts for like comparisons." Winfred B. Holton, expert of the New York bureau, who has been here several weeks, will leave for New York tonight. C. A. Dustin, another of the bureau representatives, will remain in Portland until the municipal reference library has become thoroughly established. Mr. Sands will remain until the program as agreed upon by the Portland municipal efficiency committee has been completed.

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ANNUAL BANQUET HELD BY LEGAL FRATERNITY

The annual banquet of the legal fraternity of Phi Delta Phi was held in the Tyrolean room of the Hotel Oregon at 6:30 o'clock Saturday night. Over 70 members were present and made the occasion the most successful in the history of the local chapter (Chase) of the University of Oregon. The event was held in honor of William D. Fenton and Richard W. Montague, who, in the opinion of the legal fraternity, have graced the legal profession with "efficiency, intellect and character." John B. Cleland, who was the original founder of what is now the oldest legal fraternity in the United States, acted as toastmaster. The menu was an ingenious affair in the form of a bill in the court of appeals of Phi Delta, appealing a case against a certain bill of fare. Speeches were made by C. U. Gantenbein, "The Young Lawyer"; E. C. Bronaugh, "The Beginning of Chase Chapter"; C. E. Wood, "As Usual"; and J. P. Kavanagh, "Be of Good Cheer." C. U. Gantenbein and E. C. Bronaugh are two of the men to whom the charter of Chase chapter was granted 24 years ago.

William D. Fenton responded to a toast urging upon the younger men in the profession not to despise the day of small beginnings. Richard W. Montague ably defended the action against the said bill of fare, claiming that as the subject matter had disappeared, the "injunction of the annihilation of said bill of fare" should be dismissed. WORKED EFFECTIVELY FOR COMMISSION PLAN

Much of the effective work for the commission charter was done by the charter publicity committee of which Kingman Brewster is chairman and Charles N. Mahaffie, secretary. The committee furnished speakers for meetings throughout the city, compiled comparative statements of the old and commission charters, refuted misstatements sent out by the "Taxpayers' Association," made the statement for the charter in the statements of candidates pamphlets, invited Mayor Hindley of Spokane and Mayor Gillie of Walla Walla to Portland to tell about the benefits of commission government in those cities and in other ways materially aided in the successful campaign for the charter. The general statement showing the differences between the old and new charters which was compiled by W. H. M. Dye and Estes Snedecor was counted one of the best services of the committee. Members of the charter publicity committee will constitute themselves an organization for the forwarding of commission government. Effort will be made to keep the people in touch with the details of administration that affect their welfare. The committee does not believe that merely passing the charter obtains good government or economical administration for Portland, but that active service will be needed for a good while to come.

SIXTY-TWO READY TO ACCEPT STARS

Only Five Automobile Club Members Decline to Act as Special Policemen.

Sixty-two of the business men named from the Portland Automobile club to act as special policemen to stop auto and motorcycle speeding in Portland have already notified President W. J. Clemens that they will accept their commissions. Answers from the others on the list are expected by tomorrow morning. Only five have so far declined to act.

They have given business reasons for declining. "I never saw anything take as this fast," said Mr. Clemens this morning. "If it were necessary, I could name another hundred from the applications. I have received from club members who want to be included. The plan is going to be a great success. The letters of those who have accepted show that they mean business and intend to act conscientiously and energetically to stop law violations. Arrangements are under way for a luncheon at the Commercial club Friday to be attended by the 100 special officers, the public safety committee and directors of the Automobile club, and by Chief of Police Slover and members of the police committee of the executive board. At that time the "Tying Squadron" will be sworn in and handed their official stars. The date of this luncheon was first fixed for Wednesday, but it has been delayed to Friday on account of red tape necessary in drawing up satisfactorily the \$100,000 bond necessary."

BODY AT MILEPOST 52 IS OF DROWNED GREEK

Timber, Or., May 6.—The body found in a shallow grave at Mile Post 52 on the P. R. & N. railway was not that of a murdered man, as suspected by the finders this week. In the winter of 1911-1912 a Greek fell from a footlog over the Salmonberry river. It was during a high water period and he was drowned. This was about Mile Post 49. The following spring a P. R. & N. engineering corps working at Mile Post 52 found the body, which was in distressingly bad condition, so members of the crew buried it where it was found, not going very deep. 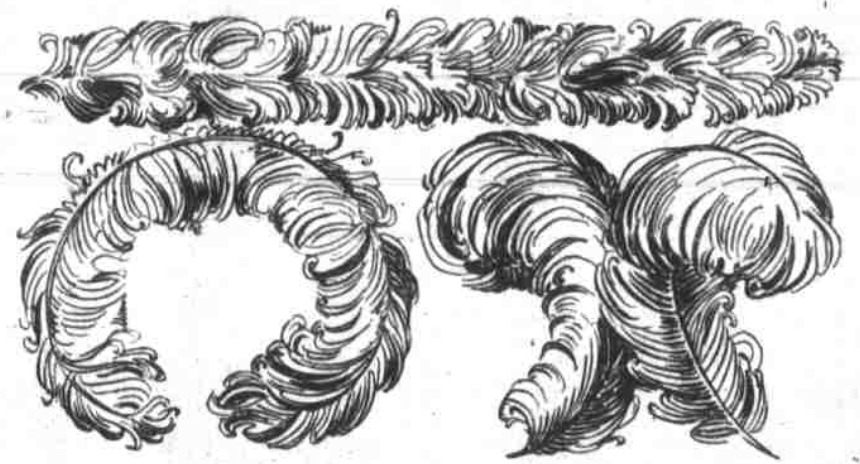
